I am excited to report that Pennsylvania was represented well at the National Session in November. Jen Beamon, from Hamburg Grange #2013, performed during the Evening of Excellence. Ashley Mohn, from Marion Grange #1853, won Best of Show in the Photography Contest and represented Pennsylvania in the Photography Showcase. Congratulations!

Updates to the 2020-21 Guide to Contests and Programs

There are a few updates to the Lecturer's Contests and Programs since the Guide was printed. Contests and Programs were updated over the summer for publication, but a few challenges arose during judging that I would like to update moving forward. A revised copy of the guide will be available on the website.

First, starting in 2020, Lecturer's Reports and Scrapbooks will be judged separately. Ribbons will be awarded for 1st through 4th places for reports AND scrapbooks. Addi-

tionally, monetary prizes will be given for the 1st place winners in each class for reports (\$10) and scrapbooks (\$50). Community Night/Day (Open House) Reports will be judged as they have been with 1st place winners in each class receiving a plaque.

Second, the membership classes for Subordinate Lecturer's Reports/Scrapbooks and Community Night/Day (Open House) Reports were quite unbalanced this past year. In an effort to create more equitable competition, the membership classes have been revised to 1) Up to 50 members; 2) 51-99 members; and 3) 100 or more members.

Finally, this past year, we had no entries in the **Pen-in-Hand** contest. This is a great opportunity for members to showcase their creative writing skills. A new class has been added to replace the "Book/Film Review" class. The new class is **"My Favorite Grange memory..."** with a word limit of 500 words. So, the three classes for **Pen-in-Hand** are: 1) Poetry (300 words max); 2) Short Story (1,500 words max); and 3) My Favorite Grange Memory..." (300 words max).

Microfilming and digitizing of the third batch of State Grange records - officer rosters, Executive Committee minutes, and published histories - has been completed. Within the next few months these documents will be posted to the State Grange website at http:// www.pagrange.org/history-committee.html for easy access by any visitor to that site. Recently we have found some interesting newspapers and minutes from State Junior and Youth Camps and have decided to have these microfilmed/ digitized as funds will permit to remove the risk of this information being lost to the deterioration of time.

State Grange Auction

Thanks to the support of the State Grange Executive Committee which designated proceeds from the annual action at the state session to support the work of the History Committee, we now have \$2,434 in additional funds to continue our work. Most of this will be set aside as a "starter fund" for the 150th anniversary of the State Grange

coming up in 2023. Planning for this special occasion is shifting into high gear with hopes of kicking off some advance activities during the 2020 state session in Erie and at the 150th anniversary of Eagle Grange #1 in 2021.

Rhone Inducted into National Grange Hall of Fame

One of Pennsylvania's early Grange leaders - Leonard Rhone of Centre County - was recognized for his achievements at the recent National Grange session in Minnesota by being inducted into the Grange Virtual Hall of Fame, created in 2015 to recognize Grange members who had a significant role in the history of the National Grange. The nomination of Leonard Rhone was submitted by the State Grange History Committee over a year ago and we are pleased of his selection for this honor. He and his wife were charter members of Progress Grange #96. Brother Rhone was



tre County Fair. He rose through many Grange positions to become the third Master of the Pennsylvania State Grange from 1880-1989, was elected to the National Grange Executive Committee from 1888-1898 and served as its chair for



seven years, and also concurrently served as National Grange High Priest of Demeter from 1889-1895. He was one of the first to appear before Congress to testify in support of rural free delivery of mail.

Leonard Rhone was born July 21, 1838 in Potter Township near Centre Hall on the Rhone Homestead, now known as Rhoneymeade which was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1985. He studied at Kishacoquilla Academy and after teaching for a

> vear, became a farmer by choice. In 1864 he married Mary Margaret Sankey, a neighbor girl. He later purchased the other heirs' interests to the farm. Leonard was elected as a Trustee of PA State College in 1880 and appointed on important commissions by various Governors. also was elected to the Pennsylvania State Legislature during his term as Master of the State Grange, serving two twoyear terms (1885-86 and

1887-88). While serving in the Legislature, he was a champion for agriculture and good government, and secured increased appropriations for public schools in an effort to equalize taxation. Although

SUNDAY HUNTING HEATS UP

On October 30, the PA House voted for Senate Bill 147 which would allow Sunday hunting in PA. Even though the bill was passed, Pennsylvania State Grange wants to publicly thanks those lawmakers who voted no. They realize that Sunday hunting simply will NOT solve the problem of declining numbers of licenses sold in PA and nationally.

Pennsylvania State Grange has been very active on this issue and did not abandon its original position to oppose Sunday hunting. During the legislative process, the bill was amended to include some property owner privacy restrictions to neutralize some of the opposition. The Pennsylvania State Grange holds that the core issue is not a repairs-all amendment. The basic question is rather whether or not Sunday hunting should be permitted at all.

A major reason has to do with Sunday hunting not addressing longer-term causes for less interest in hunting. In a letter to legislators, the Pennsylvania State Grange said, "Although some feel that a compromise deal was possibly struck and so the committee can sigh with relief, then vote the bill out, and move on to other matters, we ask that you not make a hasty vote. A vote now does not address long-term issues affecting hunting in Pennsylvania. These longer-term problems will not be resolved by Senate Bill 147 or by simply amending language on property rights."

Of these, 24 are from predominately rural areas, 11 represent urban areas, and 19 are from mixed rural/suburban areas. Six are members of the PA Legislative Black Caucus.





The letter continues: "The number of licenses in PA and elsewhere is declining and has for years. Proponents of Sunday hunting at the hearing were unable to point to solid evidence that Sunday hunting generated more license activity. It was conjecture and frankly wishful thinking."

Pennsylvania State Grange instead prefers House Resolution 593 which directs the Legislative Budget & Finance Committee to study the root causes for the decline in hunting. Knowing why gives the General Assembly tools to more precisely look for remedies. The Pennsylvania State Grange asked legislators to take a look at the Resolution sponsored by avid hunter and Game & Fisheries Committee member Dave Maloney (R-Berks). Rep. Maloney's legislation is a constructive alternative to Senate Bill 147. In addition, Pennsylvania State Grange advocates Senate passage of House Bill 102. This would permit hunting education classes to be held after school hours in school buildings. Hopefully, this will help familiarize a new generation about hunting as a recreational sport which also helps fund wildlife management and preservation efforts.

BROADBAND IS TRUE HEALTH REFORM

Pennsylvania Grange President Wayne Campbell sent the following letter on Broadband to media in Pennsylvania. It was used in numbers of publications including Lancaster Farming magazine.

Dear Editor:

The current buzz in Washington and with Democratic presidential candidates is Medicare for All supported by Senators Bernie Sanders and Elizabeth Warren. Other candidates such as Joe Biden prefer sort of a Medicare for All - Lite called the Public Option which increases Federal control of the U.S. health care system, although not by as much as the single payer plans advocated by Sanders and Warren.

As someone who lives in rural Pennsylvania, I would ask for the Federal Government and Congress to step back and rethink these plans. We have had a great deal of Federal experimentation since 2010 and frankly, rural health care needs a breather. Rural areas face difficulties such as lack of providers, distance between patients and health care facilities, and high cost to patient ratios because of a smaller population base. Massive new Federal intrusion would most certainly bring new workability issues as well as probably trying to reinvent how people receive and pay for health care.

Rather than having another massive Federal makeover of our health care system, I suggest that we let cost-savings innovations of telemedicine continue to evolve. Already, a patient can have direct consultation and diagnostic testing done without the person having to leave his or her home. Medical advances of telemedicine have been dramatic to rural residents' benefit.

However, telemedicine does not work where there is no or little access to the Internet or smart phones. This has been called the Digital Divide where rural areas are disadvantaged without access to adequate technology. Instead of considering Medicare for All or the Public Option, perhaps Congress should instead focus on how to achieve universal access to Broadband. That approach would certainly reduce health care costs through telemedicine and it is more down to earth than new grand plans envisioned by some in Washington.

Granted, rural health care issues transcend whether or not telemedicine is THE answer. But it is one answer that could be fully realized if Congress makes Broadband a reality in rural America. Policymakers in Congress should look at the big picture and think outside their box Sincerely,

MID-ATLANTIC SOYBEAN ASSOCIATION APPLAUDS US-JAPAN TRADE DEAL

Mechanicsburg, PA...

The Mid-Atlantic Soybean Association (MASA) applauded the successful conclusion of trading negotiations between the United States and Japan with the signing of the U.S. – Japan Trade Agreement by President Trump, October 7.

"The U.S. – Japan Trade Agreement cements an excellent trading relationship," said executive director Vince Phillips. "The Trade Agreement will provide America's farmers and ranchers enhanced market access in our third largest agricultural export market".

Japan is one of the top ten markets for U.S. soybeans. Of specific interest to soybean growers is a staged reduction of Japan's tariff on soybean oil. According to the American Soybean Association, the two counties have an excellent trading relationship regarding soybeans with the United States being the largest soybean supplier to Japan, with soybean exports totaling \$976 million in 2017.

This was one of two agreements with Japan, the other on digital trade. The White House issued the following regarding the agricultural part of the Agreement:

• This is a tremendous victory for American farmers, as they

will have expanded access to a fairer market to export their products.

Japan is our third largest agricultural export market and accounted for \$14.1 billion in food and agricultural exports in 2018.

- Japan will eliminate or reduce tariffs on approximately \$7.2 billion in United States agricultural exports.
 - Japan will eliminate or significantly lower tariffs on American beef, pork, poultry, wheat, cheese, wine, ethanol, and more.
- Once this agreement is implemented, over 90 percent of United States agricultural imports into Japan will be duty free or receive preferential tariff access.

GRANGE SUPPORTS DAIRY ZONES

Special zones in general generate opportunities for business investment needed in a particular locale. Certainly, they have been found to be tried and true successes in stimulating business investment. Rep. John Lawrence (R-Chester) has introduced House Bill 1223 to create special zones to help the Dairy Industry.

While also creating geographic zones, House Bill 1223 recognizes that incentivizing to focus on one industry can achieve focused results. Dairy is the cornerstone of PA Agriculture. As such, it makes sense to attract resources through incentives to strengthen this core. That is the underlying rationale. Several advantages follow.

First, PA's rural areas need economic development. ing Keystone Opportunity Dairy Zones will stimulate business investment, create jobs, and sustain the local tax base. Presumably, numbers of these enterprises will come from PA entrepreneurs themselves -- particularly if they already know the area. Pennsylvania State Grange holds that local or regional ownership is best because the firm owners have a vested interest in seeing Pennsylvania thrive. With all respect to national firms, PA may be one location out of many and as such, PA is one piece of a larger business



plan, subject to corporate change. We hope that Keystone Opportunity Dairy Zones will be a magnet for Pennsylvania investment with staying power

Second, transportation costs are reduced if the processing facility is closer to the farmer. Everyone benefits with local or regional in-state facilities. Savings add up to reduced costs. In addition, having processing done here means that processing money stays in Pennsylvania, thus helping our state's overall business climate.

The third reason is that many dairy farmers may be somewhat unclear as to the over-order premium and what revenue they will receive. Currently, as we understand it, these monies are calculated on milk that is produced by PA dairy farmers that stays in PA. If shipped out of state, that is not part of the revenue calculation. One approach is to clarify the rules so that farmers better see how the over-order premium is calculated. Another approach is to keep PA dairy farmers' milk in the state by encouraging more processing capability here. PennsylvaniaState Grange has not done the statistical research to back this up, for example, knowing how many fluid milk facilities would start up in PA versus a cheese processing plant. spite that disclaimer, we believe that dairy farmers will receive additional over-order premium income if the milk stays in the state. House Bill 1223 can help make that happen.

he had many demands on his time due to this extensive involvement in Grange and elected positions, he had a successful farm and took part in local cooperatives. He died September 25, 1917 in Centre Hall and is interred in the local Reformed & Lutheran Cemetery. The Rhone Scholarship Fund of the Pennsylvania State Grange was established in his memory by his daughters.

Original Medicare, Part A and Part B, is a government health insurance program for those who qualify by age or disability.

- Part A is hospital insurance
- Part B is medical insurance

There are some out of pocket costs associated with Original Medicare, such as deductibles, coinsurance, and copayments. To help with those costs, there are two commonly used options used to supplement or replace Original Medicare and both are offered by private insurance companies. These plans have significant differences with regards to costs, benefits, and how they work. It is very important to understand these differences when you review your Medicare coverage options. Medicare Supplement insurance, also known as Medigap coverage, functions as a secondary coverage to Medicare and may cover costs like deductibles, copayments, coinsurance, and emergency medical care while traveling outside of the United States. There are 10 standardized plan types, each given a letter designation. Plans of the same letter offer the same coverage regardless of the company it is purchased from, but premiums can and will vary greatly. Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin offer their own standardized Medicare Supplement plans. Current Medicare SuppleConfused About Medicare?
The great people over at ASA have put together a brief description of some of the highlights of Medicare coverage for us.

ment plans do not include prescription drug coverage.

