MINUTES OF THE 147TH ANNUAL PA STATE GRANGE SESSION
FRIDAY, OCTOBER 25, 2019

1. The 147th Pennsylvania State Grange Annual Session officially opened in the Sixth Degree on Friday October 25, 2019 at 9:00 am in the Ballroom, Ramada Conference Center by Wyndham, State College, PA with Master Wayne Campbell presiding. The opening drill was under the direction of Lindsay Schroeder, Berks County.
2. Roll call found all officers present including Brother Michael Pratt filling in for Sister Janet Pratt, Executive Committee Member. Sister Doris Evans served as the pianist for the session.
3. Master Campbell lowered to the Fourth Degree.
4. Honored guests recognized were Betsy Huber, National Grange President and Past Pennsylvania State Grange President.

Past State Masters Elizabeth Downey, Carl Meiss and Past First Lady and Past National Priestess Annalist, Fae Snyder.

National Grange Representative Kay Stiles, National Grange Pomona.

Brother Joseph Stefenoni, National Leadership/Membership Director.

5. Sister Ashley Furman, Patty Bird and Ruth Vonada, Co-Chairpersons of the 2019 Host Committee, welcomed everyone to State College, Centre County, Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania State Grange Session was hosted by the Southwest Convention District.
6. Master Campbell announced the meeting will be recorded for Minutes taking purposes only.
7. Master Campbell appointed Cassidy Cheddar as Session Parliamentarian.
8. Sister Judy Pressler gave us devotions titled "Today is a New Day, Cherish It". Sister Pressler then read the scripture Proverbs 27:1 – Do not boast about tomorrow, for you do not know what a day may bring. And Matthew 6:34 – Therefore, do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. Her message was "We can't change yesterday but we can ruin today by worrying about tomorrow". The hymn was "Great is Thy Faithfulness" and the closing prayer was by M.S. Lowndes – Lord help me not to worry today, for my tomorrow that's on the way. But help me keep my eyes on you, for this is what will see me through.
9. Brother Andrew Kieffer announced that you need to turn your phones to vibrate. If he hears your phone, it will cost you \$10.00.
10. Junior Grange Director Lurae Benzio introduced Elisabeth Reich, 2019-2020 Junior Grange Princess and Bryce Danko, 2019-2020 Junior Grange Prince.

Elisabeth has been a Junior Granger for many years. She is a member of Valley Grange #1360 in York County. Her parents wanted her to learn the beauty of community service and giving back to places that have given so much to her. She spoke about how we need to work on teaching her generation more about Community Service. She has helped at the Elizabethtown Fair Milkshake stand and the Middletown Grange Fair to help with their chicken dinner. She would love to come to your Grange and assist you with community service projects.

Bryce is a member of Community Grange in Perry County and has been a Junior Member for five years. He is a freshman of Greenwood High School. In school he actively involved in FFA and the band where he plays the saxophone. Outside of school he is involved in Boy Scouts, Liverpool Junior Firefighter and Baseball. In 2014 Bryce went to Junior Camp for the first time and stated it was probably the best decision of his life. 11. Appointment of Session Committees—Credentials—Karen Poorman, Centre County, Denae Zvarick, Montgomery County and Patty Bird, Centre County.

- a. Sister Poorman gave a partial report of the Credential's Committee as follows:
86 Delegates and 55 Subordinate Granges and
42 Delegates and 27 Pomona Granges represented at this time.

With a total of 128 Delegates present at this time. Master Campbell confirmed that we do have a quorum and can proceed with our work.

12. Sixth Degree Committee—Martha Ebersole, Perry County and Elaine Nilon, Beaver County.
13. Sister Nettie Kauffman, Chair of the Salary Committee presented their report. Serving on the committee were Michael Martin, Barbara Warden, Nettie Kauffman and Henry Seidel, ex officio.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Salary report as recommended by the Salary Committee, motion carried.

14. **A motion was made and seconded to accept the official schedule of the 147th PA State Grange Session, motion carried.**
15. Master Campbell presented the highlights from his Annual Master's Address. It was accepted and the full report will appear in the *Journal of Proceedings*.
16. Sister Campbell, State Grange Secretary, presented highlights from her report. It was accepted and the full report will appear in the *Journal of Proceedings*.
17. Brother Seidel presented the Lifetime Membership report from the Committee that met August 29, 2019 at the State Grange Office in Lemoyne. The committee is recommending that we no longer offer Lifetime membership because it is no longer profitable. Serving on the committee was Henry Seidel; Martha Ebersole and Debra Campbell.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Lifetime Membership report which recommends that Lifetime Membership be discontinued beginning January 1, 2020 as recommended by the Lifetime Membership Committee, motion carried.

18. Brother Seidel, State Grange Treasurer, presented highlights from his report. Brother Seidel referred to the letter from Hamilton and Musser stating that the review has been completed. His report was accepted and will appear in the *Journal of Proceedings*.

Brother Seidel then presented the budget for information only, the budget will be voted on at Saturday's session. The Budget can be voted on after 11:04 am., this will have allowed it to lay over the required 24 hours.

19. Sister Barbara Gross, Executive Committee Chairman, presented the Executive Committee report. Her report was accepted and will appear in the *Journal of Proceedings*.
20. Barbara Schroeder presented Resolution No. 39, "Changing the Frequency of Pomona Grange Meetings" "was read because it is a By-Laws change and is required to be presented 24 hours prior to the adoption. This resolution will be presented for adoption after 11:15 am, Saturday.
21. Brother JV Lamb, Chair of the Grange Foundation Committee, presented the Foundation report. It was accepted and will appear in the *Journal of Proceedings*.
22. Sister Lizzie Bailey, Public Relations/Membership Consultant presented her report. Sister Bailey stated that we need 2,000 new members to get this organization back to a good place. Sister Bailey presented the application for a Grange Charter to National Master Huber for the "new" Capital Region Grange in Harrisburg, Dauphin County. Sister Bailey's report was accepted and will appear in the *Journal of Proceedings*.
23. Abby Spackman of the Pennsylvania Assistive Technology Foundation and AgrAbility. PATF is a statewide, non-profit organization that helps individuals with disabilities and older Pennsylvanians acquire the assistive technology devices and services they want. They provide financial education, financial loans for the purchase of assistive technology and more.
24. Brother Lynn Dietrich of the Government Committee presented their resolutions.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Resolution #11 as written, motion carried.

25. Door Prizes were given by the Host Committee.
26. Session recessed for lunch at 12:04 pm.
27. Master Campbell called the session back to order at 1:30 pm.
28. Master Campbell introduced Travis Daniels, American Income Life. He gave a short introduction of AIL Insurance and said that they have been with the Pennsylvania State Grange since August 2009. To date they have awarded members with \$182,000 in claims. Mr. Daniels invited everyone to visit his table in the lobby.
29. Sister Barbara Gross gave a report on the Quilt Block program. The Grange committed to painting 100 Wooden Quilt Blocks (2' x 2') for the Farm Show Complex. Blocks have been painted by Grange members and friends of the Grange from all across the state. Several blocks were painted at Family Festival in July and along with those painted at home, we are happy to say that the first 40 blocks were delivered to the PA Farm Show Complex the first week of September. The last 60 blocks are done and will be delivered by November. Thank you to all those who painted a block! It will be exciting to see where the blocks are mounted throughout the Farm Show Complex.
30. Master Campbell stated that all candidates will be limited to two minutes. Master Campbell then asked for suggestions for State Officers. Those suggested were:

31. Brother Douglas Bonsall, Chairman of the History Committee presented their report and some things the History Committee has been working on. Jenn Nauss presented resources that are now available on the Pennsylvania State Grange Website. Journal of Proceedings and Listing of Granges were presented last year. Charter Applications have been added to the Website. Historical highlights by terms by the Past Masters have also been completed.

