Setting Goals That Are S.M.A.R.T.

Goals. We all have them.

Many of us make resolutions each New Year in hopes of self-improvement, whether it be kicking a bad habit, getting in shape, or better managing our finances. While these pledges may have been made with the best of intentions, without a carefully choreographed plan, often we are destined to fall short.



During the National Grange Leadership Conference, one of the workshops focused on setting "S.M.A.R.T. Goals" within your personal life and within your Grange. This is an acronym for Smart, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant and Time-bound. You might see different words corresponding to each letter from time to time, but in the end, the message remains the same. By envisioning a goal with these criteria in mind, you are charting a roadmap for success. These stated metrics provide a sense of direction, and help not only you, but those in your Grange get organized and focused.

So, let's break down the components of a **S.M.A.R.T.** goal:

S - SPECIFIC: Our first step is to define a clear and unambiguous objective. By establishing a goal that is specific, attention will be more focused on an exact area. Regardless of whether the goal is big or small, it should be easily described, and understood by others.

M - MEASURABLE: What will success look like, and more importantly, how will we know when we get there? Establish certain criteria that quantifies progress towards the

accomplishment of the stated goal. When possible, utilize numbers or percentages to tabulate progress. We cannot rely merely on personal opinions that can be open to interpretation.

A – ACHIEVABLE: Consider those involved in the process, and whether the combined skills needed to succeed are present. Goals should not necessarily be easy but should be attainable with a well-constructed plan. Your fellow Grange members will not be inspired by boring or easy goals, but they will work towards what they believe can be attained.

R - RELEVANT: Will achieving this goal be impactful to your overall body of work? Ensure that reaching this stated goal will address a particular challenge or obstacle to your current

performance. Also, it is important to understand that results won't happen overnight. The process can become a long journey, and everyone must be fully invested towards seeing it through.

T – TIME-BOUND: Selecting starting and target dates of completion creates a sense of urgency for all involved, pushing members to work harder and with deliberate action. Keeping everyone motivated and on-task can be a challenge, but the anticipation of the end-result should be a source of motivation.

With these five key components outlined, S.M.A.R.T. goals provide a clear understanding for all involved, and plan of what steps must be taken along the way. These steps, combined, become a course of action. Everyone involved understands the role they play, and their responsibilities. These actions will also fall into a chronological order, optimizing productivity.

An additional benefit to seeing the pathway laid out is that it provides the opportunity to evaluate the overall process. Can any steps be condensed, combined, or eliminated? Challenges can be anticipated, and contingency plans considered, making extensive delays avoidable.

S.M.A.R.T. goals are an insight into your expectations of your future self and future Grange. Even an objective that doesn't meet all the S.M.A.R.T. criteria is still a learning opportunity.

Some people struggle with goal setting, and that's okay. This is a skill you can develop, both individually and as a Grange. Take comfort in knowing that setting goals is the first step to reaching them. Each time you work through a S.M.A.R.T. goal, you'll learn what practices work best for you and which ones to avoid.

Just remember: even slow progress is progress.

shelters. You've packed boxes for Operation Christmas Child and Jared Boxes.

Not only have you donated physical items; you've donated your time and energy.

Subordinate Spotlight

Russellville #91 Chester County

Located in the rolling hills of Chester County, Russellville #91 remains devoted to its history while moving forward to be an important part of their community. Since their chartering, Russellville has been an important part of their community, hosting socials, having speakers, and holding events to bring the community together.

Organized on January 31, 1874, Russellville Grange was chartered June 29, 1874, with twenty-five charter members with Joseph Miller serving as their first Master/President. Members originally met at the Villa Nova School, which was located just north of Russellville.

In November 1876, it consolidated with Cochranville #275. During this period, the Grange held their meetings in a wheelwright's shop and then on the second-floor of a grocery owned by one of their members until they were able to purchase land to build their own hall in 1877. This hall, which is called Somerset Hall in the newspapers at the time, was erected at the intersection of Route 896 and Eden Road. Located within the hall was a small grocery which sold goods to members at a discounted price.