Medicare Advantage plans are an alternative way to receive your Medicare benefits through a private, Medicare approved insurance company. They must

include all your Medicare Part A and Part B coverages, but they may offer additional benefits not included in Original Medicare, such as vision, dental, hearing services and prescription drug coverage. Medicare Advantage plan costs and coverages vary greatly and it is suggested that you shop around to find a plan that will fit your needs as there are many different types of Medicare Advantage plans. To be eligible to enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan, you must be enrolled in Original Medicare, reside in the plan's service area, and not have End Stage Renal Disease (ESRD).

> What Can You Tell Me About Part D???

Medicare Part D is prescription drug coverage and beneficiaries have the option to enroll in Part D if they are enrolled in Medicare Part A and/or Part B and live in the service area of the plan. Medicare Part D is available through private companies that are contracted by Medicare, so costs, coverages, and availability varies between companies, plans, and location. If you do not enroll in Medicare Part D when you're first eligible and you go without creditable coverage for 63 days or more, you could face a

late enrollment penalty if you sign up for Part D later on. There are many different Part D plans available and each one has its own formulary (list of covered drugs) so it is extremely important to make sure you enroll in the proper

drug plan.




May

Looking Toward 150th

With the microfilming and digitizing of State Grange records finished except for future documents, the efforts of the History Committee are now directed toward the 150th anniversary of the organization of the Pennsylvania State Grange. Although the Grange came to Pennsylvania in March, 1871 with the formation of Eagle #1 in Lycoming County, the initial

movement was slow becoming established so it was not until September 18, 1873, that representatives from 22 of the 25 local Granges organized in the State up to that time met in Reading to formally organize the State Grange.

So, starting in 2021 with the 150th anniversary of Eagle

Grange #1 and continuing through 2023, Pennsylvania Grangers will be celebrating this significant historical milestone. State President Campbell last year appointed the History Committee to be in charge of the anniversary observance and numerous brainstorming/planning meetings have already taken place. The goal of the celebration will be:

• To educate Grange members and public about the signifi-

cant history and accomplishments of the Grange in Pennsylvania,

- To inspire current Grange members and renew their commitment to advancing the order, and
- To reach out to the larger community with a message about the Grange and its purposes today.

As this article is being written in early January (2020), contacts are being made for the kick-off event to be held in Lycoming County on a Saturday in April, 2021. Tentatively, an open house

Pennsylvania, that same light will be distributed to every county and into every active Grange.

A resolution passed by the delegates at the 2019 annual State Grange session approved the location of the 2023 session to be Reading, PA where the State Grange was organized and where the 75th, 100th and 125th anniversary celebrations were held. The normal convention hosting responsibilities by geographic regions of the state will be suspended for that year and all Granges in Pennsylvania will be called upon to provide the manpower and fi-

nancial resources to make a really special session possible. At this point, plans are in the early stages for a historical pageant, special acts of service, an anniversary banquet and the conferral of the Fifth and Sixth Degrees in full form (including the beautiful and uniquely Pennsylvania Ceres,

Pomona and Flora drills).

Watch for more details to be announced in the next issue and to learn about ways for every Grange and every member to become involved in the recognition of a century and a half of service

Tucked away in rural Richmond Township, northern Berks County, Pennsylvania, is a registered historic district of about fifty homes and a hundred and fifty residents. The Maiden Creek meanders south towards Reading, Pennsylvania, and is surrounded by fertile farmland and lush forests. An early Native American trading post and once a hub of activity during the robust days of the railroad, the thriving hamlet turned sleepy village named Virginville is no different from many small communities across the state.

Yet headquartered since 1950, in a modest building once housing the local fire department, is Virginville Grange, a community level organization of the Pennsylvania State Grange. Boasting nearly four hundred members, the Virginville chapter holds the largest membership body in the state and is a leading contender nationally. This year will mark a major milestone as Virginville Grange celebrates its centennial!

Many local level Granges sprung up in this region during the early twentieth century as news of the benefits of the national fraternal order for farm families spread. Early examples of influence included road improvements, electrification, and rural mail delivery. Although many members still have a direct connection to agriculture, the order has evolved and offers benefits for all of rural America. Today, National Grange is a major advocate for increased internet access in less populated areas of the country.

Eighty-nine men and women signed their names and chartered the Virginville establishment on February 24, 1920. The young Grange grew quickly as the membership, made up of predominately faith-based Pennsylvania German farmers, found a place for socialization and a broad range of services. Not conflicting with religion, the Grange in fact reinforced their beliefs through ritual by presenting the American flag and opening the Bible at each meeting.

In 1924, Virginville Grange began doing business with Eastern

States Farmer's Exchange, a program allowing members to receive discounts for bulk orders of feed and supplies. Grangers served as agents for the exchange, and shipments came to town every two weeks by rail. This successful program continued until 1967.



Funnel Cake

Nearly seventy years ago, Virginville members began offering funnel cakes at a local folklife festival held in nearby Kutztown, Pennsylvania. This was the first time the homemade confection was offered in a commercial setting. This tradition is still carried on by Virginville members during the nine-day event each summer.

In 1954, a quilt made by Virginville members won first place in a National Grange contest of more than 500 entries. Filled with Grange pride, members traveled to Washington, DC, to present this work of art to Mamie Eisenhower, the first lady of the United States of America.

More smiles for the group came in 1957 when Virginville Junior Grange was chartered to offer the Grange experience to children ages five to fourteen. Honored with the prestigious Junior Grange of the Nation Award in 1984, this segment continues today at the same level of prosperity as its parent.

Looking for more fund-raising ideas, members filled roles in a home-spun play written by a fellow member. The entire production was

recited exclusively in the Pennsylvania Dutch (German) dialect and presented for the first time in 1958. The three-act comedy was revived in 1985 and 2011 and has proven to be one of the largest fund-raising events, raising \$10,000 in 2011 alone.

Each year since 1959, thousands of people have enjoyed Virginville's longest running event, an all-you-can-eat Mother's Day feast served annually at the Grange hall. Various other banquets, fairs, festivals, sandwich sales, and public auctions have provided opportunities as well.

In 1997, members organized a farm safety day to raise awareness of agricultural related hazards in a rural setting to hundreds of members of the community. The event was so successful it captured the group the highest community ser-

vice award at National Grange that year.

The loss of generations sparked a need to document local history of the village and surrounding area, so members became involved during 2002-2003 in the creation of a local hardbound history book entitled The History of Virginville. The Grange backed the project financially and sales reached one thousand copies.

Extreme Makeover Home Edition, the renowned ABC reality television show, came to nearby Hamburg, Pennsylvania, in 2010, to surprise a family and build them a new home in one week. Virginville Grangers pitched in by preparing a buffet-style meal served on site for the production staff and volunteers.

Over the years as the organization grew, so did the need for more space. Numerous additions and improvements have been made to the real estate. Most recent renovations during 2006-2007 boasted a generator, handicapped facilities, and an elevator setting the stage for the Grange hall to be a local emergency shelter.

Virginville's proudest outreach

moments are those dedicated to others. Years ago, members assisted those in need by harvesting crops, sharing food, or making repairs to buildings and equipment. In recent decades, barbecue chicken dinners, dances, raffles, and bingos are dedicated to barn fires, illnesses, accidents, misfortunes, law enforcement agencies, emergency

response outfits, and other local non-profit efforts keeping members busy as they happily work together like a well-oiled machine to produce charitable funds in excess of \$100,000. In 2015, a benefit bonanza, including a raffle, bingo and dance, raised \$25,000 in honor of a seventeen-year-old Virginville Granger who successfully battled Hodgkin's lympho-

ma. The funds were paid forward by the member to three charities who supported her through her journey.

The highlight of Virginville's year is Community Night, drawing a crowd of 250 to the first meeting



BROADBAND AGAIN TAKES CENTER STAGE

On two occasions at the 2020 Farm Show, the Pennsylvania State Grange pressed the case for universal access to high-speed Broadband. These included a hearing of the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee. The second was a panel discussion convened by the Grange to discuss several success stories in this quest.

HOUSE HEARING

Pennsylvania State Grange President Wayne Campbell presented testimony as part of a panel which also included PA Farm Bureau, PA Farmers Union, PA Association for Sustainable Agriculture and PennAg Industries Association.

The bulk of Campbell's testimony centered on Broadband. He compared the need of expanding Broadband access in this century to rural electrification in the 20th Century. Lack of universal access puts rural Pennsylvania way behind -- in production agriculture, in education, in economic investment, in health care, and in the conduct of everyday lives. That description sounds like rural America in the early part of the 20th Century before rural electrification.


The elephant in the room is how to pay for it.

The House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee was challenged by Campbell to introduce a res-

olution directing the Legislative Budget & Finance Committee or the Center for Rural PA to analyze funding options. Although the Grange is not endorsing a particular funding mechanism, one possibility cited by the Pennsylvania State Grange was a minimal surcharge from each cell phone per month. This option would need to include millions of cell phones in order to be viable. Nationally, for example, the March 20, 2018 Media Tech Reviews predicts 276.7 million cell phone subscribers in the U.S. in 2020. Since cell phone subscribers typically have more than one cell phone, the actual

numbers could be much higher. The number of Pennsylvania cell phones has not been verified – hence, a need for the study.

Wayne Campbell lauded House passage of **House Bill 305** sponsored by Rep. Pam Snyder (D-Greene/Fayette/Washington) as a positive step. This legislation requires that Pennsylvania inventory state-owned structures to see if a telecommunications company could 'piggyback' equipment on a tower. If feasible, the telecom company would pay the Commonwealth a leasing fee.





Another accomplishment is the creation of the bipartisan House Broadband Caucus last session by Representative Pam Snyder and former Representative and now Senator Kristin Phillips-Hill. This session, the Republican co-chair is Representative Rich Irvin (R-Mifflin/Huntingdon/Centre). Hopefully, this Caucus will help legislators stay focused on this critical issue.

Currently, the House Broadband Caucus has 23 members. The group is bipartisan and includes twelve members from rural districts, five from suburban areas, and six from cities.

OTHER ISSUES PRESENTED BY THE PENNSYLVANIA STATE GRANGE

There were several other issues stressed by President Campbell at the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee hearing.

Agritourism. First and foremost was House Bill 1348 sponsored by Rep. Barb Gleim (R-Cumberland). This would limit liability for farms seeking an additional income stream from agritourism or agrientertainment. This limited liability would apply providing that visitors were warned about possible risks on a working farm and there were reasonable attempts to remove obvious hazards. Despite pushback by the trial lawvers, this legislation passed the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee unanimously on June 5, 2019. Assuming that it passes the House, the PA Senate will also have to consider the bill before it goes to Governor Wolf for his signature.

Dairy. While HB 1348 helps farmers in the longer term, an immediate need is more investment in PA-based regional dairy processing facilities. Fortunately, House Bill 1223 was introduced by Rep. John Lawrence (R-Ches-

Quick Guide to Broadband Legislation

Given the increased interest in Broadband by the General Assembly, here is a handy listing of some of the Broadband bills supported by the Pennsylvania State Grange.

House Bill 305 and Senate Bill 470 (Snyder; Phillips-Hill)

Requires the state to inventory state-owned structures to determine which would be appropriate for 'piggybacking' telecommunications equipment. PA would lease the space on the structure for a fee. State Police structure leasing income would be dedicated to help fund State Police.

Senate Resolution 47 and House Resolution 64 (Phillips-Hill; Sny-

Establishes a bicameral legislative task force to focus on Broadband expansion.

Senate Resolution 48 and House Resolution 63 (Phillips-Hill; Sny-

Directs that non-rural telecommunications companies be audited to determine their compliance with existing laws regarding provision of Internet service.

House Bill 2055 (Snyder)

Allows municipal authorities to deploy Broadband Internet Infrastruc-

Senate Bill 835 (Langerhole)

Establishes a dedicated fund of not less than 10 million dollars to provide grants for expansion of Broadband to unserved areas.

Senate Bill 725 and House Bill 1585 (Yudichak; Wheatly)

Governor Wolf's Restore PA would borrow \$4.5 billion loan to be repaid by Marcellus Shale natural gas severance tax.