Video equipment was purchased by Valley Grange to record video biographies. Steve and Karen Mohn with help from their daughter Ashley have been interviewing Grangers to give their thoughts on the Grange and past experiences. Sister Nauss presented a brief video of Fae Snyder, former First Lady and former Past National Priestess Annalist. If you have any members you would like to be recorded, please contact someone on the History Committee.

In 2023 the Pennsylvania State Grange will be 150 years old. The History Committee has been appointed to plan the celebration. They are currently looking for members to be in charge of committees.

Please check out the table in the lobby with information of Eagle Grange #1 who will be celebrating their 150th year in 2022. If you would like to volunteer to be on a committee, contact one of the History committee members. Pamphlets were handed out to become a friend of Eagle Grange. David Troutman, Master of Eagle Grange presented certificates to Beth and Bernie Downey who have become Friends of Eagle Grange. The funds received from being a friend of Eagle Grange will be used to help renovate and improve their Grange building to be more of a community center. Other members of the History Committee are Susan Tau, Secretary, Anna May Nauss, Treasurer.

The report was accepted and will appear in the *Journal of Proceedings*.

32. Brother Lynn Dietrich of the Government Committee continued with presenting their resolutions.

A motion was made and seconded to change the wording back to the original wording in Resolution #14, motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to add single use plastics to Resolution No.14, motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to strike the word rights and insert the word guidelines to Resolution No. 16, motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to send Resolution No. 19 back to committee for rewording on the Resolve, motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to amend Resolution No. 21 by inserting the word Southern before the word border, motion carried

A motion was made and seconded to reject Resolution No. 21, motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to insert the words “will not support legislation that” before the word “prohibits” to Resolution No. 34, motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to move the previous question, motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to send Resolution No. 34 back to committee, motion carried.

33. **A motion was made and seconded to accept the Archive all the Resolutions that were submitted by Vince Phillips to Archive, motion carried.**

34. Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture, Russell Redding was introduced and spoke regarding the issues that the Grange has been involved and appreciates the Grange and gives thanks for our involvement and what we do every day to promote Agriculture. He thanked us for the invitation to speak before our Convention.

He appreciates seeing the Quilt Squares while traveling across the state. Secretary Redding is looking forward to seeing the Quilt Blocks that will be hung in the Farm Show Complex and the one Quilt Block that has been painted honoring the PA Preferred program which will be mounted in the PA Department of Agriculture building.

Secretary Redding thanked the Grange for its voice in the discussion of Broadband. He stated our voice has been critical in advancing Broadband in Pennsylvania.

Secretary Redding thanked the Grange for their support of the 2019 PA Farm Bill and our advocacy for the bill. He also thanked the Grange for our friendship and work that we are doing for the citizens of Pennsylvania. A brief question and answer session followed his presentation.

36. Sister Barbara Schroeder of the Good of the Order Committee continued with presenting their resolutions.

An amendment was made and seconded to change the location from Reading to Harrisburg to amend Resolution No. 42 by striking the word Reading and inserting the word Harrisburg, amendment failed.

A motion was made and seconded to strike the second Resolve in Resolution No. 46, motion carried.

37. Brother Donald Steeley of the Family Issues Committee continued with presenting their resolutions.

A motion was made and seconded to send the policy statement of the Family Issues Committee back to committee to rewrite some of their policy statement, motion carried.

38. Session closed in the Fourth Degree at 5:38 pm. Session will reconvene Saturday morning at 8:30 am.

MASTER/PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

President's Address to the Delegate Body 2018

National Representatives, State Officers, public officials, Delegates, and members of the Pennsylvania State Grange and guests. I stand before you to deliver an address of the activity that has taken place over the past year within the Pennsylvania State Grange. It has been an exciting, sad as well as an eventful year.

We lost many long time Grangers who were called home by our Lord to serve in that great Grange beyond. One in particular, Brother James Scott was named Granger of the year at last year's convention. Brother Jim passed away unexpectedly on December 3, 2018. Jim was so proud to have been chosen Granger of the Year. He was a staple not only in the Grange, but in his community and to his family. Let us all remember those who have gone on before us and live our lives that we too may leave the same type of memories on this earth when we are called home.

February 9th was a day I will not soon forget. Several people had gathered at Bottle Run Grange near Williamsport to empty it out prior to the sale of the property. The kitchen floor had been weakened by a water leak several years ago. When I went to lift a countertop commercial mixer I went down through the floor into a crawl space about five feet below and was knocked unconscious. There was a six burner cast iron commercial stove teetering on the edge of the collapsed floor that could have fallen in at any time. Cliff Bailey still jumped down to help me.

I want to thank Cliff Bailey whom I can truthfully say, saved my life that day. Cliff was with me and risked his own wellbeing to get down into the crawl space. In addition to the mixer a hot water heater fell on top of me. Had Cliff not removed the water heater from my chest, I would have suffocated. This accident resulted in a concussion, six broken ribs, bruised lungs, two broken teeth, breaking my left shoulder in the front and the shoulder blade, along with some other cuts and bruises. After a one-day stay in the ICU at UPMC Susquehanna, Williamsport to be sure there was no internal bleeding, I was allowed to go home.

I would like to thank the many people, Grangers and non-Grangers who sent prayers, well wishes, and cards. That accident sent ripples through the Grange all across the nation. The good news is it caused many to evaluate their buildings. I know of at least one in which a weak floor was identified and repaired. I would like to thank the doctors and nurses in both the Trauma unit and the ICU of UPMC Susquehanna Williamsport for the wonderful care and treatment that not only I received, but my wife and daughters as well.

I am still working to either help grow or close Granges that have dropped below the 13-member minimum or have fallen behind on their dues commitment. No one wants to close a Grange, but there comes a time when we must accept the fact that it is better to close and hope to re-organize in the future.

In 2018/2019 we closed or revoked the Charters of two Granges, Friendship Grange #1232 in Mercer County and Penn Grange #534 in Clearfield Co. We consolidated Bottle Run Grange #1301 in Lycoming County with Eagle Grange #1 of Lycoming County. We were able to re-organize Shartlesville Grange in Berks County after they closed in 2018. A new group of energetic people have taken leadership roles and have been working to continue to grow their numbers by trying new and innovative ideas. We are working at opening a new Grange in the Harrisburg area. We have 11 people organized at this point, and they are looking for two more people to be able to get their Charter. They have begun to do activities so when they get their Charter they can hit the ground running. We are working on opening a Grange in Clinton County and possibly re-organizing a Grange in Schuylkill County.

Debbie and I traveled all over the Commonwealth promoting the Grange, speaking at special Grange functions, and attending events representing the Pennsylvania State Grange. We loved every minute we spent with you, our Grange family. Here is a recap month by month of what we did:

October 2018 started off in Blair County at Scotch Valley Grange #510. Debbie and I helped them recognize an 85-year member of the Grange, along with several others who were recognized for their many years of service to the Grange.

I attended a public meeting in Halifax with Senator John DiSanto about Sunday hunting.