By 1901, the membership of Russellville Grange was declining and members did a door-to-door membership drive. This was a success, bringing thirteen members into the Grange as a result. With their Grange now growing, in 1916, they purchased the Russellville Public Hall, and Russellville Grange held their first meeting there on March 16, 1916. Eighty years later, in September 1996, Fernwood #1329 consolidated with Russellville.

From the beginning, Russellville has been involved in the community, hosting meals,

holding plays, entertaining speakers, holding a soup sale and their annual chicken bar-bque. In the 1910s, Russellville held an annual corn show, where they held an open meeting, inviting farmers to bring their best ears of corn

to be judged for size and taste. This tradition continues with their "Harvest Night," which involves the judging of pies, pumpkin decorating,



and continues the tradition of judging ears of corn.

At one time, Russellville Grange had a 14-piece orchestra, a children's choir, and a men's quartet. These musical groups were an important part of many of Russellville's programs and they would tour the area performing at other Granges, community events, and fairs.

The history of Russellville cannot begin without mention of the notable people who have been involved in their Grange's history: Gayle Reyburn (2023-24 Pennsylvania State Jr. Ambassador; 2023-24 National Jr. Ambassador); Tina Keen (Deaf and Community Service Director (2023-present); and Cassandra Kehs (Pennsylvania Jr. Princess/Ambassador 2018-2019), Harvey Reyburn (Pennsylvania Jr. State Ambassador 2021-2022).

With a lengthy history of being a part of their community, Russellville Grange looks forward to the future and how they can be a part of the ever-changing community.

Thank You...to all Granges that participated in either of the two State Grange leadership conferences held in February and March. Your History Committee was pleased to participate and give a presentation on the importance of records preservation. Granges have many years of history in their records, telling the rich story of the life and culture in rural communities. Preserved records are the only reliable source of accurate history of your Grange; If destroyed or unprotected, the legacy is gone forever.

Types of Records

Records that should be preserved include: meeting minutes, member roll books, financial records, pictures with identification, news clippings (be sure to include the date), department/committee scrapbooks/reports, newsletters, and awards/plaques/citations. Some documents, however, may have limited historical value; routine correspondence, thank you notes, and invoices (after audit) might be among things not permanently maintained.

Steps

Consider these simple steps to organize your Grange's historical documents:

- Gather all materials into one place.
- Separate by type of document.
- Identify start/end dates of each volume preferably on outside cover of each book.
- Put into chronological order.
- Identify pictures include the event and names (if possible).

Preservation Options

After your records have been organized, the next step is to store them appropriately. There are two main types of storage - electronic (digital and/or microfilm) storage and physical

(paper) storage.

Electronic Storage

The electronic option is the most permanent storage but also the most expensive option. Old records may be microfilmed by a company providing this type of service, a process in which an image (picture) of each page is taken and put onto a roll of film. This is the most permanent type of storage but requires access to film reader equipment to view the information. Once microfilming has been done, it is possible and inexpensive to convert microfilmed documents to digitized images which can then be saved on a flash drive readable on most computers. Recent records created/maintained electronically on a computer can be easily saved to a digital format and can even be converted to microfilm images. Digitized records can be loaded onto a website to make them readily accessible. Almost 150 years of State Grange records were microfilmed and digitized over the past eight years and are now available to anyone on the History page of the State Grange website. The State Grange History Committee can provide guidance to any Granges considering microfilming and/or digitizing their records.

Physical Storage

The most basic and least expensive storage option would be to place paper records in boxes (preferably archival quality acid-free boxes), filing cabinets (preferably fire-proof), safe or bank vault. Regardless of where your paper records are stored, it is important to provide a climate-controlled location with proper humidity, temperature and limited light. Extremes of moisture, heat or sunlight will hasten the eventual deterioration of paper documents.