Senate Bill 712 (Argall)

Fiscal Code bill which includes specific monies for two north central PA economic development entities to develop a regional Broadband system. Status: Act 20 of 2019

House Bill 1400 (Farry)

Standardizes 'colocation' installation standards for small cell facilities (expanding Broadband in a limited range).

NOT YET INTRODUCED: (Irvin)

Preserves land line telephone service to rural areas (Universal Service Fund).

ter) to establish PA Dairy Keystone Opportunity Zones. These are designated areas within the state where investors in dairy processing could receive a variety of tax credits and other incentives.

Creating Dairy Keystone Opportunity Zones should incentivize investment in PA-based milk processing facilities. The legislation offers two benefits to farmers in addition to helping a local economy. First, a regional facility means less travel expense for milk

transport. Second, it will boost dairy farm revenues by allowing a greater over-order premium going back to the farmer. Currently, that revenue is often lost because the milk is produced in PA but processed out of state, meaning that the farmer loses out on the over-order premium income.

One point emphasized by Campbell was the need to take care of unfinished business from 2019. He said, "One thing that was unresolved in 2019 was "Government" continued on page 24

the issue of milk hauling. As you know, Governor Wolf vetoed House Bill 915 sponsored by Chair Causer. Another milk hauling bill, Senate Bill 588 sponsored by Senator Judy Ward from Blair County, also passed the Senate and is now in this committee. The question is what will finally happen to resolve When severe winter this issue. weather comes, milk haulers must still pick up milk from local dairy farms since farmers generally do not have a large storage capacity. This milk must then be transported to processing plants without delay. The committee should re-examine this issue and decide if the need warrants more legislative action."

GRANGE ISSUES THANK YOU TO REP. KELLER

The Pennsylvania State Grange issued a statement recognizing the service of Perry County Representative Mark Keller. Keller, a Republican, announced his decision not to seek re-election. The Grange lauded him for helping other legislators better understand the realities of farming today given his practical knowledge from farming. Keller is serving out the remainder of his term which ends November 30, 2020.

When President Campbell also publicly thanked Rep. Keller, before the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee, the other legislators gave Keller an ovation.

Several other lawmakers with a strong interest in Grange issues have also announced plans to retire.

They include Rep. Marcia Hahn (R-Northumberland), a member of the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee and Rep. Garth Everett (R-Lycoming). Everett is the current Chair of the House State Government Committee. Of note to Granges in areas where Marcellus Shale natural gas

is being extracted, Everett has introduced legislation forcing energy companies to pay property owners the full amount of royalties required by state law. Hahn and Everett will complete the rest of their terms this year.

THE GRANGE WANTS YOU TO BE RESOLVED

The Pennsylvania State Grange is responsive to its members. Lobbying and advocacy is based on what members say they want. In a nutshell, here is how Grange policy is set.

- What is the Need? What is important to you as a Grange member? Policy positions cover a wide range of topics.
- What is the Answer? If you identify a problem, do you have an idea as to how to confront the problem?
- How do I get my idea/solution to the point of being considered by the Pennsylvania State Grange?
 - Put it in writing. that means is using a certain format to express your thoughts. This format is designed so that readers can see the need (these are the WHEREAS clauses) and the policy you want the Grange to adopt (the BE IT RE-SOLVED clauses).
 - Utilize State Grange staff to help you draft it. Usually, this is a five to ten-minute conversation. Then, you receive a draft. Keep in mind that when you receive a draft, it is a draft. Make it yours. Review it to be sure that the draft language is true to your point. Again, staff will help re-draft if needed.
 - Take your draft resolution to your Grange and talk with others. Your Grange needs to make a decision to move the resolution on to the state

- level. Resolutions may come from Pomona Granges as well.
- Resolution Committee. On September 17, 2020, the Pennsylvania State Grange will convene a meeting of the different resolution committees to review each resolution. This Resolution meeting is made up of specific committees. Committees are organized as to subject matter, for example, agriculture. The committee can choose to favorably report the resolution to the Delegate Body, may reject, or amend. Please understand that if the committee rejects a resolution, it does not have the final word. Delegates to the October State Session do.
- · At the State Session, delegates consider each resolution. The State Session can adopt the resolution to become state policy. It can reject it. It can overrule the recommendation of the resolutions committee and adopt a resolution anyway. It can also amend a resolution. That is how Grange policies are set.
- At the State Session, some older resolutions are retired and put in archives when their original purpose is irrel-

evant. An example in 2019 was the retiring of a resolution that was approved as policy in 2006. The text and explanation of this archived resolution follows.

MEDICARE USE OF SOCIAL SE-**CURITY NUMBERS**

The Grange supports the implementation of a Federal law mandating that the Medicare system use an identification number other than the individual's Social Security number and supports the universal implementation of such a law across all insurance provid-

REASON FOR ARCHIVING

Beginning in 2018, the Social Security Administration converted Medicare identification numbers to another numbering system.



... Farm Show Quilt Display Case

In 2012 the Pennsylvania State Grange placed two 8' x 8' wooden quilt blocks in the Cameron Street Lobby pf the Pennsylvania State Farm Show Complex in honor of 4-H and FFA. In 2019 the Giant Corporation took over sponsorship of the Expo Hall just off of the Cameron Street Lobby and the quilt blocks came down. In April of 2019 Lizzie Bailey and Barbara and Glenn Gross met with the Farm Show Administrators, Sharon Altland Myers and Heidi Svonavec, to ask if the blocks could be placed somewhere else in the complex. At the conclusion of that meeting not only were the two blocks going to be remounted, we also had agreed to make 100 small 2' x 2' wooden quilt blocks to be placed throughout the complex as well as decorate a 30' display case with quilting history! Upon leaving the complex, our first reactions were, "Oh my, what did we agree to?"

The 30' display case is located in the McClay Lobby which is open

daily to the public since offices are located in that portion of the building. The two original quilt blocks For many, it was the quilting tools we had all gotten rid of but now again were searching for.



honoring 4-H and FFA are mounted in this area anchoring each end of the lobby. You are welcome to stop in any time and view the blocks and display case.

The McClay Lobby display case features quilting items and tools from the 1850s through the

1950s. It is the "things" our mothers and ancestors held dear because it was the tools of their trade. In order to create this display, Grangers searched their own stashes as well as second hand stores and appealed to friends for quilt related items.

In the 1850s quilting was done out of necessity - quilts were not only used for warm bed coverings but were often used as room dividers and covers over windows and walls to keep out the cold. Ouilts were made from scraps of fabric left over from making clothing with little thought to coordination of colors and accuracy of design, quilts were made for utility purposes only. The quilt on the frame in the display case is an excellent example - no coordination of fabric colors and no attention to aligning the blocks when piecing them together. This quilt is pinned on a large wooden quilting frame with small metal straight pins while wooden pins hold the corners the frame together to keep it square. The quilt is made in the typical sandwich style of a decorative top, cotton batting and a fabric backing. If ladies did not have enough floor

- 3. Best of Show winner from the previous year may not enter the Talent Contest in the same class the following year.

Ribbons will be awarded to the top three entries in each class. First place entries in each class will receive \$25.00; second place - \$15.00; third place - \$10.00. A Best of Show winner will be selected from across all classes.

REPORTS AND CONTESTS

Now is the time to work on preparing your reports and contest entries for the State Session in October. Please reference the 2020-2021 Guide to Contests and Programs that was distributed to your Granges last October and is on the website (pagrange.org). Reports and Scrapbooks are due to me by September 15th.

New for this year are the "Design a Program" contest and the "Lecturer's Grant". The "Design a Program" contest is open to all Grange members. Entries should include a detailed plan for the program, including the name of the program, what materials are needed, an outline of the program, the number of participants, and the length of the program. Entries are due to me by September 15th. Winning programs will receive a



monetary award of \$30 for first place, \$20 for second place, and \$10 for third place. All entries will be compiled into a "Lecturers' Idea Book," which will be available to Lecturers and other members.

The "Lecturer's Grant" aims to provide support for those Lecturers who are preparing – or who would like to prepare – high-quality programs, but may lack the financial resources to make them a reality. The "Lecturer's Grant" will provide at least one grant of \$100 to winning Lecturers. Entries should include a program proposal, budget proposal, and a brief letter of need (500 word maximum). Entries are due to me by September 15th for judging prior to the State Session.





The State Grange's 150th anniversary celebration, beginning with the April 2021 kick-off and continuing through the 2023 session in Reading, PA will be a significant milestone and one that requires a significant amount of funding to be raised. Delegates at the 2019 state session approved a resolution that suspends the normal convention hosting responsibilities by geographic regions of the state and calls upon all Granges in Pennsylvania to provide the manpower and financial resources to

make a really special session possible. At this point, plans are in the early stages for a historical pageant, special acts of service, an anniversary banquet and the conferral of the Fifth and Sixth Degrees in full form (including the beautiful and uniquely Pennsylvania Ceres, Pomona and Flora drills). A fund raising campaign was started earlier this spring at the regional leadership conferences, inviting Granges and individual members to sponsor one or more of the anniversary candles to light our birthday cake. This initial project provides the opportunity to purchase one of 150 candles at any of 150 amounts of support - \$1 for candle #1 through \$150 for candle #150. Some candles have already been purchased; you can find out what candles remain and how to make your contribution by contacting: Steve & Karen Mohn, 308 Mill Road, Womelsdorf, PA 19567. Our goal is to have all candles sponsored and the cake ablaze by the time of the state session in Erie this fall.

Friends of Eagle Grange – Last fall an appeal was issued asking for financial assistance to Eagle Grange #1, Lycoming County. It if from this Grange that the Patrons of Husbandry movement came to Pennsylvania in 1871 when Montgomery (PA) farmer Luke Eger contacted the National Grange for information about organizing a local unit. After some persuasion among his family and neigh-





bors, Brother Eger was finally able to find 40 persons willing to form this new fraternity. Although he thought that "there will be little difficulty in raising other clubs in this county", it was more than two years before other local Granges began to be organized in Pennsylvania, leading to the formation of the PA State Grange in September, 1873. Although Eagle Grange #1 has been continually active for the past 149 years and is planning for its 150th anniversary next year (2021), the Grange membership is small and their circa 1888 Grange Hall is in need of significant renovation to become handicapped accessible and functionally updated for more use community use. Many thanks to those Granges and individuals that have contributed over \$3,300 in answer to this appeal, providing a much needed boost to the renovations and improvements currently being planned:

The Pennsylvania State Grange Youth and Young Adults just completed their yearly planning meeting and have initiated several new programs for this coming year.



New Hampshire Civics 101

New Hampshire's residents take great pride in their political history as they celebrated their centennial of being the First in the Nation to vote this year.

The few years prior to 1920, some states cancelled their primaries due to low voter turnout and the state of Indiana moved their primary to May which put New Hampshire as the first presidential primary election in the country in 1920. The opportunity of being first may have come about more by happenstance, but NH embraced it.

The Grangers who attended were very fortunate to have as their legislative fly-in hosts, Bob Haefner and Tara Sad. They both have served in the New Hampshire legislature for ten years and brought a wealth of information about the political processes.

Haefner shared what makes the primary election so special. He said, "The NH Primary is the first Primary contest for both parties

to choose their candidates to run for/ be nominated to run for President. In most states the Primary season is pretty short, but in NH and Iowa, it is a two-year process. It is retail politics at its best. Anyone that wants to run for president has the opportunity to join the

race for a relatively cheap cost. Most of the two-year process of running in NH is very small gatherings in people's homes, where you can hear a candidate speak. You are able in those small gatherings, and there are hundreds of them, you have the opportunity to ask questions and just have a chance to have a conversation with the candidate".

Haefner adds, "This New Hampshire process affects us all because the press follows each serious candidate for the two years, the rest of the country is introduced to them as well. We also have a tendency to narrow the field. For those across our country who do not get to see candidates

up close in person, in the larger

states, almost all of the exposure they have is with press reports or TV Ads."

New Hampshire has 400 legislators. Sad shared details of what it means to be a legislator in New Hampshire. "The New Hampshire

representative is paid \$100. a year, before taxes. There is no office fully staffed to handle the daily work. Days start early and can be long." The legislators are very hands on reading, writing, and revising bills. Sad included that there is no housing budget, so if

you are coming from a distance, you are responsible for overnight accommodations.

Why would someone want to serve for such meager pay and such a heavy workload? "Well" said Sad, "In speaking to everyone I served with over the 20 years, the universal answer is 'Because it's my civic duty'. We take that very seriously in NH. "She also adds, "they

take their jobs as representative seriously, too (at least most of them, that Another is that becoming a representative is inexpensive and relatively easy to do. You don't have to worry about buying TV advertisements or radio spots. There aren't intense debates or stressful campaigns. You do knock on doors, but that's fun. And being a representative is something you can take

pride in. I think that's the biggest

part."