We attended a very exciting 146th annual session of the Pennsylvania State Grange. Our business meetings were packed full of resolutions. The delegate body did an excellent job of debating the issues and completing our work in a timely manner.

I attended a Penn State Ag delegates meeting that was on how to talk to people outside of agriculture about agriculture.

November began with Lizzie, Debbie and I traveling to Russellville Grange's open house. They had a very good turnout of Grangers and people from the community. National Master Betsy Huber was in attendance.

We then headed for Stowe, Vermont for the 151st session of the National Grange. Debbie and I left a few days early and stopped at some really interesting places on our way to Stowe. I served on the Ag Committee and Debbie was on the Grange Growth and Development Committee. National is always an interesting time debating resolutions from all across America.

December began with a trip to join members of Brandywine Grange to celebrate their 145th Anniversary. Debbie, Lizzie, and I then traveled to Roaring Creek Grange to meet with members of the public to see if we could reorganize this Grange. Unfortunately, only one person from the community attended and after many weeks of communication, it was decided to close and sell Roaring Creek Grange.

We attended a Christmas party at Kimmerlings Grange and a Community Children's event at North Jackson Grange. Shartlesville Grange held a community meeting in an attempt to reorganize. Several people were in attendance from the community and said they would work on getting others involved. Over the next two months, these people worked to find others in the community who shared their intent. On February 18, 2019, Shartlesville Grange was reorganized with 18 members.

We attended Elizabethtown Grange's Christmas party and installed Jennifer Beamon as State Pomona and Hannah Leibensperger as State Ceres as part of the evening activities. They were unable to attend the installation ceremony with the other State Grange officers at the close of our annual session.

January 2019 began with the Pennsylvania Farm Show. We attended the PA Preferred Dinner on Friday night. On Wednesday, there was a Public Officials luncheon, and on Thursday we hosted another public meeting on Broadband. We had a record year at the Pennsylvania State Grange stand during the Farm Show for the sale of Grange cookbooks and raffle tickets for the quilt.

Vince and I attended the public inauguration of Governor Tom Wolf. This was an impressive first time experience.

Matt Espenshade, Doug Sattazahn, Art and Dina Zug, and myself met with representatives of the Budget and Finance Committee. This was a result of Senator Judy Schwenk from Berks County, who is a Grange member, presenting SR 384. This resolution tasked the Budget and Finance Committee to look at all aspects of the dairy industry and report facts to the Senate within one year on suggested changes. The State Grange was honored to have been chosen to meet with the group.

Debbie and I represented the Pennsylvania State Grange at the annual Banquet of Pennsylvania State Association of County Fairs. Their relationship helps to assure the continuation of our local fairs in Pennsylvania.

February found us in the Capitol Rotunda hosting or promoting a Grange information table at the annual Cornucopia event hosted by the Pennsylvania State Council of Farm Organizations. It is a great way to present PA agriculture to the legislators and their staff.

Debbie and I then represented the Pennsylvania State Grange at the Kutztown Rotary Club Dinner. This is an annual dinner where they recognize outstanding local farmers, FFA members, and 4-H members.

Four days after the accident on February 9th, I was on PCN representing the Pennsylvania State Grange's position opposing Sunday hunting. I was very surprised to learn the amount of people in the state who are opposed to Sunday hunting.

March came with Debbie and I helping to package 45,000 breakfast meals at the Greenwood Elementary School. These meals were to be used in Perry and Juniata Counties. The event was co-sponsored by the Greenwood FFA and Perry Valley Grange #1804.

March 12th, I joined with approximately 75 other people as we advocated for the Penn State Land Grant University at the State Capital. The Land Grant University gets no funding from tuition dollars. This makes the money in the state budget very important since it ties in to matching funds from the Federal Government as well as a percentage from local governments.

That evening, I attended Baileyville Grange's 85th Anniversary celebration. I enjoyed a covered dish dinner with a pot of homemade oyster stew. Membership awards were given out to members who have served the Grange.

We traveled to Montgomery, Pa. and met with members of Eagle Grange #1 to start planning their 150th Anniversary. Debbie and I visited Marion Grange #225 in Centre County. They are taking on some new members and are becoming active in the community again.

March 15th we traveled to Gettysburg to attend the Mid-Atlantic Leadership Conference. The conference was very well attended with over 90 people in attendance. Workshops were held throughout the weekend

on various topics. Vince Phillips held a workshop on writing resolutions and meet and greet with Representative Torren Ecker. Torren was elected by one vote.

Lynn Dietrich and I traveled to Albright College to help judge a county wide science fair. Hamburg Grange sponsors three prizes for this contest. This was a real challenge to pick only three winners from the well over 100 entries.

I attended one of Lieutenant Governor Letterman's listening sessions on Marijuana. These sessions give people, both for and against, a chance to have their voices heard.

March concluded with an Executive Committee meeting in State College followed by a state officer's meeting the next day. The officer's meeting was held at Logan Grange #109 in Pleasant Gap, Pa.

April was Grange month and I received many requests to represent the Pennsylvania State Grange across the state. It started out at Kutztown Grange with their annual community night. We traveled to Lycoming County where I was the guest speaker at the Lycoming County Legislative Dinner. I was very pleased to see a reporter there, who did an excellent job of covering the event. A member sent me her article and I was quoted numerous times. I attended the house Democrats Meet and Greet on Tourism and Recreational Development. This was a chance to meet the Legislators and discuss the topic with them one on one. This led into Grange Day on the Hill -- April 9, 2019. We only had about eight people attend but it was a good day for those in attendance. Packets were handed out to the Legislators visited. Next I attended a Penn State Ag Council meeting and then continued on to Pioneer Grange for their open House that night. Lizzie and I traveled to Lincoln Grange in Huntington County and helped with a Community Easter egg hunt that they held. There was a very nice turn out for the event and all had a great time.

I then attended and spoke at a meeting on Broadband hosted by the House Caucus. This is headed by Rep. Pam Snyder and Rep. Irvin. Also, I attended a meeting with potential members for a new Grange we are trying to get started in the Harrisburg area.

Vince and I attended a meeting in a Legislator's office with their legal representative on the proposed state mandated voluntary retirement plan. We voiced the Granges opposition to the plan as it is currently presented. This legislation did not come up for a vote in this session. Later that day, I traveled to Harvey-Alleppo Grange in Greene County to present them with their Distinguished Grange Award that they received from National Grange. This was their 6th year in a row to receive this honor. I spoke on Grange legislative issues to a very nice sized group of people in attendance.

I participated in an event hosted by the Centre Daily Times called "The Influencers". This was a group of people from across the state who all have the goal of adequate Broadband in Pennsylvania. We gathered at the State Theater in State College for a panel discussion on the issue. There were three panels and I was assigned to the panel discussing the challenges of providing adequate Broadband in Pennsylvania. Over 100 people attended the meeting, including Governor Wolf, who provided the opening remarks. The event drew coverage from local TV stations, newspapers, as well as the Pa. Cable Network.

I attended the Open House at Fleetwood Grange in Berks County. They had a large group in attendance and a light meal before the meeting. We traveled to Lawrence County where I was the speaker at the their All Granger Dinner. A wonderful meal was served and several people asked questions after my presentation on various topics. I attended and was the speaker at the Tioga Lycoming Bradford Tri-County meeting held in Fassett, Pa. I addressed the Legislative issues the Grange is working on as well as discussed the benefits we provide our members. I was the speaker at the Lehigh-Northampton Pomona Recognition Dinner held in Lenhartsville, Pa. There was a very nice group of people in attendance and all seemed very interested in what the Grange is working on in Harrisburg and Washington. Debbie and I left there and drove to

Washington D.C where we attended the National Grange Fly-In. We spent two days there attending meetings, listening to speakers, and visiting with our Legislators.