Storage in Local Communities

Sometimes Granges, including those which have disbanded, may wish to pass ownership of their records to another entity that agrees to permanently safeguard the historical documents. Local historical societies and community libraries are great possibilities but if doing so, please execute a written agreement that the materials will be preserved in perpetuity regardless of the frequency of their use.

Storage at State Archives

Another good option for permanent preservation of Grange records is offered by the State Archives of the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission. Starting in the early 2000's and continuing for a number of years, many Granges submitted dozens of boxes of their records to the State Archives. After a hiatus in recent years due to lack of space, the Archives has just opened a new building in Harrisburg that provides space to accept Grange records again for safe keeping. Records from local Granges temporarily stored at the State Grange headquarters to prevent their destruction will now be transferred to the Archives. Doing this is a permanent donation of records; materials at the State Archives are available for the public to examine on-site but cannot be removed from the premises, either temporarily or permanently. Your State Grange History Committee will provide the required form that Granges donating their records must sign and can help with the logistics of preparing and transporting materials to the State Archives.

Historical Markers

Plans are moving forward to install bronze historical markers at the gravesites of five persons who were influential in the formation and early history of the PA State Grange. The first such ceremony will be held Sunday, September 15, 2024, rain or shine beginning 3 p.m. at the Mt. Zion Maple Hill Cemetery, near Montgomery, PA to dedicate markers on the graves of Luke Eger (responsible for the organization of the first Pennsylvania Grange

Eagle #1 in 1871) and Frank Porter (first PA State Overseer and the organizer of 41 of Pennsylvania's earliest Granges). Following the ceremony, a showing of the State Grange 150th anniversary video and picnic supper will be held in the nearby Eagle Grange Hall; interested persons are welcome to attend and may receive more details from Doug Bonsall. Markers will also be dedicated in coming months for the three persons from Pennsylvania initiated into the National Grange Hall of Fame – past State and National leaders Leonard Rhone, John W. Scott and J. Luther Snyder. Unfortunately, regulations at the Pottstown Cemetery prohibit the installation of a marker planned for the grave of David B. Mauger, first Master of the PA State Grange.




Report Forms

Happy Spring! After a long cold winter, I hope this issue finds you celebrating green grass and full trees.

After celebrating a long sought after win to exempt Grange Halls from property taxes, we are now turning our attention to its implementation. I am slowly working through a list of Grange Halls that currently pay property taxes (some counties have always exempted Granges from these taxes) to work with counties to recognize the legislation. General Assembly Returns to Session

On March 18 both the House and Senate returned to session after a long adjournment in the beginning part of the year. While it is expected most discussions in the spring session will be focused on the budget, there have already been policy discussions happening around Grange issues.

PA Senate Committee Passes Sunday Hunting Repeal

On March 20, the Senate Game and Fisheries Committee approved legislation (Senate Bill 67) that would completely remove the prohibition on Sundays available for hunting and trapping, and would leave all wildlife management decisions to the Pennsylvania Game Commission.

Currently, hunting is allowed three Sundays a year. The Game and Fisheries Committee approved similar legislation that would have fully-repealed the Sunday hunting limits in 2021, but the bill did not get voted on by the full Senate. A similar bill has recently

been introduced in the State House of Representatives.

A prohibition on hunting on Sundays has been in place in Pennsylvania since 1873. The Pennsylvania State Grange has historically been the only agricultural and rural affairs organization that has remained steadfast against Sunday Hunting. Recently, some other agricultural organizations have indicated support for SB 67.

Now that the proposed legislation has been approved by the committee, it will sent to the full Senate for consideration.

House Commerce Committee holds hearing on Right To Repair

The Pennsylvania State Grange was asked to submit written testimony on "Right To Repair" for a House Commerce Committee informational hearing on March 25. The hearing was held at the request of Rep. Kyle Mullins (Lackawanna County) to gather input from stakeholders with a possible bill introduction in the future. He wanted to highlight the importance of Right To Repair, emphasizing the environmental benefits, and the complexity of modern repairs. He stressed the value of stakeholder input for creating effective legislation and aiming for bipartisan support.