GRANGE PRESIDENT SEEKS PENN STATE TRUSTEE SPOT

LEMOYNE, PA... Pennsylvania State President Wayne Campbell announced that he is seeking a position on the Pennsylvania State University Board of Trustees. In submitting his nomination, Campbell pointed to his service as Grange President as a way of helping Penn State "provide a link between the university and our grass roots constituencies."

A lifelong Grange member and serving as President of the Pennsylvania State Grange since 2017, Campbell pointed to the Pennsylvania State Grange's advocacy for rural and urban residents in seeking universal access to high-speed Broadband, increasing dairy consumption to create more demand, improved health care, and many other concerns of Pennsylvanians.

"Many of these are inter-related with Penn State. Broadband ties into improvements in rural health because Telemedicine cannot work without connectivity. Dairy consumption may be a consumer matter but agricultural research is the foundation of the Dairy industry. The success of Agriculture depends on innovative research that improves technology, developing new ways to improve conservation practice and educating the brilliant minds of our youth, "he said. "The common denominator for these is the Penn State Land Grant University. Much of my work with the Pennsylvania State Grange has been to help leg-

islators better understand the vital role Penn State plays in keeping Agriculture the Number One industry in PA, promoting their research to protect our livestock, bees, forests, and all aspects of agriculture and the need to fund Penn State properly."

Wayne Campbell's dedication to, and the love of agriculture began early, having been born into a family dairy farm and owning his own Holstein cows by the age of 14. He went on to assist farmers by working as a Certified farm equipment technician for New Holland and J.I. Case. For over 25 years he worked for General Motors dealerships where he served as Warranty Administrator, Service Manager, and performed diagnostic trouble-shooting. His background includes service with a transportation firm providing transportation for the elderly and others to medical and other destinations. "That work in particular gave me a real awareness of the needs of seniors and the consequences of isolation and difficulties in receiving nearby health care," he said. Early in his Grange career, Campbell served six years on the Pennsylvania State Grange Agriculture Committee, created to advise the Grange on policy matters.

PENNSYLVANIA STATE GRANGE TESTIFIES on DAIRY FEED CHALLENGE

HARRISBURG...The Pennsylvania State Grange called on the PA Milk Marketing Board (PMMB) to maintain the over-order premium payment at \$1.00 per hundredweight on qualifying milk at a hearing March 4. Testifying on behalf of the Pennsylvania State Grange, Lancaster County dairy farmer Matt Espenshade noted the recently higher blend price for the milk his family has shipped. He also walked the PMMB through the year with a family dairy farm where the mounting challenge was feed availability.

"The strengthening of milk prices since the last PMMB over-order premium hearing has been a welcome and long overdue development for our state's dairy farm families. In January the price we were paid for our milk eclipsed the twenty dollar per hundredweight level for the first time since January of 2015, "said Espenshade.

Despite some improvement in 2019, he pointed to 2018's weather saturation which caused difficulties in a more immediate way in 2019 – supplying feed to his milk cows. Since 2018, adverse weather conditions at planting and harvest have impacted the quantity and quality of the homegrown forages that are vital for his herd's dairy feed ration.



"The inability to raise and harvest crops at the right time has had a cascading effect since that time. We have been dealing with more shortages of feed at critical times over the past two years", he said. "It is a precarious situation to be in, and we are hoping the weather this spring is more conducive. Shortages in quality and quantity of our homegrown forages will lead to increased feed purchases during the upcoming year, putting even more strain on margins. "

In addition to urging continuance of the \$1.00 over-order premium, Espenshade asked policymakers to take a longer view of solving the problems facing the dairy farmer. "Part of promoting rural development in Pennsylvania is making the climate for business investment more desirable. As a dairy farmer, distance means something and the Pennsylvania State Grange believes processing closer to production would be of benefit to all involved in the state's dairy industry."

Espenshade's testimony concluded with a reminder to all parties involved in bringing milk from the farm to the consumer. "It is good to remember that all of us in this room want the same thing; that Pennsylvania milk is the first choice to be served on Pennsylvania dinner tables. I hope you will consider the plight of our farmers as you set the over-order premium for fluid milk produced, processed, and sold within Pennsylvania".

Matt Espenshade is a seventh-generation dairy farmer with family ownership dating back to 1867. His farm milks 70 cows with an 18,000-pound rolling herd average. His family farms 260 acres and raises forage and replacement heifers. He is the Master (President) of Elizabethtown Area Grange 2076, one of more than 200 local Granges statewide. His farm is a member of Mount Joy Farmers Co-op which is affiliated with Dairy Farmers of America.

Pennsylvania State Grange was founded in 1873 as an advocate for farmers, families, businesses and communities in rural Pennsylvania.

GRANGE QUESTIONS COMMITMENT BY ADMINISTRATION TO BROAD-BAND

LEMOYNE... The Pennsylvania State Grange announced a position to oppose the Wolf Administration's desire to impose a severance tax to fund the Restore PA program. Restore PA would have the state borrow \$4.5 billion to fund numbers of state projects in six areas including Broadband. The Governor has not indicated how much of the \$4.5 billion would be allocated for Broadband or the other five areas, flood control, green infrastructure, transportation, remediation of contaminants (from mines). The failure to give these figures in itself is concerning.

This was predicated by the House Appropriations Committee hearing today (March 5) when a question about Broadband funding was raised by Rep. Jonathan Fritz representing Susquehanna Wayne Counties.

He asked why the Administration's State Budget contained zero monies to fund the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives. This Office was created by Governor Wolf to demonstrate the Administration's commitment to universal high-speed Broadband for rural Pennsylvania.

The answer by Budget Secretary Jen Swails was that PA should pass Restore PA first.

"This answer is completely unacceptable," said Pennsylvania State Grange President Wayne Campbell. "To create the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives and provide no resources is totally inconsistent with the Administration's stated goal. It appears the Governor is saying Restore PA is the only way the Administration will work to achieve this goal. The Administration apparently felt that a Broadband promise would get rural advocates behind him."

Campbell said that this strategy backfired and will not work. "We have so far held our tongue because Broadband access is our top legislative priority. But it appears that there is little willingness on the part of the Administration which created the Governor's Office of Broadband initiatives to actually make it work unless Restore PA is passed and they are using that as a pressure tactic on legislators".

The Pennsylvania State Grange is supporting a different way to fund Broadband that does not tax the natural gas industry. The Grange's plan would allow for a minor per month surcharge on every cell phone similar to the 9aa item on telephone bills. This revenue would go into a dedicated fund which would fund the Office of Broadband Initiatives, but primarily it would provide matching funds to companies choosing to invest in expanding connectivity to residents of the Commonwealth. In essence, this means that those of us using the service are helping to expand it.

Nationally, Pew Research Center reports that 77 percent of the U.S population have and use cell phones. Statistica reports that this translates into 285.3 million smartphone users nationally. While that is a national figure, Pennsylvania doubtless reflects those numbers on a state scale.

Vince Phillips is the lobbyist for the Pennsylvania State Grange. He has lobbied in PA since 1989, coming from the Nation's Capitol where, among other things, he served on President Reagan's Transition Team and held a Reagan Administration appointment at USDA.

Lee Pressler's Antique

Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture, Russell Redding sat on one of Pennsylvania's finest products at the annual Farm Show in January: a 1954 SD-4 Sheppard diesel tractor! Having grown up on a farm in a neighboring county to the factory that manufactured these tractors from 1949 to 1956, he never had an occasion to sit on one. Lee Pressler of Centre County was only too happy to provide that opportunity!

During the Secretary's visit to the 2019 Pennsylvania State Grange Convention dinner in October 2019, Lee issued the invitation, assuring him that he would take his Sheppard tractor to the

Farm Show if he'd like to check it out. And, so the rest is history.

Although Lee never lived on a farm, he spent a lot of time on his

grandfather's farm and it apparently "grew" on him as is evident in his collection of antique tractors and farm machinery. He began restoring them in 1981 when he hauled a 1929 McCormick Deering home.

He decided this was the year for the Sheppard since he had taken other antique tractors pre-

viously. Of course, he had several to choose from in his museum including two with sentimental value: the 1929 Hart Parr that belonged to his grandfather and a 1936 Farmall similar to his wife's grandmother's that burned in a fire (which displays the original drawbar). Each of the other tractors have its own story: an English Ferguson dropped off by a distant cousin, a Minneapolis Moline purchased with his dad in Belleville, an Allis Chalmers WD-45 that belonged to a long-time neighboring farmer, etc.

Through the years, Lee was not satisfied to just restore antique tractors, he branched out to include a hayloader, a John Deere grain binder, a drill, mowers, and a manure spreader. Then he added a few trucks to his collection: a M-35A2 military truck, a 1955 Chevy roll back, a 1966 OSH KOSH snow plow (which took 9 gallons of yellow paint to refinish it!).

Finally, he added cubicles with smaller antiques of interest: his grandmother's Maytag washing machine and her blue & white cookstove, vaccum cleaners, baseball memorabilia, milking items from the farm and military mementos from that period of his life.

What started out as a challenging hobby has turned into a showcase of equipment and items that provides an opportunity to journey back in time and appreciate the "good ole days" in the life of our forefathers. Lee is only too happy to welcome visitors if you call ahead.

For the fifth time in the history of the Pennsylvania State Grange we are once again meeting in Erie, the fourth largest city in Pennsylvania. Past sessions were held in Erie in 1904, 1927, 1956 and 1963. It has been 64 years since we have had the honor of State Grange Session in the far Northwest corner of PA. We hope you plan on joining us.

Lots of great activities have been planned starting with choice of tours Thursday after-Erie County is known for Lake Erie with Presque Isle State Park and the Tom Ridge Environmental Center (TREC) as well as the agriculture impact of grape growers.

A self-driving tour of Presque Isle State Park and TREC will be outlined for you. esque Isle State Park is a 3,200acre sandy peninsula that arches into Lake Erie featuring Pennsylvania's only "seashore," The park creates Presque Isle Bay, a wide and deep harbor for the city of Erie. With approximately 14,000 acres of grapes, Pennsylvania ranks 4th nationally in the amount of grapes grown and 8th in wine production. The warm waters of Lake Erie are ideal for grape growing. Lake Erie Wine Country is the largest grape-growing region east of the Rockies and produce an exciting diversity of wines. A motor coach tour of three wineries with a catered dinner at the end of the tour will cost \$40 and be lim-

A few miles north of Erie in a town called Northeast is the Welch's Grape Juice Plant that has enough tanks to hold 1.8 million gallons of grape juice in cold storage to make juices, jams and jellies year-round. They process an average of 125,000 tons of grapes delivered from their family farmer-owners during each harvest season. Welch's is celebrating its 150th anniversary this year so it is just a little older than the PA State Grange! Unfortunately,

Welch's does not offer tours of their plant but if you drive the country side you will probably see grape harvesting in process.

Exhibit entries will be accepted up until 10:30 with judging to take place and exhibit rooms to open from 6:00 to 9:00 pm. 


tive, caring intervention for the individuals that needs help.

space to set up a large frame they would often use a wooden hoop to quilt small sections of a quilt at a time. The quit in the hoop is an appliqued quilt where by you cut out blocks in different shapes and sew them on to the background top fab-



ric. Appliqued quilts are done in a specific pattern with quilters striving for accuracy of pattern and design. All piecing and quilting was done by hand with the quilting stitches being quite close together and the lines of stitching being within a few inches of each other to hold the batting secure and prevent it from bunching.

The trunk next to the rocking chair holds several quilts including a red work quilt which has a white background fabric that is embroidered with red floss - this one has embroidered animal pictures which were often traced from coloring books. In the trunk you will also find a nine-patch block quilt and draped over the side is a red and white pieced quilt in the Irish Chain pattern.

The Singer treadle sewing machine for home use became popular in the late 1800's. The machine was manually powered by a large foot plate that was rocked back and forth with your foot to make the wheel turn and the needle go up and down creating a lock stitch. The sewing machine cabinet has three drawers on each side to hold your sewing notions. A roll of cotton batting and a pieced quilt block lay on top of the treadle with several more quilt blocks laying underneath.

The large sewing stand on legs in the display case is a replica of one that Martha Washington used and was marketed in the late 1800s. It has drawers for sewing needs as well as large cylindrical chambers

> on each side to hold fabric and notions. A smaller wooden sewing basket on the floor was also a popular item to store sewing and quilting notions as well as baskets and tins.