May started out in the cornfields of Virginville, Pa while attending Virginville Grange's Community Open House. Over 300 people were in attendance for their rendition of Hee-Haw. A fun filled night was had by all.

Debbie and I attended the Penn State Trustee elections during the day on May 2nd, and then drove north to Potter County for a meeting in the evening. We attended the Potter County Pomona Grange meet the candidates' night. They had a nice turnout from the community and many candidates were present. A debate between the candidates took place where each was given a question with a time limit to answer and then a very brief time to respond if someone addressed an issue to someone specific.

We traveled out to Lawrence County to Liberty Grange #1780 to join in their celebrating 100 years as a Grange. It was a fun filled evening with many in the community attending to help celebrate. I helped at the semi-annual California Grange chicken BBQ. They BBQ approx. 800 halves of chicken twice a year. These events fund their Grange and Grange activities for the year. Lizzie and I attended a Town Hall meeting at Lincoln Grange, where we discussed an idea on public meetings to try and generate community involvement.

Debbie and I traveled to Berks County where we attended the Berks County Junior Grange Camp. She and I were both Judges in their Prince and Princess Competition. I attended a meeting of the Pennsylvania State Council of Farm Organizations of which the Pennsylvania State Grange is a member of the Board. I attended an event hosted by Perry Valley Grange in Perry County called Ag Day. They invite the fourth graders from two local school districts to participate in hands on exhibits and demonstrations. I was asked to assist in handing out the prizes for their essay and poster contests. Later that evening, Debbie and I visited Hamburg Grange in Berks County.

June allowed us to slow down a little bit. We started off with a work day for the Perry County Pomona Grange where we baked 853 whoopie pies with the assistance of the Perry County 4H Rabbit Club. These will be sold for .25 cents each at the Perry County Fair in August.

And thank you to Legislative Director, Vince Phillips, for constantly keeping us informed of the legislative happenings in Pennsylvania. Vince is continually alerting the Grange to programs, policies and items that relate to the precepts of our organization and conveys information to the Pennsylvania State Grange for our consideration. His Grange presence at the State Capitol has increased the Pennsylvania State Grange's involvement and activities within the legislative scene and allotted us a voice on many committees.

The Executive Committee would like to thank Heather Hiller on the excellent job she continues to do in assembling the Pennsylvania Grange News (PGN). The articles, recipes and places to visit that she has included into the magazine has helped to make it a magazine our members want to read from cover to cover. As with other organizations, we send the PGN to a limited number of people outside the Grange. It's always great when those of us that are out on the road representing the Grange have one of these people tell us how much they look forward to receiving the PGN.

Teamwork is needed at every level of the Grange – every step of the way - every activity we participate in, so make sure you and your Grange members are treating everyone with respect, compassion, understanding and cooperation and working for the benefit of the organization.

The Executive Committee along with the help of all the State Grange Officers initiated a project to survey each Subordinate and Pomona Grange in PA to determine the health and activity level of the members, the physical condition of each building owned by the Grange and to secure a copy of the property deed for the State Grange Office files. Hopefully your Grange has been contacted and the surveys completed and returned to the State Office. If perhaps you have not completed these surveys, please do so immediately. If you were not personally contacted, please let the State Office know and we will follow up.

The Executive Committee and the State Officers discussed activities and venues that Granges could become involved in to financially benefit the Grange. Historically, cookbook sales were the answer – they initially generated funds to build a dorm on the Penn State University campus and continue to contribute to our Community Grange's treasury. In the past decade cookbook sales have declined and we still have inventory on hand. However, there are still folks asking if the Pennsylvania State Grange has a new cookbook or will have one soon. With the upcoming celebration of the 150th birthday of the Pennsylvania State Grange there is discussion of printing an anniversary cookbook. If this happens, there will only be a limited number of books printed so make sure you order the books immediately when offered.

Discussion also centered on selling a consumable product that would generate repeat sales. As a result of the discussion, we are running a trial market of Pennsylvania Grange Apple Butter at the PA Farm Show. By this time next year, we will know if it is feasible to roll out the program state wide offering each Grange the opportunity to sell Apple Butter and reap some funds for their Grange.

The Pennsylvania State Grange Family Festival event celebrated its 17th birthday when once again it convened at the Centre County Grange Encampment and Fairgrounds. Almost 200 Grange members enjoyed tenting, campers and RV's or staying in the local motels and participating daily in the fellowship and activities. Thank you to Betsy Huber for this great vision that has turned into a real live festival.

One task the Executive Committee must attend to each year is opening and closing Granges and the marketing of property. There is always celebration when we open or reorganize Granges. Concern is noted

when Granges make the decision to sell their buildings and property. Some Granges continue to flourish when the financial burden of buildings and property are removed but others struggle to keep meeting and active. There is always sorrow when Granges cease to exist, however we must uphold Grange law when insufficient numbers of members are on the role or the current members cease to meet we have to follow the precepts of our order and action must be taken. Our first line of action is to always attempt to rebuild the membership and create an active life within the Grange but unfortunately that does not always happen. We are quite excited that Granges that have been reorganized are alive, active and growing in membership.

We continue to see a decline in membership numbers - we now have less than 6,200 Grange members holding membership in 184 Community Granges in Pennsylvania. And those membership numbers have a direct correlation to dues payment which ultimately determines the revenue on which the Grange operates. Bottom line is we need more members to create greater income to insure the financial health of our organization. And that is up to each and every Grange member to seek new members to assure our organizations prolonged existence. Have you asked anyone to join in the past month, year???? Ask your neighbors, friends and family—you never know who might say yes!

Some years, we have been able to balance our budget because of Closed Grange Funds income. These are the funds that are held in a trust for seven years for each Grange when it relinquishes its-Charter and disposes of the property. Closed Grange Funds fluctuate from year to year and some years are very lean years, so the membership must generate sufficient funds to continue the level of programs and services that are presently funded. So the Executive Committee leaves you with this challenge; **Each Two, Get One** - a new member that is and then our membership would increase by 50% in the coming year and our financial concerns would be alleviated.

As I complete my third term and twelfth year as a member of the Executive Committee, I would like to say thank you to the Delegate body for entrusting me with this task. It was not always easy or pleasant, but at all times I strived to keep the precepts of the order as my guide in action. Thank you to the members of the Executive Committee for their services to this great organization. It has truly been an honor and a privilege to have served with each of you.

And on a personal note, thank you to my family for giving me a strong Grange foundation. A special Thank You to Glenn who has chauffeured me back and forth to most of the meetings and events and supported my endeavors. And Thank You to my kids and grandkids who understand when we miss birthdays, games and special events. Thank You all and may God Bless the Executive Committee in the coming years in all your work with the Grange and may God Bless and guide our wonderful organization!

REPORT OF TREASURER

Worthy State Master, National and State Officers, Delegates and Members of the Pennsylvania State Grange, it is a pleasure to bring you greetings from the office of Treasurer at this 147th Annual Session of the Pennsylvania State Grange.