In its testimony, the Pennsylvania State Grange indicated that Right To Repair is not limited to agriculture. It affects much of what we buy and use products from automobiles to cell phones, and other consumer-focused electronic devices. In some buildings, temperature is computer-controlled and the thermostat is irrelevant. There are many things that consumers cannot fix any more.

For most farmers, replacing a \$40,000 piece of equipment on a whim is not an option. Their only real option is repairing damaged equipment. But who can repair it? The farmer? Repairs done solely by a certified equipment dealer who could be 30-40 miles away? If so, that farmer is at the mercy of the staff availability of that dealer. Many dealerships have established areas and territories they serve. Many operations on a farm are time sensitive, and down time waiting for repairs during planting or harvest can have a ripple effect for the rest of the year.

What if repairs are done by a local equipment dealer not affiliated with the manufacturers' brand? Which repair resource is qualified? Which facility is more accessible? Which repair is more affordable and is the price higher for repairs done by company dealerships because no one else is authorized to repair that piece of equipment?

To be fair, farm equipment manufacturers have a valid point. It may have cost millions of dollars for a manufacturer to have researched and developed the technological advances. Should they allow just any equipment dealers unfamiliar with the equipment to do the repairs? Doing so, they might say, increases their liability if they let someone else perform those repairs who may not have enough understanding and training to repair correctly. Could an independent repair prompt the manufacturer to void the warranty?

Some Right To Repair advocates may want complete access to manufacturer specifications including algorithms. They



might say that manufacturers base their restrictions against non-company equipment dealers on profits coming

from a restraint of trade. Some opposing Right To Repair could try to make the case that repair information for technologically sophisticated equipment is intellectual property and should not be shared.

In its testimony, the Pennsylvania State Grange made clear that its policy position voted on by members is in favor of the Right To Repair.

However, recognizing that there are arguments on both sides, the Pennsylvania State Grange is presented the following suggestions for the House Commerce Committee's consideration:

- Some manufacturers have already made agreements which they say allow independent equipment dealers to do the repairs. The Grange suggested the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee (LBFC) could examine those agreements and survey equipment dealers to determine the accuracy of that claim.
- Further, LBFC could also look at laws passed in other states to see if a national model of Right To Repair is emerging. It could also reach out to the national state legislator organizations National Council of State Legislators and American Legislative Exchange Council to see what model legislation has been crafted. I suggest this not to say that we should follow a national model. Rather, it is important to see what others are saying and then the General Assembly can decide for Pennsylvania what should be done.

Hopefully, these suggestions could lay the groundwork for a Right To Repair bill that protects manufacturers' intellectual property while providing a certification training program so that repairs are done according to manufacturer specifications.

Dairy Discussion with Senator Judy Schwank



On March 28, Pennsylvania State Grange President Matt Espenshade, Legislative Director Carrie Nace and Doug Sattazahn, who is a member of the State Grange Ag and Environmental Issues committee, traveled to Senator Judy Schwank's Reading office to meet with the senator and her Chief of Staff Bill Evans.

The group had an informative discussion on dairy policy. While recognizing addressing the challenges of the industry will not be easy, Senator Schwank agrees working alongside of the Pennsylvania State Grange will be beneficial as policy is developed in the future.



Grange Cookbook Classics Sheet Pan Fish

1 pt cherry tomatoes, halved ½ c thinly sliced onions 1-2 Tbsp olive oil 1 Tbsp red wine vinegar 1 tsp honey

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Place tomatoes and onions in a glass bowl. Add olive oil, vinegar, honey, salt and pepper. Toss to mix. Place in 9" x 13" nonreactive baking dish. Roast in oven for 15 mins. Meanwhile pat dry fish. Stir tomatos and onions; add garlic and push to side of pan. Add fish fillets to pan, spacing them evenly apart. Roast until the fish is cooked through and flakes easily, about 10–12 mins. To serve: mash tomatoes, onions and garlic to make sauce. Serve over the fish. Serves 4.