> Three quilts are displayed on the rack at the back center of the case, again very representative

quilts made from scraps of fabric left over from clothing projects. There was not money to purchase new fabrics for quilts. The designs continue to be very simple with mostly square blocks being used but you will notice they are now setting the blocks

diffferent look.

In the forefront of the display is a wooden ironing board with many. many layers of fabric and padding it was common to keep adding another layer of padding and muslin to your ironing board when it developed worn spots and holes instead of stripping it down to the wood

and starting over to cover it. Two quilt tops waiting to be quilted are draped over the ironing board - one in a star pattern and the other in a pinwheel pattern. Sitting alongside the quilts are two early electric irons which are very heavy! On the floor is a wooden table top ironing board often know as a sleeve board and two sad irons which had to be

heated on the cook stove when ironing. A roll of Mountain Mist cotton batting is also laying on the Ironing board. This popular batting always had quilt block patterns and quilting motifs inside the paper wrapper and often served as inspirations for quilters to try new and different blocks and designs. The inside of a wrapper is displayed on the wall showing the Grandmother's Flower Garden hexie design along with the pieced blocks.

And then comes the electric Singer Sewing machine which became very popular after WWI. The practice of door-to-door sales emerged with the electric sewing machines. It allowed salesmen to bring the machines into prospective customers' homes, and show them how such a novel machine could simplify their lives coupled with a installment payment plan that required sales men to collect weekly payments, thus starting the charge card system. This greatly increased sewing machine sales and excited the ladies. The sewing machines typically came in a wooden cabinet - either maple or walnut stain - that could be closed and used as an end table. A small front tip-out drawer



held sewing notions. Also available but not often affordable to many households was a matching bench seat that stored sewing materials.

Stands to hold sewing supplies were often hand made and came in a variety of patterns. The one in our display has a star cutout on each end. Plastic sewing boxes designed



to hold quilting items became available at the end of the era and were a must for every sewer.

Quilts were pieced together much faster with the electric machine. As the economy improved, women were able to purchase new fabrics that were specifically used to make quilts. During this period

quilting the drawn pattern. The last quilt in the display case is quite a contrast to the first quilt. It features a tulip pattern pieced in pink and green fabric with a white background fabric. It features a center design of tulips surrounded by rows of the same tulip block on all four sides.

220 which is still in use today. The General company was bought out by Singer in the early 1950's.

Scattered throughout the display are sewing notions - things you use when sewing. There are needle holders, scissors, sewing baskets, button boxes, jars with spools of thread, pin cushions, quilt

> blocks, pattern booklets, pamphlets and hand drawn stencils of cardboard to trace onto your quilt. The pieced Quilt blocks found throughout the display depict the following patterns: nine patch, 25 patch, hexagon pattern of Grandmother's Flower Garden, Friendship Fan, Dresden plate, as well as embroidered blocks.

> Special thanks go out to many, many Grangers and friends of the Grange who

freely gave of their items to create this display. Many of the items have little or no known history because they were found or discovered when cleaning out homes. And as all quilters know, "A bed without a quilt is like a sky without stars!"



of time quilting started to become an expression of art. Patterns were used with artistic designs as the last quilt in our display illustrates. Quilts were hand quilted with specific designs by using templates such as feathers or medallion patterns, tracing them on the fabric and then

The last machine in the display was made by the General Company. It is a small electric portable machine that sits on a table top and comes with a carrying case making it easily transported to different places. The machine is very similar to the popular Singer Featherweight

GRANGE URGES PASSAGE OF DISTRACTED DRIVING BILL

LEMOYNE... The Pennsylvania State Grange wrote April 17 to both Republican and Democratic Chairs of the Senate Transportation Committee urging action on a distracted driving bill in anticipation of an eventual loosening of COVID-19 driving restrictions.

The letter to Majority Chair Kim Ward (R-Westmoreland) and Minority Chair John Sabatina (D-Phila.) said that the Senate Transportation Committee should act on House Bill 37 sponsored by Rep. Rosemary Brown (R-Monroe) to plan for when driving will resume. The letter suggests that when the stay at home edict is relaxed, there will be a surge of driving activity and a resurgence of driving while texting or using cell phones for talking or taking selfies when driving.

In 2015, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reported there were 3,196 fatal crashes that occurred on U.S. roadways that involved distraction (10% of all fatal crashes).

More recent Pennsylvania figures from PennDOT's 2018 PA Crash Facts and Statistics cited 128,420 reportable 2018 crashes of which 14,292 (11%) were attributed to distracted driving. These distracted driving accidents resulted in 63 deaths.

The House passed House Bill 37 in January but the Senate Transportation Committee has not yet taken up the bill. The Grange letter notes that the General Assembly's focus is rightly on addressing the coronavirus COVID-19 crisis but that the Senate Transportation Committee should act "as is prudently possible."

GRANGE SUPPORTS BROADBAND REACH BILLS

LEMOYNE... The Pennsylvania State Grange is supporting new legislation that will help communities and their residents in rural Pennsylvania to finally receive high-speed Broadband. Specifically, the two pieces of legislation are Senate Bill 1118 sponsored by Senator Joe Pittman (R-Indiana) and House Bill 2438 sponsored by Rep. Clint Owlett (R-Tioga/Potter/Bradford). These bills would allow rural electric cooperatives and others easier access to "piggyback" on the electrical wiring already in place to expand communications technology to unserved and underserved parts of the State with no or little access to the Internet. SB 1118 and HB 2438 streamline the approval process that must take place before the "piggybacking" can begin.

"The advantage of this legislation is that it takes advantage of existing infrastructure," said Pennsylvania State Grange President Wayne Campbell. "The Grange has repeatedly said that universal access to high-speed Broadband is to this century what Rural Electrification was to the 20th Century. Different technology, but the same message – rural America must not be left behind."

The National Grange was a national leader to achieving the goal of Rural Electrification and is working at the national level to expand rural Broadband. The Pennsylvania State Grange has championed bridging the Digital Divide in Pennsylvania for over a decade. "This approach of utilizing existing electrical infrastructure where feasible helps to provide another answer to the high-cost reality of telecommunications companies that are asked to connect the proverbial last house on the left. Streamlining this

approval process will hopefully speed up the approval process and put more money on Broadband expansion that would have previously been spent on permit acquisition," Campbell said.

Currently, SB 1118 is in the Senate Communications & Technology Committee. HB 2438 is in the House Consumer Affairs Committee.

MEDIA STATEMENT ON WOLF'S VETOS

Pennsylvania State Grange believes that the May 19 veto by Governor Wolf of more business opening legislation is unfortunate. While appreciating his desire to defend his original business closure order, hopefully he will see that there is significant interest in getting PA's economy and tax base back on track by safely following CDC guidelines. It is our hope that he will allow auto dealers and garden centers to reopen with CDC guidelines just as he did with Realtors a short time after his veto of the legislation that would have done the same thing. Our fear is that these vetoes will poison the proverbial well as the Governor and the General Assembly begin to discuss State Budget enactment in June. Our Government's actions in both branches have become extremely partisan and this is hurting all Pennsylvanians! Pennsylvania deserves a team working together, now more than ever, and that is not what we are seeing.

Grangers stepped up in times of need and gave it their all and dug a little deeper and gave more.



Greetings from South Central PA!

I hope this finds you and your families safe and well during these unprecedented times. So much has changed since I wrote the last article for the Grange News. But what has not changed is the potential for our Granges to continue their work in our communities. Granges across the state and nation have been adapting to these new times to best serve their communities. Some Granges are holding virtual meetings and hosting virtual programs for their members. Some Granges are reimagining their roles in their communities - making masks, helping feed the hungry, and with countless other projects. The COVID-19 crisis also impacts several of the Lecturer's Department Contests and Programs. - 3. Best of Show winner from the previous year may not enter the Talent Contest in the same class the following year.

The Virtual Talent Show will be held on Saturday, July 18th (the

original date during Family Festival). More information about how to view and/or join the Talent Show will be shared closer to the time. Talent videos should be submitted by Saturday, July 4th to allow adequate time to compile videos for the Talent Show. Introducing a New Report to Replace the Community Night/Open **House Report**

The Lecturer's Department is well aware of the fact that many Granges may have needed to postpone or cancel their Open Houses for this year because of the COVID-19 crisis. In recognition of this and to honor the work of Lecturers during these unprecedented times, we are introducing a new program - Creative Connections.

This report will take the place of the Open House report form. There will be three divisions.

- **Division A** Granges who were able to hold their Open House - "We had our Open House and here is what it looked like..."
- **Division B** Granges who had planned their Open House but could not hold it - "We had our Open House planned, but could not have it. Here is what it would have looked like..."
- **Division C** Granges who could not hold their Open House - "Because of COVID-19, we could not have our Open House. Here is what we did instead..."

Granges who fall in Division A can complete the form similarly to how they would have completed the Open House form in the past.

Granges who fall in Division B can complete the form similarly to



how they would have in the past, except some information will be unknown (like number of attendees). Lecturers should fill out the form with as much information and supporting documents as they have to show what their Open House would have looked like if they would have been able to have it.

Division C is designed to acknowledge that many Lecturers and Granges have found ways to share the Grange Story in their communities in ways other than a traditional Open House. Perhaps your Grange is holding virtual meetings with programs to engage your members. Maybe your Grange is finding unique ways to serve your community during this time. Whatever your Grange is doing to connect with your members and the community during this time of social distancing is important and is worthy of acknowledgement. If your Grange's outreach during this time has been community service, you can report on that in both this report and your Community Service Report.

There will still be membership classes in each division:

- 1. Pomona
- 2. Subordinate Up to 50 members
- 3. Subordinate Between 51 and 99 members
- 4. Subordinate 100 or more members

Because of this change, winning Granges in each division and class will receive a framed Certificate of Excellence in lieu of a plaque for this year.

New COVID-19 Contest Classes

New Classes have been added to the Pen in Hand and Photography Contests.

Pen in Hand

- NEW Class "One thing I learned during Social Distancing..."
 - Be creative with this! This could be a poignant life lesson

learned during the COVID-19 crisis. It could be a new skill or hobby (perhaps art or sewing or learning how to cut hair) that you have picked up with extra time on your hands. It could be a humorous piece.

- 500 word maximum
- All other Pen in Hand rules should be followed as detailed in the Guide to Contests and Programs

Photography

- NEW Class "Beauty in the Midst of Crisis"
 - This is also a class that allows for a lot of flexibility and interpretation! Maybe you have taken a photo of some beautiful flowers growing in your garden. Maybe you have taken a photo of your Grange's community service work during this time. Maybe you took a photo of a child or grandchild while you have been home. Use your imagination and hone your photography skills.
 - All Photography rules should be followed as detailed in the Guide to Contests and Programs.

All other Contests and Programs are being continued. This is the perfect time to work on your "My Favorite Anything" entry or work on submitting your programs for the "Design a Program" contest.

Please read the weekly Grange email blasts and check the Grange website for any other updates that may come up in the next few months. Look for more information about how to join and/or view the Virtual Talent Show as we get closer to July.

As a reminder, please make sure to send reports and designated contests to me by **September 15**. The report forms are available on the Lecturer's page of the PennsylvaniaState Grange website and also in a mailing to Granges.

In lieu of traditional program ideas, here are some ideas for how to continue to provide meaningful programs or otherwise connect with your members during this time of Social Distancing.

- Consider using a virtual conference call program like Zoom to hold meetings. The State Grange has a Zoom account and can help you to set up your meeting. What is really nice about Zoom is that both computer-users and dial-in-users can access the meeting. There are many programming options that would be possible on Zoom meetings, including educational speakers, programs about topics of interest, and even fun and games, like Bingo or Trivia.
- If virtual meetings are not an option, coordinate volunteers from your Grange to make regular contact with members who may not be connected through email or social media. Check-in on them to see how they are doing and if there is anything they need. Make sure they are getting updates from your local Grange and the State Grange.
- Work with your Community Service Chair to think of unique ways that you can serve your communities at this time. Even though some restrictions are in the process of being lifted, there will be plenty of needs that will continue, even as counties move to the yellow phase and green phases.

As always, please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions or concerns. Also, please share with me what your Grange is doing to connect with your members and the community during this time. I would love to feature the great things you are doing in future articles.
























Major Changes to the 2020 Pennsylvania State Grange Convention

All resolution work will be completed by the committees via ZOOM meetings prior to the convention and a single committee representative will be at session to present recommendations. Committee members who are not Delegates will not be allowed to attend. There will be no displays, presentation of the 6th Degree, Banquets, Benefit

Auction, and Youth or Junior activities. By the time you read this in the PGN your Subordinate and Pomona Master/President will have received a detailed letter with application for your Delegates.