Today, we are reviewing financial information for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019. My records, as well as the records of the Department Heads and State Office were forwarded to the accounting firm of Hamilton & Musser, P.C. in Mechanicsburg. The audit is being performed under the direction of Sharon Miller.

As your Treasurer, I am responsible for keeping the financial records of the following accounts: the Scholarship Funds including the Leonard Rhone Grant, Ellis M. Santee Loans, Subordinate Grange Trust Funds (for both Active and Closed Granges), Subordinate Grange Improvement Loans, Lifetime Membership, Property Account, Emergency Fund and a portion of the general assets of the Pennsylvania State Grange. I also manage the assets of the Pennsylvania State Grange Foundation.

Debbie Campbell, Pennsylvania State Grange Secretary, managed the day to day financial requirements of the State Office.

Scholarship Funds:

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019, one grant was awarded from the Leonard Rhone Scholarship Fund. This \$300 grant is available to Grange members in good standing. The student must attend Penn State and preference is given to those who pursue the study of agriculture or home economics (known today as Human Development and Family Services).

There were five (5) loans made during the past fiscal year from the Ellis M. Santee trust. One (1) was for \$1,000.00 and four (4) were for \$750.00. The late Ellis M. Santee, a country doctor from Shickshinny and an active Grange member, established the Santee Student Loan program. This student loan is available to members of the Grange or children of Grange members. The Santee Loan program operates on the interest earned on the investments and is administered by Wells Fargo. These loans are to be repaid within three (3) years of graduating from or leaving school and are interest free. The program depends on the student's repayment of the loans to ensure continuation of the program.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019, there were twenty-nine (29) students involved in the program. One (1) student was new to the program and one (1) student completed the repayment of their loan during the year. The education committee has decided to increase the size of the loans from a minimum of \$500 to a minimum of \$2,000 in hopes of attracting more applications and providing more help to people seeking additional education.

Applications are available from the State Treasurer and the State Office and can be downloaded from the Pennsylvania State Grange website, www.pagrange.org. This is one of our benefits that continues to be promoted to help add and retain younger members.

Subordinate Grange/Pomona Grange Trusts:

These are funds received by Subordinate and Pomona Granges from the sale of Grange real estate. The National Grange Digest requires that these funds are to be held in trust and invested by the State Grange with no less than 90% of the interest being returned to the Subordinate or Pomona Grange every six (6) months, as long as the Subordinate or Pomona Grange remains active. The Pennsylvania State Grange

returns 97%. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019, there were one hundred (100) Granges with invested funds. Thirty-Eight (38) of those Granges are closed. Five (5) had their assets transferred to the State Grange after having been closed for seven (7) years. One (1) Closed Grange added funds to the trust for the first time, one (1) Active Grange was granted the balance of its assets. One (1) Active Grange was moved to the Closed list and one (1) Closed Grange was reorganized and had its assets moved from the Closed list to the Active list.

Subordinate Grange Improvement Loans:

During the past year, the State Grange Master and Executive Committee continued the program of loaning funds to Subordinate Granges desiring to make improvements to their Grange properties. These funds are from the Subordinate Grange Trust funds from the sale of Granges who have surrendered their charters. These funds must be held in trust for seven (7) years in the event the Subordinate Grange would reorganize. This program invests Grange dollars back into Grange improvements. One (1) new loan was approved during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019 and one (1) Grange completed the repayment of its loan. There were five (5) Granges with loans in the program. Granges interested in utilizing this program must submit an application to the State Office for approval by the State Grange Master and State Grange Executive Committee.

Lifetime Members:

As of June 30, 2019, there have been a total of 1,600 members who have become lifetime members since the program's inception in 1984. We gained one (1) new lifetime member during the Grange fiscal year.

In closing, I thank you for your trust and confidence. The Executive Committee and I continue to look for ways to improve the return on investment for all assets of the Pennsylvania State Grange, the Active & Closed Grange Trust Funds and the Grant and Scholarship Funds. I will continue to work to keep the best interest of the Grange and its membership in mind when considering future investment options.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have reviewed the accompanying consolidating financial statements of Pennsylvania State Grange (a nonprofit organization) and Pennsylvania State Grange Foundation (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the consolidating statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets – modified cash basis as of June 30, 2019, and the related consolidating statement of support, revenue, and expenses – modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the consolidating financial statements. A review includes primarily applying analytical procedures to management's financial data and making inquiries of management. Our responsibility is to conduct the review engagement in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services promulgated by the Accounting and Review Services Committee of AICPA. Those standards require us to perform procedures to obtain limited assurance as a basis for reporting whether we are aware of any material modifications that should be made to the consolidating financial statements for them to be in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting. We believe that the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion.

Accountant's Conclusion

Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying consolidating financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting.

The consolidating financial statements are prepared in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Supplementary Information

The supplementary information included in pages 16-22 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic consolidating financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from, and relates directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the consolidating financial statements. The supplementary information has been subjected to the review procedures applied in our review of the basic consolidating financial statements. We are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the supplementary information. We have not audited the supplementary information and do not express an opinion on such information.

The accompanying supplementary information included in pages 23-28 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic consolidating financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management. We have not audited or reviewed such information, and we do not express an opinion, a conclusion, nor provide any assurance on it.

REPORT OF THE DEAF & COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE

Worthy State Master, National Representative, State Officers, Delegates and Guests: This year has been another exciting and rewarding year. I could not have done it without the help of my amazing Grange family. I would like to thank all the officers and staff at the State Grange Office for their continued support. I would also like to thank my committee of Samantha Gourley Charmo, Jimmy Knoerdel, Judy Shupp, Ruth Vonada, and Grace Wadsworth for their work, ideas, and support. Sadly, we did lose a committee member this year with Carol Kushma's passing. She was an active member of the committee and we surely miss her.

Last year at State Grange Session we collected boxes upon boxes of items for the Gleaners Food Bank and The Western PA School for the Deaf. THANK YOU for the overwhelming support. We sent 12 boxes to each of the locations. It was amazing to see your response. We were also successful with our book, CD and DVD sale at State Grange. We raised \$92 from this sale and sent \$100 to Dogs for Better Lives. Thank you to all that donated books and CDs and to all of those that purchased books and CDs.

Throughout the past couple of years, we implemented new projects across the state and continued to push you to work hard in your local communities to complete your service ideas. As you know, we have been raising money to sponsor an autism dog. We sent a check earlier this year for \$5000 to Perfect Fit Canines, located in Pittsburgh, PA.

In July, I was able to attend the state Junior Grange camp for the entire week. Samantha Charmo and I held a community service workshop. Each of the four groups completed a different project relating around the Disney theme. The fourth Bike-Hike was held on Saturday morning raise money to support Big Brothers Big Sisters in Centre County. A big thank you to all those that sponsored a biker or hiker as well as to those that participated in the event. During Family Festival we, again, sponsored a cake walk, which involved neither cakes, nor walking, and collected \$168.00. This money was also donated to Big Brothers Big Sisters of Centre County. In addition, half of the offering (\$124) from Sunday's church service was donated to Big Brothers Big Sisters. Next year we are considering doing a silent auction throughout the weekend to help raise funds for another organization. Please keep your eyes out for more information about this. Also, thank you to all those that donated to our Family Festival projects. We had a full table of items that our PA State Grange Junior and Youth royalty delivered to Pets Come First during the Family Festival weekend.