Our Directors are working on ways to continue the work of the committees virtually. Please watch for information in the email blasts and on Facebook for further details. If you do not receive the email blast please contact Lizzie Bailey at 717.254.9550 to have your email address added to the mailing list. If you have members without email, please share the information with them as it becomes available.

The drawing for the Family Activities Quilt was going to take place prior to session due to a clarification

2020 National Grange Convention

The National Grange Executive Committee is very sorry to announce that the 2020 National Grange Convention will have many changes because of the Covid-19 pandemic and therefore will be open for National delegates and officers only. No visitors or Grangers will be invited to attend in person this year.

The convention will be cut to two days and the only business will be voting on resolutions and electing two executive committee officers. Extra activities, such as the Evening of Excellence, Youth and Junior Public Speaking and Sign a Song, will take place virtually. The Seventh Degree will not be exemplified this year.

Other recognitions such as Community Service awards, Distinguished Grange, Grange Legacy Family, and the Quilt Block Contest, will be held and awards given, but there will be no ceremony. National Grange Department Directors will be sending out information regarding their programs and how they will be handled this year, so stay tuned!

The hotel is willing to allow us to downsize our convention to two days, 80 people, hopefully without penalty, so we are

We feel it may not be safe to gather, even by November. Many of your State Sessions will see major changes this year also. We hope you will understand this decision, and keep on working at the local level as much as you can to help your communities.

more information about serving as a State Officer, or know that you would like to be suggested, please contact the Pennsylvania State Grange office for the contact information of the Nominating Committee or have someone pre-arranged to suggest your name. The election will take place Saturday, October 17th, at 11:00 A.M. just before the lunch recess.

The By-Laws do not allow nominating speeches in the Grange, but, in Article VI, paragraph 1.6.6, it states "Each person suggested for a state office shall be permit-

ted to appear and speak before the delegate body for a maximum of two minutes at a designated time prior to the election." These presentations will be allowed immediately after the suggestions from the floor are received Friday afternoon.

hear concerns of rural Pennsylvania, help members resolve problems; inject new ideas and provide the tools needed to encourage membership growth; oversee status of all Subordinate and Pomona Granges; organize and reorganize Granges; write articles for the Pennsylvania Grange News [PGN] and letters of communication.

VICE PRESIDENT/ **OVERSEER:**

JV Lamb [3 years], In the event of an emergency be prepared to fulfil the office of President/Master, fill in for the Master at workshops, meetings and activities as needed; serve on the Executive Committee; speak at engagements as requested by the President/Master, be available as needed by the State President/Master: and serve as a member of the Board for the Grange Foundation.

LECTURER:

Jennifer Nauss [2 years], Develop the yearly Lecturer's program with the assistance of your Committee, provide support, assistance and guidance for Subordinate and Pomona Lecturers and the Lecturer's Committee via communications; plan and lead music at State Convention; promote and conduct the annual talent contest; plan and oversee the Lecturer's displays, exhibits, contests and judging of programs under the Lecturer's direction at state and district events; promote Grange projects and policies; budget income and expenses; file quarterly financial reports; visit Granges as available; write articles for the PGN.

STEWARD:

Andrew Kieffer [2 years], Schedule State Advocates working at State Session; conduct the election of officers; assist in preparing the stage for the Session and Degree.

ASSISTANT STEWARD:

Robert Kleckner III [2 years], Assist with conducting the Convention; aid the Steward in preparing for the meeting and degree.

LADY ASSISTANT STEWARD:

Lorena Baughman [4 years], Assist with conducting the Convention; aid the Steward in preparing for the meeting and degree; store, wash and iron the court ladies' gowns for the Degree.

CHAPLAIN:

Judy Pressler [4 years], Provide spiritual guidance and/or meditations at all sessions of the annual Convention and other state events; prepare and conduct the annual memorial service; write articles for the PGN.



TREASURER:

Henry Seidel (16 years), Assist the State President/Master in managing certain financial matters; report to the Executive Committee quarterly in writing regarding changes made in investments; manage the scholarship loan and grant programs, including payback schedules; be knowledgeable regarding investments, bookkeeping and financial planning; manage the lifetime membership program funds and Grange Trust Fund accounts; manage Grange Improvement Loan accounts: serve as a member of the Board of the Grange Foundation; be responsible for safekeeping of legal documents; present annual financial and audit reports.

Debbie Campbell (8 years), Prepare minutes of the Session and publish the Journal of Proceedings: communicate with Subordinate and Pomona secretaries; be available to the State Grange office staff on a weekly basis; be available to handle specific duties as assigned by the State President/ Master and Executive Committee. Assist Office Secretary in logging

and processing Quarterly Dues from Subordinate Granges and oversee prompt payment of Dues to National Grange as required by the By-Laws. Maintain Grange supply department inventory and sales; process 25, 50, and 50-plus year certificates for membership.

GATEKEEPER:

Gene Zvarick [5 years], Manage the flow of business at the State Session; assist with preparation of stage for meetings and Degree.

CERES:

Hannah Leibensperger (2 years), Launder, store, and press the Ceres drill costumes and accessories for the drill team; select court ladies.

POMONA:

Jennifer Beamon [2 years], Launder, store and press the Pomona drill costumes and accessories for the drill team: select court ladies.

FLORA:

Virginia Mangel [4 years], Select and teach each drill team for the Degree; launder, store and press the Flora drill costumes and accessories for the drill team, pillar girls and rose girls; select court ladies.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

Richard Mangel [4 years] Be available to attend meetings of the Executive Committee in Harrisburg or other areas of the state as needed; contribute to decision making and be available to explain decisions made throughout the year; bring ideas to aid in the development of programs, policies, and projects; provide oversight of property and funds of the State Grange; serve as a member of the Board for the Grange Foundation. (Other Executive Committee members are Janet Pratt, Barbara Schroeder and Dr. James Diamond.)

Pennsylvania State Grange members have a variety of interests and backgrounds. What all have in common is a desire to appreciate the blessings we are given even while wanting to improve the state in which we live. This article discusses how Grange members can let their concerns be acted on by the Pennsylvania State Grange. When they suggest Grange policies through Resolutions at the State Session, it represents this grassroots, member-centered, policy process. What should we advocate? You tell us.

Here are a few from the 2019 State Session that were adopted and became Grange policy.

- Resolved: The Pennsylvania State Grange actively advocates passage of legislation to allow milk haulers an exemption from weather-related closings of Interstate highways.
- Resolved: The Pennsylvania and the National Grange support legislation calling for a halt on implementation of MS4 and if implementation is continued, farmers be exempt from having to incur costs connected with storm water management plan development or simply be exempted from the MS4 requirement altogether. (MS4 is federally-mandated storm water management with costs borne by municipalities and ultimately the taxpayers.)
- Resolved: The Pennsylvania State Grange urge the PA Game Commission to allow electronic transmission and payment for antlerless deer hunting license applications.

MEMBERS DRIVE GRANGE POLICY

What Does This Have to do With You?

Our strength comes from you, our members. The things we advocate come from you, our members. Ask yourself these questions.

- What is going on with state government that has or is affecting you now?
- What legislation is important to rural PA? What do you want to see enacted?

The Process: Put Forth a Resolution.

Take your ideas and write them down. There is a format for Resolutions. It includes two parts. The first is Whereas. The whereas clauses show the need. What is the need that prompts your suggestion as Grange policy? The second part of the format is the Resolved. Simply put, what do you want the Pennsylvania State Grange to advocate?

Here is a sample format:



WHEREAS, much of PA agriculture depends on pollination by bees, and;

WHEREAS, bees are under stress with hive collapses and emerging threats like the Asian Murder Hornet, and:

WHEREAS, research is vital to finding ways to restore and preserve the PA bee population; therefor be it

RESOLVED: The Pennsylvania State Grange asks



the PA Department of Agriculture to declare restoration of PA's bee population a state priority for research funding.

That wasn't so hard was it? Rest assured, if you need help in drafting something, please feel free to contact the State Office for help (legislative@pagrange.org).

The next step is the hardest. An individual must first take his or her idea and bring to their own Grange for discussion. That means that the author must talk with other members about their idea. Addressing the fear of public speaking that some have, keep in mind that this is not a speech.



It is a conversation with fellow Grangers. You say why this idea is important. Fellow members ask questions and you all discuss it. Then your Grange votes to forward your suggestion.

The next step is a state-level meeting which usually takes place in September. The Pennsylvania State Grange has specific subcommittees that take the ideas and



discuss them. Their role is to vet the proposed Resolutions to make sure that they do not duplicate ex-

> isting Grange policy and that they are feasinble. Then, these committees forward the Resolutions to the State Session Delegate body with recommendations.

These recommendations would be evaluated by Delegates. Is the Resolution present policy? Should it be adopted or rejected? Should it be amended and then approved? The State Session Delegates make the final decision. Sometimes the recommenda-

tions from the Resolutions meeting are heeded. Sometimes not. That ensures that every recommendadtion from a Grange member gets a fair hearing at both the Resolutions meeting and by State Session Delegates.

Sometimes the State Session Delegates ask that the Resolution be sent back to the relevant resolutions committee for re-drafting in case the original Resolution was unclear or needs to be amended. Then, it goes back to State Session again for the final decision on what our policies should be.

Of course, if you have a Resolution that means something to you and others, attending and participating in local and state Grange meetings is certainly an important part of achieving your goal.

Underscore the importance of this process. It is open. It is transparent. And it is fruitful because then the Pennsylvania State Grange has a direction of what its members want it to do. Your adopted Resolution also provides marching orders for Grange lobbying and media. The most important takeaway from this article is that you can make your views felt.



The Pennsylvania State Grange appreciates the intent of the Governor's letter asking the President and Congress to fund expansion of highspeed Broadband in unserved and underserved areas. We respectfully point out that good intentions are best demonstrated at home.

While the Governor established the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives with fanfare, he never funded it. In each State Budget he proposed, there continues to be no line-item for this important office. There is no resource so that the Office could actually coordinate Pennsylvania's efforts to secure Fedbetween the FCC and State Government. The Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives has no dedicated staff. The lone staff person is 'borrowed' from the Department of Community & Economic Development.

The Pennsylvania State Grange urges Governor Tom Wolf to reinforce the leadership he has shown in advocating Federal Broadband funding by helping his own Office of Broadband Initiatives function as it should. We fear that without funding, the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives will become irrelevant.

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


If you have a National Quilt block that needs to be sent, please get it to me as soon as possible. I will be sending them in at the end of this September.



Updates to Contests and Programs

Historic Pennsylvania Grange Celebrates New Look

A little more than a year ago, Pennsylvania's first Grange – Eagle Grange #1 in Lycoming County – embarked on a journey to renew itself. Together with the help of Doug Bonsall and Jenn Nauss from

the Pennsylvania State Grange History Committee, the members of Eagle Grange #1 have made tremendous strides toward renewing the Grange as a community hub in Montgomery, Lycoming County.

Eagle Grange #1 was founded almost 150 years ago, in March 1871, thanks to the organizational efforts of Luke Eger. Pennsylvania's first Grange has been continually active since its founding almost 150 years ago but, like many Granges around the state and the country, has faced several uphill battles including decreasing active membership and financial difficulties. Eagle Grange's renewal project aims to increase their active involvement in Montgomery and surrounding communities to con-

tinue their work for the next 150 years and beyond.

Through keeping an open mind to new ideas and the hard work of the members, Eagle Grange #1

has made some impressive strides in their renewal. They hosted a successful Candidates Forum last October for the County Commissioner candidates, which drew more than 80 people from the community. Individuals

and families continue to use the building for family functions and other gatherings. The Susquehanna Valley West Coast Swing Dance Community regu-

larly uses the Grange Hall for weekly dance practices and performances.

In order to make the building more accessible and readily used for such community events, Eagle Grange has undergone some major renovations. These include making the Grange Hall ADA-compliant with accessible restrooms, an entrance ramp, and a reserved handicap parking area. Grange volunteers from Eagle Grange and Valley Grange #1360 in York County, as well as Pennsylvania State Grange President Wayne Campbell, have also replaced the floor throughout the first floor of the hall. Grange volunteers have also done extensive painting to make the building a more attractive site for community events. It is thanks to the generous donations from Friends of Eagle Grange #1 from across the state of Pennsylvania and a few larger donations from Perry Valley Grange #1804, Valley Grange #1360, and Red Lion Grange #1781 that this work could be completed.

stimulus for the American people. We know that much more needs to be done and we look forward to our continued work with you to respond to this crisis together.

As COVID-19 continues to impact both urban and rural communities, we are gravely concerned about the compromised digital access that now threatens entire communities, and people's livelihoods, educational access, quality of healthcare and lives.

Our rural communities are particularly less prepared to mitigate the pandemic itself and adapt to what will certainly be a different world in a post-COVID economy, in large part because of the lack of access to Broadband. Some 18 million Americans lack access to Broadband internet connectivity, 14 million of whom reside in rural America. In today's economy these communities, businesses and families without adequate access are left behind, and the consequences are staggering from an economic, health, education, and social standpoint.

Broadband is not a luxury, but rather a critical infrastructure that's vitally important to our economic future and national security. While the investment to-date is much appreciated, we believe it is only a down payment in the total investment needed to close this gap.

An FCC estimate from 2017 estimates it would cost \$80 billion to bring high-speed internet to the remaining parts of our country that do not have access. Last year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture issued a report, citing Deloitte data, that estimated it would require "between \$130 and \$150 billion over the next five to seven years, to adequately support rural coverage and 5G wireless densification."

Additional Broadband investment must meet the level of the challenge and be made at the speed that is clearly now required. This investment will unleash economic potential, promote stable job growth that's resilient in times like these, and ensure all businesses and families can participate in the digital economy.

This investment will unlock the potential of a new generation of technologies for healthcare advancement, ensure that school children across America have access to the best educational tools, foster new ways of doing business, stimulate the advancement of agricultural and food production technologies and give states and communities the opportunities to capitalize on smart infrastructure deployment.

Mr. President, Congressional Leaders - we must work together as past generations have done to provide a service fundamental to life in America today. It is time for the Rural Electrification Act of our generation. As you consider this investment, we urge you to look to the lessons of the past and ask ourselves not how we can afford to embrace innovation and bring new technologies to all communities, but with all we stand to lose, how we can afford not to.

As Governors, we are all ready to partner with you to ensure an efficient and effective strategy to quickly deploy these resources to bridge the digital divide. We call on Congress to act immediately and together to pass a groundbreaking package that provides the necessary digital access to all Americans.

Hi everyone,

I wanted to pass along some resources that have been developed by our colleagues that you might find useful!

First, WiBee (https://pollinators.wisc.edu/wibee/) is a new citizen science app developed by the Gratton Lab at University of Wisconsin. It is smart-phone accessible and can be used to track bee visits to flowering plants. It has a data dashboard that can be used to work with the submitted data. This is a great tool for growers, gardeners and students!

Second, Cornell University released its 432 page analysis of the economic benefits and risks to pollinators of neonic use in NY agricultural systems:

Officer Descriptions for the 148th Session

October 15-18, 2020 Erie, PA

At the 148th Annual Pennsylvania State Grange Session all offices will be up for election. Pennsylvania State Grange By-Laws state in Article VI, paragraph 1.6.1, "With the exception of Secretary and Treasurer, no office holder's name shall be printed on the ballot for an office if that officer shall have held the same office continuously for six years immediately preceding."

If you are interested in serving as a State Officer, suggestions for office will be received on Friday afternoon, October 16th at 1:45 P.M. If you would like more information about serving as a State Officer, or know that you would like to be suggested, please contact the Pennsylvania

State Grange office for the contact information of the Nominating Committee or have someone pre-arranged to suggest your name. The election will take place Saturday, October 17th, at 11:00 A.M. just before the lunch recess.

The By-Laws do not allow nominating speeches in the Grange, but, in Article VI, paragraph 1.6.6, it states "Each person suggested for a state office shall be permitted to appear and speak before the delegate body for a maximum of two minutes at a designated time prior to the election." These presentations will be allowed immediately after the suggestions from the floor are received Friday afternoon.

Following are brief job descriptions for each State Office, along with the current officer's name and length of time served in that office. A complete description of officer duties can be found at www.pagrange.org.



All officers are to memorize their part in the Degree work; be available for speaking engagements as approved by the State President/Master; support and promote the policies and programs of the State Grange; submit articles for the Pennsylvania Grange News as requested by the editor or President/Master; attend the State Convention, special events, officer's meetings; and prepare an annual report for the Journal of Proceedings.

PRESIDENT/MASTER:

Wayne Campbell [3 years], Be available to work in the Pennsylvania State Grange Office, make Grange and office management decisions; appoint Advocates/Deputies and committees; provide leadership in the absence of policy and/or when adjustments are appropriate; hire and supervise the State Grange office staff; represent the

State Grange at various functions: speak where invited: oversee all State Grange programs and projects; develop and implement new programs, serve ex-officio on all committees; provide leadership in legislative matters; visit Granges as needed; hear concerns of rural Pennsylvania, help members resolve problems; inject new ideas and provide the tools needed to encourage membership growth; oversee status of all Subordinate and Pomona Granges; organize and reorganize Granges; write articles for the Pennsylvania Grange News [PGN] and letters of communication.

VICE PRESIDENT/ OVERSEER:

JV Lamb [3 years], In the event of an emergency be prepared to fulfil the office of President/Master, fill in for the Master at workshops, meetings and activities as needed; serve on the Executive Committee; speak at engagements as requested by the President/Master, be available as needed by the State President/Master; and serve as a member of the Board for the Grange Foundation.

LECTURER:

Jennifer Nauss [2 years], Develop the yearly Lecturer's program with the assistance of your Committee, provide support, assistance and guidance for Subordinate and Pomona Lecturers and the Lecturer's Committee via communications; plan and lead music at State Convention; promote and conduct the annual talent contest; plan and oversee the Lecturer's displays,



exhibits, contests and judging of programs under the Lecturer's direction at state and district events; promote Grange projects and policies; budget income and expenses; file quarterly financial reports; visit Granges as available; write articles for the PGN.

STEWARD:

Andrew Kieffer [2 years], Schedule State Advocates working at State Session; conduct the election of officers; assist in preparing the stage for the Session and Degree.

ASSISTANT STEWARD:

Robert Kleckner III [2 years], Assist with conducting the Convention; aid the Steward in preparing for the meeting and degree.

LADY ASSISTANT STEWARD:

Lorena Baughman [4 years], Assist with conducting the Convention; aid the Steward in preparing for the meeting and degree; store, wash and iron the court ladies' gowns for the Degree.

CHAPLAIN:

Judy Pressler [4 years], Provide spiritual guidance and/or meditations at all sessions of the annual Convention and other state events; prepare and conduct the annual memorial service; write articles for the PGN.

TREASURER:

Henry Seidel (16 years), Assist the State President/Master in managing certain financial matters; report to the Executive Committee quarterly in writing regarding changes made in investments; manage the scholarship loan and grant programs, including payback schedules; be knowledgeable regarding investments, bookkeeping and financial planning; manage the lifetime membership program funds and Grange Trust Fund accounts; manage Grange Improvement Loan accounts; serve as a member of the Board of the Grange Foundation; be responsible for safekeeping of legal documents; present annual financial and audit reports.

SECRETARY:

Debbie Campbell (8 years), Prepare minutes of the Session and publish the Journal of Proceedings; communicate with Subordinate and Pomona secretaries; be available to the State Grange office staff on a weekly basis; be available to handle specific duties as assigned by the State President/ Master and Executive Committee. Assist Office Secretary in logging and processing Quarterly Dues from Subordinate Granges and oversee prompt payment of Dues to National Grange as required by the By-Laws. Maintain Grange supply department inventory and sales; process 25, 50, and 50-plus year certificates for membership.

GATEKEEPER:

Gene Zvarick [5 years], Manage the flow of business at the State Session; assist with preparation of stage for meetings and Degree.

CERES:

Hannah Leibensperger (2 years), Launder, store, and press the Ceres drill costumes and accessories for the drill team; select court ladies.

POMONA:

Jennifer Beamon [2 years], Launder, store and press the Pomona drill costumes and accessories for the drill team; select court ladies.

FLORA:

Virginia Mangel [4 years], Select and teach each drill team for the Degree; launder, store and press the Flora drill costumes and accessories for the drill team, pillar girls and rose girls; select court ladies.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

Richard Mangel [4 years] Be available to attend meetings of the Executive Committee in Harrisburg or other areas of the state as needed; contribute to decision making and be available to explain decisions made throughout the year; bring ideas to aid in the development of programs, policies, and projects; provide oversight of property and funds of the State Grange; serve as a member of the Board for the Grange Foundation. (Other Executive Committee members are Janet Pratt, Barbara Schroeder and Dr. James Diamond.)

September

Back to School: The plans for returning to school this fall continue to be in flux and are changing rapidly. The understatement of the year goes as follows: This has been and is a trying time for Grangers, their families, their communities and frankly for all of rural Pennsylvania. A recent cartoon showed people blowing horns and throwing confetti. When asked, they replied that regardless of what the calendar says, they were done with 2020 and preferred to be in 2021.

In addition to the obvious such as what the business shut-downs have done to rural economies, an underlying issue has emerged that illustrates how non-metropolitan Pennsylvania has been specifically hurt by the coronavirus. This impact is similar to what our non-rural friends have faced but it affects rural PA far worse. The reason is that a resource other communities have simply is not available in much of the rural parts of the state.

That resource is access to highspeed Broadband. Here is the conventional wisdom: use technology to overcome adversity caused by the coronavirus crisis.

- School buildings are not open or only partially open? Solution is learning remotely from your computer at home!
- Business closing or forced cutbacks? Solution is on-line commerce!
- Ag meetings or training? Solution is to go virtual!
- Difficulty in receiving in-person health care? Solution is Telemedicine!

In other words, no worries. Technology can save us. Right? WRONG.

If we do not have access to technology, all the modern Internet resources in the world become irrelevant to the fact that:

"REMOTELY" PROSPECTS ARE REMOTE FOR RURAL PA

- Rural students cannot do their homework or attend virtual (remote) classes.
- Businesses cannot market products and services remotely.
- Virtual meetings are ignored if you can't go virtual. Thus, the value of these meetings – whether an Extension workshop or a virual event – is lost.
- Distance from medical care and isolation continue to be public and personal health issues.

Understand that these problems are not new. They were obstacles faced by rural communities long before the coronavirus crisis. What is different is that technology is hailed as a panacea and it is not a solution if the technology is not available.

Put another way, the Digital Divide between technology haves and have-nots has been very much there for some time but the lack of access to high-speed Broadband is felt more deeply because of coronavirus.

CORONAVIRUS UNDERSCORES GRANGE'S NO. 1 PRIORITY

As most know, the number one priority for the Pennsylvania State Grange is achieving the goal of universal access to high-speed Broadband. We believe that Broadband is to this century what rural electrification was

in the 20th Century.

Look at these paarallels:

- Each involves technology where rural areas don't have it universally (electricity and Broadband).
- Each involves education. Electric lighting helped education just as the Internet is essential now.
- Health care: Can you envision medical care without electricity? Well, in this century, the challenge is access to the Internet as the new phase of medical care.
- What did electricity do for businesses? Storage, manufacturing, retail sales were all greatly enhanced because of electricity. In this century, it is digital technology

So, how do we get to universal access to high-speed Broadband? Barring a multi-billion dollar Marshall Plan for Broadband, the efforts will remain piecemeal with all the little parts of the solution adding up to bridging the Digital Divide. The Pennsylvania State Grange is working on a number of these, a partial list of which follows.

How To Pay for It

 Pennsylvania State Grange believes that there needs to be a centralized office to coordinate PA efforts to gain funding. Now, the Governor's Office of Broadband



Initiatives exists, but the Governor has never requested any funding for the Office. There is only one employee and she is part-time. PA State Grange wants to see that Office funded as part of the State Budget.

- House Bill 2348 (Causer-R-McKean/Cameron/Potter) would take an existing tax credit for telecommunication investment and convert it into a matching grant program.
- Senate Bill 835 (Langer-holc-R-Cambria/Clearfield) establishes a grant program to spur telecommunications investment in underserved areas.

Ways to Facilitate Development Without Tax Dollars

- Senate Bill 1118 (Pittman-R-Indiana) and House Bill 2438 (Owlett-R-Potter/Tioga) streamline the process whereby a rural electric cooperative can upgrade existing electrical lines to have a Broadband component.
- House Bill 2055 (Snyder-D-Greene/Fayette) removes certain legal obstacles for small municipalities who are tired of waiting for Internet and decide to become an Internet Service Provider (ISP).
- Senate Resolution 48 (Phillips-Hill-R-York) directs that an audit be done on whether or not telecommunications companies are meeting current legal obligations regarding access to Broadband.
- House Bill 305 (Snyder-D-Greene/Fayette) and Senate Bill 470 (Phillips-Hill-R-York) would have an inventory take place of state-owned structures to identify which ones could be marketed to host telecommunications equipment. Those spaces would be leased with proceeds going to the Commonwealth.
- Right now, telephone users pay a nominal 911 fee to pay for citizens' use of 911 to report emergencies. Pennsylvania State Grange wants policymakers to look at a similar Broadband fee for cell phone users. There are likely more cell phones in Pennsylvania than there are people. Since universal access to Broadband helps strengthen PA's economy, education, health care and its agricultural base, all people should play a part in getting us there.