This year at State Grange Session we collected items for Centre Safe: Empowering Survivors, Eliminating Violence, formerly known as the Centre County Women's Resource Center (CCWRC) and the State College Food Bank. We had a heaping table full of donations, so thank you to all of the Granges or individuals who supported these collections. We will also be sending a check for \$250 to the State College Food Bank from the Sunday morning church service offering.

We also had the book, CD and DVD sale at State Grange session. We raised \$61.75. Money from this will be donated to Dogs for Better Lives. In addition, money from the offering (\$206) will be added to this amount and the committee will also add in another \$32.25 to have a total monetary donation of \$300 going to Dogs for Better Lives this year.

REPORT OF THE PA STATE GRANGE FOUNDATION

In 1994, at the State Session in Warren, Pennsylvania, the Pennsylvania State Grange Foundation was formed by delegate action. The main purpose of the Foundation then was to administer the two Grange scholarship funds established by delegate action. The Foundation has been amended twice since then to broaden its scope.

The Deaf & Community Service Department and the Pennsylvania State Grange Executive Committee oversee the Sign Language Training Program Scholarship Fund, from which a grant of \$250 is available each year. The balance of this fund as of June 30, 2019 is \$1,281.94. In 2019, we had no applications for this scholarship. We encourage anyone interested in furthering their education in this area to apply for a grant.

Also included within the funds of the Foundation is the Jonathan Sattazahn Camp Fund. The purpose of this fund is to enable more children and youth to attend the PA State Grange Junior and Youth Camps. The balance of this fund as of June 30, 2019 is \$12,000.00.

The Pennsylvania Grange Scholarship Fund provides for grants to be given to Grange members in their Junior or Senior years at any institution of higher learning, for any course of study. The State Grange

Executive committee administers the funds and the State Grange Treasurer invests the funds. A scholarship committee comprised of the State Overseer, one Executive Committee member, and three additional Grange members, at least one of whom is an educator, select the grantees. The balance in this fund as of June 30, 2019 is \$83,967.88 which includes the \$1,281.94 of the Sign Language Training Programs Scholarship Fund. The winners of this year's scholarships were –

REPORT OF THE HISTORY COMMITTEE

During the past year the History Committee continued its work to preserve the important historical documents of the Pennsylvania State Grange through microfilming (for permanent preservation) and digitizing (for easy access on the internet), initiated video interviews with Grange leaders, worked to strengthen Pennsylvania's first Grange and began looking toward the celebration of 150 years of the Grange in Pennsylvania.

Major accomplishments in records preservation include:

- Completed the final two phases of work to microfilm/digitize State Grange documents with IMR Digital:
 - Phase 2 - digitize *Journals of Proceedings* from existing microfilm & microfilm/digitize charter applications
 - Phase 3 - microfilm/digitize Executive Committee minutes, officer registers/directories and historical publications written for the State Grange's 50th, 75th, 100th and 125th anniversaries
- Finished posting of Phase 2 documents to Pennsylvania State Grange website in PDF format; visit <http://www.pagrange.org/history-committee.html>
- Updated quarterly the Charter Ledgers of all 2,110 Subordinate and 73 Pomona Granges organized in the state from 1871-present; available by Grange number, by county, by active Grange and by inactive Granges
- Wrote/posted historical summaries of significant events and accomplishments during the terms of State Masters Ringler through Campbell; summaries of all terms are now completed and posted

A very special thank you to Valley #1360, York County, for making a second very generous contribution during the year designated for the purchase of video recording equipment. The equipment is making it possible to record oral history and already a number of long-time Grange leaders have shared their thoughts and remembrances. The edited video clips will be valuable historical resources for future reference and anniversary celebrations.

In January 2019 State Master/President Campbell appointed the State History Committee to be responsible for planning the State Grange's 150th anniversary in 2023 and several meetings have been held since then to brainstorm possibilities. While no specific plans are ready to be announced just yet, we do envision the celebration taking place with special events around the state during 2021, 2022 and culminating at the state session in 2023.

The State History Committee was honored during March 2019 to lead a workshop on its work for the Mid-Atlantic Leaders' Conference held in Gettysburg, PA. A large group of Grange leaders from many states attended this presentation and expressed much interest in undertaking similar historical preservation work in their respective states.

Regretfully, there has not been much demand for 36-slide PowerPoint program highlighting the history of the National and Pennsylvania State Granges compiled and made available to Granges last year. This program is perfect for a local Grange meeting to share the Grange story with long-time members, newcomers and visitors. The presentation with speaker notes in PDF format is posted on the website for viewing and the original slide file in PowerPoint format may be obtained free of charge upon request to the History Committee.

Leadership and planning support from the State History Committee continued throughout the year for Eagle Grange #1, Lycoming County. This small struggling Grange has been continuously active since its organization in 1871 but needs some extra help now. Efforts are underway to both renew/grow this Grange and to plan for Eagle's 150th anniversary celebration in 2021 that will also serve as a kick-off for the State Grange's sesquicentennial observance continuing into 2023. A "Friends of Eagle Grange" program is currently underway providing Granges, businesses and individuals an opportunity to provide some financial support needed for renovations and improvements to the vintage Grange Hall that sits prominently along Route 15 south of Williamsport. You can visit the Eagle Grange table in the lobby of the hotel at this State Grange session to become a "Friend". Committee work planned for the coming year includes:

- Complete posting of Phase 3 records to the Pennsylvania State Grange website
- Maintain the on-line Charter Ledgers to reflect current status of all Granges
- Encourage local Granges to consider preserving their records through the IMR microfilming/digitizing contract
- Continue planning to celebrate the 150th anniversaries of Eagle Grange #1 in 2021 and of the State Grange in 2023
- Schedule more video interviews to record the recollections of Grange leaders

Our thanks to Brother Bill Steel for his service on this committee for the past couple years. Bill retired from the committee during the year after completing the summaries of State Master terms.

Again, sincere thanks are extended to all who have encouraged and supported the work of the History Committee so the Grange story is neither lost nor forgotten.

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE CONSULTANT

TESTIMONY/ADVOCACY

Following are some of the highlights of PA State Grange lobbying and advocacy for the 2019-20 legislative session which began in January 2019. This report does not contain new issues added after September 30, 2019.

TOPICS ON WHICH THE PA STATE GRANGE LOBBIED

Broadband was the Top Issue

- Broadband access was the top legislative priority for PA State Grange. In January 2019, we held a second program at the Farm Show which attracted a crowd and considerable media attention.
- **Legislation:**
 - Promoting installation standards for smaller scale wireless facilities - support
 - Inventory of state properties to see where there can be a cellular add-on in rural areas (such as fire towers) - support
 - Creation of a legislative commission focusing on Broadband – support
 - Oversight of a special Dept. of Education fund intended to expand Broadband access – support (not yet introduced)
 - Preserving landline access – support (not yet introduced)

- Building a firewall to prevent Broadband funds from being raided – support (not yet introduced)
- Broadband Fund established – support depending on where money comes from
- Working to get legislators to join the PA House Broadband Caucus
- **Verbal/Written Testimony to Legislative and Regulatory Committees:**
 - Senate Committee on Communications & Technology (Broadband)
 - House Consumer Affairs Committee (Broadband)
 - House Game & Fisheries Committee (Sunday hunting)
 - (Dairy) PA Milk Marketing Board testimony – support for over-order premium at several hearings

Got the word out to local Granges about legislative events where they could press the case for Broadband, Sunday hunting (and other issues) directly to lawmakers and Wolf Administration officials. Examples: Rep. Gleim (Cumberland); Rep. Schmel (Franklin); Senator Santisario (Philadelphia); Rep. Jones (York); Gov. Wolf in Mansfield (Broadband); Senator Aument (Sunday hunting); US Rep. Houlahan (Chester/Berks); MS4 hearings storm water management fees hearings in York, Franklin Butler Counties; Rep. Sappey (Chester); Senator Dinniman (Montgomery/Delaware); Secretary Redding (Lancaster); DEP public meeting on Restore PA (Lancaster and Lycoming Counties); Briefed Rep. Meuser staff to prep for Pomona Grange presentation

Although a good track record, this is just the start of our efforts to make sure there is universal access to Broadband in Pennsylvania. The Broadband issue is to this century as Rural Electrification was to the 20th Century. Not succeeding means that rural Pennsylvanians will be second-class citizens without the advantages going to others in today's ever more technology-oriented world.

SUCCESS HIGHLIGHTS

PA State Grange works hard to push for adequate funding for the PA Department of Agriculture, Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences, and University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine in the State Budget. For the current fiscal year which started July 1, 2019, agriculture did really well. Of course, next year is a new year where we will fight for this funding again.

House passage of Broadband inventory bill

Senate adoption of Broadband Task Force resolution

Another success was enactment of a series of agriculture bills collectively known as PA Farm Bill. Included was a Grange amendment to legislation establishing the PA Dairy Future Commission naming a farmer member of the PA State Grange to the Commission.

DISAPPOINTMENTS

There were some specific disappointments in this legislative session where ideas proposed by PA State Grange did not succeed.

- The Senate passed a Sunday hunting bill – Grange opposed.

- The General Assembly taking money out of dedicated funds to help balance the State Budget – Grange opposed
- Not enough action on reducing liability for farmers who use agri-tourism as a way to make ends meet and reducing liability for property owners who allow others to use their property recreationally for free – support limiting legal liability; **partial success** since bill was reported out by House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee
- Governor Wolf's veto of milk hauling legislation
- Lack of legislative action Securing a Property Tax exclusion for historic Grange Halls - support
- Lack of legislative action protecting the royalty rights of property owners with Marcellus Shale natural gas leases – support royalty rights

REPORT FOR THE PA GRANGE HERITAGE QUILT TRAIL COMMITTEE

As we celebrate the tenth anniversary of the Pennsylvania State Grange Heritage Quilt Trail there have been exciting things happening. Interest continues to be strong with Grangers and friends of the Grange who want to paint their own quilt block for their homes and businesses. Several “Paint Your Own Quilt Block” workshops were held across the state as well as the annual workshop at Family Festival.

At the 2019 PA Farm Show it was noted that the two 8’ x 8’ Quilt Blocks in the Cameron Street Lobby were removed when Giant became the corporate sponsor of the Expo Hall. After the Farm Show we approached the Farm Show personnel concerning remounting the two Quilt Blocks elsewhere in the complex. Farm Show personnel decided that the blocks would be placed in the McClay Street Lobby which is open to the public daily because of offices located in that area. And then, the Farm Show asked if the Grange would be willing to place additional Quilt Blocks throughout the Complex as well as create a 30’ showcase of Quilting History in the McClay Street Lobby. Of course, we said, “We’d be delighted!”.

The Showcase of Quilting History was completed in July with antique quilts, sewing items, a treadle sewing machine, wooden ironing board, sewing cabinets, a 1950 Singer Sewing machine and many quilts, patterns, and blocks. If you are in the Harrisburg area, stop in and see the exhibit. At this time, we are still working on signage for items in the case. Thank you to the many Grangers and friends of the Grange who responded to the call and donated items for the display.

The Grange committed to painting 100 Wooden Quilt Blocks (2' x 2') for the Farm Show Complex. Blocks have been painted by Grange members and friends of the Grange from all across the state. Several blocks were painted at Family Festival in July and along with those painted at home, we are happy to say that the first 50 blocks were delivered to the PA Farm Show Complex the first week of September. Now we hope the next 50 blocks are done and will be delivered by November 1! We strived to have a variety of patterns and colors so the blocks were drafted on the boards and along with the pattern and paints were distributed to folks. Thank YOU to all those who painted a block! It will be exciting to see where the blocks are mounted throughout the Farm Show Complex. Come to the 2020 Farm Show to see our blocks!

The Grange was also approached to create a block for the PA Department of Agriculture lobby. A 4' x 4' block was designed to honor the PA Preferred Program. The block features four keystones encompassing the PA Preferred Logo painted in yellow, blue, green and white.

REPORT OF THE LIFETIME COMMITTEE

The Lifetime Membership Committee of the Pennsylvania State Grange met on Thursday, August 29, 2019 at 9:00 a.m. at the State Grange Office in Lemoyne. The committee consisted of Martha Ebersole, Henry Seidel, and Debbie Campbell. Barbara Gross, Executive Committee Member and Wayne Campbell, Master were ex officios for the meeting.

Since the inception of the Lifetime Membership Program in 1984, the membership has reached a total of 1,600 members, including the addition of five members in fiscal year 2017-2018 and one member in fiscal year 2018-2019. There are 906 remaining Active Lifetime members as of September 14, 2019 and 85% of them are 55 or older.

The committee reviewed the current fees and considered new fees, but after much discussion, the committee decided to recommend that we no longer offer new Lifetime Memberships beginning January 1, 2020. This committee feels that the fees required to support current and future dues is too high, making the option unattractive. The current Pennsylvania State Grange budget actually subsidizes current Lifetime Memberships as dues increases over time have outpaced the earnings potential of the fund.

The committee also recommends that \$12,000.00 of the principal balance in the fund, be forwarded to the State Grange every year to help cover Lifetime Membership dues. Currently, 100% of the interest earned on the Lifetime Membership Fund is being forwarded to the Pennsylvania State Grange general fund on a quarterly basis.

This program should continue to be evaluated in three-year intervals, to determine if the \$12,000 principal reduction remains appropriate.

AGRICULTURE & ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES APPROVED RESOLUTIONS

Resolution #5 — Vertical Farming

Hookstown Grange #1980, Beaver County

RESOLVED: that the Pennsylvania State Grange and the National Grange adopt policy and lobby for legislation that intentionally supports the implementation, growth and sustaining of alternate non-traditional forms of food production such as aeroponic, hydroponic and vertical farming that are designed for high production with limited space.

Resolution #7 – Milk Hauling

REPORT OF THE AGRICULTURAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES COMMITTEE POLICY STATEMENT

Worthy Master, State Officers, Delegates, Distinguished Guests, Brothers and Sisters:

The members of the Agricultural and Environmental Issues committee are again honored to serve the members of the Pennsylvania State Grange. We have reviewed the resolutions presented to our committee with an open discussion and have presented them in a way that we feel best represents our members.

The Pennsylvania State Grange continues to support the **Pennsylvania Dairy Industry** with our efforts to:

1. Create and maintain Dairy Transparency within the Pennsylvania Milk Marketing Board and support similar legislation as it is introduced in the future to help keep prices sustainable for Pennsylvania producers.
2. Advocate for legislation to reintroduce Whole Milk in Pennsylvania's public schools.
3. Encourage restaurant, fast food and other trade groups to promote whole milk sales.
4. Exempt milk haulers from the restricted use of interstate highways during the threat of weather related State of Emergencies.

The Pennsylvania State Grange will continue to support the **Fair Packaging and Labeling act of 1967** to help insure truth in labeling of all food products to include Meat and Dairy that they not be deceptive as to their content or origin.

The Pennsylvania State Grange recognizes the need for an increased amount of food to accommodate a worldwide population growth and urges the National Grange to lobby for legislation that intentionally supports the implementation, growth and sustaining of alternate nontraditional forms of food production to include Aeroponic, Hydroponic and Vertical farming.

The Pennsylvania State Grange has supported efforts to maintain clean waters in the State of Pennsylvania by nutrient management programs for crop producers. There are significant amounts of nutrient and pesticide applied in urban and suburban applications subject to run off not currently being supervised.

The Pennsylvania State Grange recommends the Pennsylvania General Assembly require urban and suburban lawn care applicators follow the 4-R principals that Crop farmers now use.
(Right Source---Right Rate---Right Time---Right Place)

The Pennsylvania State Grange Opposes the implementation of (MS4 the creation of separate municipal sewer systems for storm water) and if implemented that Agricultural properties not be taxed or forced to participate other than the current storm water management plan for erosion control.

The Pennsylvania State Grange urges the ratification of the US / Canada / Mexico Trade Agreement enabling commodity trading to continue and maintaining a balance of competitive trade for North America.

FAMILY ISSUES POLICY STATEMENT

Worthy Master, National Representatives, State Officers, Delegates, and Guests:

The members of the Family Issues Committee would like to extend our thanks to the NC (North Central) – Centre, Clearfield, Clinton, Lycoming, Montour, Northumberland, Potter, Snyder, Tioga and Union. Counties for hosting this year's 147th Annual Pennsylvania State Grange Session. We would also like to thank Master Wayne Campbell and the Officers and Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania State Grange for their dedicated service to our organization.

When completing our assigned task of reviewing resolutions that affect our quality of life, the Family Issues Committee focuses on problems and concerns in education, health, consumer issues, and laws and regulations governing our standards of life and death. This year, the focus in our policy statement is on the affordability of prescription drugs and cyber school funding.

In a report issued by the AARP Public Policy Institute (PPI), it was found that retail prices for 754 widely used prescription brand name, generic, and specialty drugs increased faster than inflation every year from 2006 to 2017, and in 2017, the average annual increase in drug prices was 4.2 percent, double the rate of inflation. These increases are attributable to drug price growth among brand name and specialty drugs, which more than offset price decreases among generic drugs.

Spiraling drug prices have a major impact on the health care system and ultimately affect everyone by driving up health insurance premiums and increasing the costs of taxpayer funded programs such as Medicare. Medicare beneficiaries and taxpayers are footing the bill for unjustifiable drug price increases, as are those with private health insurance.

States, rather than the federal government, appear to be leading the fight against inflated drug costs. Thirty-three states have enacted new laws aimed at lowering the price of prescription drugs. These new laws include allowing safe importation of less expensive drugs from Canada, regulating Pharmacy Benefit Managers ([third-party administrators](#) of [prescription drug](#) programs for commercial health plans, self-insured employer plans, [Medicare Part D plans](#), the [Federal Employees Health Benefits Program](#), and state government employee plans), legislating drug price transparency, and promoting volume purchasing. Pennsylvania is not one of these 33 states. No legislation related to controlling drug prices has been enacted within the last 5 years in Pennsylvania. However, as of September 26, 2019, Pennsylvania does have 13 House or Senate bills and one House resolution in various stages of the legislative process relating to prescription drug pricing.

While the efforts of the states to lower drug prices is commendable, more aggressive federal action is essential, especially for taxpayer funded programs such as Medicare. Our Committee urges Grange members to contact their state and federal lawmakers to support common-sense prescription drug

pricing reform. For more information, follow AARP Public Policy Institute on Facebook or at www.aarp.org/ppi, and check the progress of legislation at legiscan.com or on the National Academy for State Health Policy website at nashp.org/rx-legislative-tracker-2019.

The Center for Research on Education Outcomes (CREDO), located at Stanford University released an independent study on June 4, 2019 which found that students attending online (cyber) charter schools represent a quarter of all students attending charter schools in Pennsylvania and concluded that cyber charter school students demonstrated remarkably weaker growth in both reading and math as compared to students in traditional public schools or in brick-and-mortar charter schools. CREDO's analysis of online charter schools revealed that, based on 180 days for an instructional year, the learning gap between an average traditional public school student and a cyber-charter school student equals 106 fewer days of learning in reading and 118 fewer days of learning in math. The poor performance of online charter school students holds true for special education students, poor students, and black and Hispanic students. The CREDO study concludes that "any potential benefits of online schooling such as student mobility and flexibility in curriculum are drowned out by the negative impacts on academic growth of students enrolled in such schools." The report also urges policy makers to determine if current oversight policies or practices for online charter schools are sufficient to assure adequate performance. There are currently 15 licensed cyber charter schools operating in Pennsylvania. Education Voters of PA, a nonpartisan, nonprofit statewide public education advocacy organization, recently (September 16, 2019) issued a report finding that school district payments to cyber charter schools in 2017-2018 amounted to \$519 million—primarily local taxpayer dollars. From 2015-2016 to 2017-2018, total cyber charter tuition expenditures grew by almost \$54.4 million, not because of increases in enrollment, but due to increases in the average per-student tuition rates. Charter school tuition rates are not based on what it costs a charter school to educate its students, but on the per student expenditure of the school district from which the student comes. This tuition can range from about \$7,800 per regular education student to as much as \$40,000 per special education student. Education Voters of PA estimates that the cost of instructing a regular education student in a cyber-charter school is less than \$5,000, and urges the legislature to reform cyber charter funding so that it matches actual costs in order to eliminate wasteful spending. School districts are being forced to raise property taxes and cut opportunities for students who attend schools in their communities so that cyber charter schools can spend money on advertising, excessive executive compensation and private management fees—money that should be used for educating students.

Misuse of taxpayer dollars has occurred by cyber charter schools' personnel. In 2014, the founder of PA Cyber, the state's largest cyber charter school, was sentenced to 20 months in federal prison after being convicted of siphoning \$8 million from the school to his other businesses. Also in 2014, two administrators from several charter schools under the same management umbrella, including Agora Cyber, pled guilty to defrauding the schools of \$6.5 million and conspiring to conceal the fraud from 2007-2011. One of the issues is that, while individual charter schools in Pennsylvania must be set up as nonprofit organizations, there is nothing to prohibit them from being run by for-profit organizations. It is specifically allowed in the current law. Another problem is that charter schools are not held as accountable, nor are they held to the same ethical and transparency standards as traditional public schools.

Currently, Governor Wolf is taking executive action, overhauling regulations, and proposing legislation to comprehensively reform charter school law. In early October, he announced the impending closure of the Philadelphia based Achieving Community Transformation (ACT) Academy Charter School, the lowest performing cyber school for 9th through 12th grade students in Pennsylvania.

As Grangers, we need to keep ourselves informed regarding any legislation designed to reform Pennsylvania's charter schools' rules and regulations. We need to support responsible legislative proposals so that all of the Commonwealth's students receive outstanding educations sustained by

fiscally responsible entities prudently using our tax dollars. For more information, visit educationvoterspa.org, credo.stanford.edu, and to track legislation, legiscan.com