Try To Develop a Comprehensive Broadband Plan

• Senate Resolution 47 (Phillips-Hill-R-York) created a Broadband Task Force and Advisory Committee to compare different ways of reaching universal access to Broadband. Pennsylvania State Grange is the ONLY rural advocacy group included in the Advisory Committee. The resulting report would help legislators figure out what to do.

NOTE: This is not an encyclopedic list. Other bills have been introduced in both the House and Senate that address other pieces of the puzzle. The Pennsylvania State Grange supports all but one, the Restore PA plan proposed by the Wolf Administration. Our opposition presents several arguments:

• Restore PA is a \$4.5 billion dollar loan which would be paid back by taxing Marcellus Shale natural gas extraction (called a severance tax). If less gas is being extracted because of a low market price for natural gas, PA gets less money and taxpayers are left to make

up the difference in repaying the loan.

• Restore PA is supposedly meant to fund Broadband but there is no set amount dedicated for that purpose. Broadband must compete with flood remediation, downtown revitalisation, parks, transportation, and several other areas for this money. Any resources for Broadband would be diffused by money going to all these other purposes.

Vince Phillips is the lobbyist for the Pennsylvania State Grange. He has lobbied in PA since 1989, coming from the Nation's Capitol where, among other things, he served on President Reagan's Transition Team and held a Reagan Administration appointment at USDA.

PRESIDENT CAMPBELL'S LETTER PUBLISHED IN LANCASTER FARMING on July 25th, 2020

The Pennsylvania State Grange appreciates the intent of Governor Tom Wolf's recent letter to the President and Congress asking them to fund expansion of high-speed Broadband in unserved and underserved areas. We respectfully point out that good intentions are best demonstrated at home.

While the Governor established the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives with fanfare, he never funded it. In each State Budget he proposed, there was no line-item request for this important Office. How can the Office actually coordinate Pennsylvania's efforts to secure Federal funding and serve as a liaison between the FCC and State Government with no resources? The Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives has no budget or dedicated staff. The lone staff person is 'borrowed' from the Department of Community & Economic Development.

The Pennsylvania State Grange urges Governor Tom Wolf to reinforce the leadership he has shown in advocating Federal Broadband funding by helping his own Office of Broadband Initiatives function as it should. We fear that without funding, the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives will become irrelevant.

Following is a quote from the original letter from the Governor, joining other state Governors sent to President Trump and congressional leadership

Additional Broadband investment must meet the level of the challenge and be made at the speed that is clearly now required. This investment will unleash economic potential, promote stable job growth that's resilient in times like these, and ensure all businesses and families can participate in the digital economy.

Although good advice to Washington, at a minimum, we should start by funding the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives.

GRANGE APPLAUDS SENATE VOTE ON BROADBAND BILL

The Pennsylvania State Grange lauded the September 8 unanimous vote by the PA State Senate on Senate Bill 835 sponsored by Senator Wayne Langerholc (R-Cambria) to create an Authority which could award grants to telecommunications companies willing to "go the last mile" in providing access to high-speed Broadband in less populated parts of PA.

According to Grange President Wayne Campbell, Senate Bill 835 provides the opportunity for Pennsylvania to gain Federal resources to help the Commonwealth with Broadband expansion. "For the first time, there will be a centralized point to coordinate efforts", he said. "This is critical because the existing Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives has no budget, no staff, and little coordinating capacity to convince the Federal Government that Pennsylvania actually has a plan to achieve the universal access goal."

Senate Bill 835 must still pass the House and be sent to the Governor for his signature.

Universal access to high-speed Broadband is the number one priority for the Pennsylvania State Grange.

GRANGE URGES HOUSE YES VOTE ON AGRITOURISM LIABILITY BILL

The Pennsylvania State Grange is urging the PA House of Representatives to pass legislation that would provide limited civil liability to farmers seeking to provide agritourism and/or agri-entertainment to the general public. A letter was sent to Representatives September 11.

The bill is House Bill 1348 sponsored by Rep. Barb Gleim (R-Cumberland). Its rationale is that farmers are struggling and need to develop other sources of income to keep the family farm in operation. The Grange letter said that threat of frivolous lawsuits is a barrier and suggests that: 'Agritourism and agri-entertainment can bring in new income IF a farmer does not fear that a frivolous lawsuit will take away their farm. A farmer should take reasonable steps to protect visitors from hurting themselves with fences, warning signs, etc. What House Bill 1348 does is to protect the farmer from a lawsuit by someone who acts in an unsafe manner, gets hurt, and then sues the farmer'.

House Bill 1348 was scheduled for a House vote on Wednesday September 16. Currently, the bill has 63 sponsors.

The Grange letter concludes by saying, 'Agriculture supports Pennsylvania. The General Assembly should do everything it can to protect farmers in these vulnerable times.'

GRANGE APPLAUDS SENATE COMMITTEE TELEPHONE BILL VOTE

The Pennsylvania State Grange applauds the Senate Professional Licensure & Consumer Protection Committee for its favorable reporting of Senate Bill 1112 sponsored by Senator Kristin Phillips- Hill from York County. The September 22, 2020, committee vote was 12-1

The bill seeks to update Pennsylvania's regulatory oversight over Public Utility Commission-regulated rural telephone systems. "Despite society's overall reliance on Broadband, land-line telephones still remain a lifeline for many in rural Pennsylvania for the simple reason that they do not have access to wireless high-speed Broadband", said Grange President Wayne Campbell.

"This lack for many people means no access to Telemedicine which is critical in these COVID-19 days. This lack means limited ability to engage in commerce during the COVID-19 business shutdown", he stressed. "The COVID-19 crisis has illustrated the continuing necessity for land-line telephones until the day PA reaches the goal of universal access to high-speed Broadband. Even then, the utility poles may be the means by which to run the needed cable to provide that access."

Senate Bill 1112 removes regulatory administrative and other compliance cost barriers which now inhibit rural telephone companies from developing and providing Broadband capabilities.

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

This means new legislators even as we say goodbye to such Agriculture defenders like Rep. Mark Keller (R-Perry). Since Rep. Keller was the Majority Chair of the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee, those will be big shoes to fill. Thankfully, other members of the committee are likely to continue except for Rep. Marcia Hahn (R-Northampton) who also retired in 2020.

ACHIEVEMENT: BROAD-BAND

By far, the biggest success of the Pennsylvania State Grange is to bring an awareness to the General Assembly that universal access to high-speed Broadband is a must. Grange has been at the forefront of this issue and has played a significant role in almost every Broadband bill discussed.

In September, the PA Joint State Government Commission issued its long-awaited analysis of Broadband policy options. This blue-ribbon task force's report will be the blueprint for the General Assembly. Pennsylvania State Grange was the only member-based rural advocacy group appointed to work on the Broadband Report. This underscores both the leadership of the Grange and the credibility of the ideas we brought to that table. A separate

part of <u>Pennsylvania Grange News</u> goes into depth about the Broadband Report's findings and suggestions.

Bridging the Digital Divide was also demonstrated sadly by the COVID-19 Crisis of 2020. With businesses and schools being forced to close by government order, it illustrated just how vulnerable rural PA is since the prevailing answer was 'Do it on-line.'

- Schools closed? Learn remotely (by computer) --except you can't without
 Broadband.
- Can't get to medical treatment? Use Telemedicine --except that you can't without access to the Internet.
- Business closed? No problem. Market on-line --- but how, if there is little or no Internet service.
- Isolated and feeling lonely because of stay-at-home rules? Just access Facebook or some of the social media to stay connected --- How?

Pennsylvania State Grange was in the forefront in making sure that policymakers understood this reality.

Here are a few of the many Broadband issues worked on by the Grange:

- Legislation making it easier for rural electric cooperatives to piggyback Broadband onto their existing electric lines.
- Pushing to set up an independent authority to coordinate Broadband efforts in the Commonwealth. PA has left millions of Federal dollars on the table that could have helped expand Broadband but the state did not have a developed plan so the Federal resources went to other states. It sets up a grant program to telecommunication companies that expand high-speed Broadband to unserved areas.
- The Senate Resolution that set up the task force to analyze Broadband policy options.
- A bill to make it easier for



municipalities to become their own Internet Service Provider (ISP) in case the telecommunications companies have not supplied access.

- Legislation to inventory state-owned properties to see which could also host telecommunications equipment.
- · A bill to convert an existing telecommunications tax credit to a matching grant program to encourage telecommunications companies to expand their capacity to underserved or unserved areas without high-speed Broadband.
- Grange opposes Governor Wolf's Restore PA proposal that would have the state borrow \$4.5 billion and repay the loan with a new tax on natural gas extraction. Grange opposes this since:
 - -A huge loan like that would have to be borne by taxpayers should natural gas production be reduced because of a decline in natural gas prices. NOTE: The issue here is not whether someone likes or hates natural gas development. Rather, it is the matter of the state being fiscally responsible.
 - -Restore PA was marketed as the solution to Broadband when in fact, the money would be diffused in over ten specific categories besides Broadband.

ACHIEVEMENT: PA FARM BILL

Governor Tom Wolf and Secretary of Agriculture Russell Redding did something never done before in PA. They proposed a package of bills in an omnibus approach instead of a piecemeal approach to Agriculture. As a result, all but one of the multi-bill package were passed and signed into law. Some examples: new farmer incentives. assistance to dairy farmers, meat processors, urban agriculture, etc. Although lobbied on by the entire Agriculture Community, Pennsylvania State Grange was involved in seeking passage.

SETBACKS

At the end of day, the Pennsylvania State Grange stood alone in trying to prevent Sunday hunting. Despite this, legislation was passed to allow deer hunting on three Sundays. This was a long-standing source of conflict between agricultural groups and outdoor recreational users versus hunting and gun manufacturing interests. This was the biggest setback for the Grange but we held true to member-adopted policy (in 2005).

Another setback was Governor Wolf's veto on milk hauling legislation. Pennsylvania State Grange and others argued that milk haulers must pick up milk from dairy farms even when Interstates are closed due to a weather emergency. The General Assembly understood that cows don't wait to give milk and farms do not have storage resources big enough to wait for the milk to be hauled away. Sadly, the veto was not overridden by the General Assembly.

BACK IN 2021

Any bill that was not acted on in 2020 died at the end of the session. That means those issues will continue but as new legislation in 2021.

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MILESTONE BROADBAND REPORT RELEASED

The PA Joint State Government Commission issued an anticipated report September 3 analyzing options for Pennsylvania to reach a goal of universal access to high-speed Broadband.

This report resulted from PA Senate passage of Senate Resolution 47 sponsored by Senator Kristin Phillips-Hill (R-York). The intent was to convene a special task force and Advisory Committee to work through the multiple issues confronting the ultimate goal to provide all rural Pennsylvanians with contemporary technology - Internet, cell phones, etc.

The Pennsylvania State Grange was named to the Advisory Committee as the only one representing a rural member-based organization.

Other members included government entities such as the Public Utilities Commission, the Department of Community & Economic Development, and Center for Rural PA, etc. Other Advisory Committee members came largely from the telecommunications community.

WHAT IS IN THE BROAD-**BAND REPORT?**

Entitled Delivery of High-Speed Broadband Services to Unserved and Underserved Areas of the Commonwealth, the Report has several parts. First is a background on Broadband both from the Federal and PA levels. Next. there are sections dealing with the existing potentials for this technology in areas like education, Telemedicine, and production agriculture.

It also goes through how other states have addressed the problems caused by lack of access. Most important are the recommendations.

- A statewide independent broadband Authority should be established to serve as a central point of contact for coordinated broadband deployment.
- Broadband deployment should be permanently funded as a line item appropria-

- tion in the Commonwealth's annual budget for the proposed broadband authority. A dedicated Broadband Fund should be established to fund broadband deployment and improvement.
- Competitive market conditions for deployment do not reach all areas of need. Consequently, providers should be given incentives to meet service objectives in areas of marketplace failure, but such incentives must be tied to verifiable standards and objective accountability.
- Any community-based organization, municipality, rural electric cooperative, commercial entity, or fixed wireless provider, should be eligible for state-supported loans and grants administered by the broadband authority. All entities should meet specified qualifications to be able to assure the authority of the feasibility of their proposals.
- In those areas where "last mile" connectivity is not a viable option for commercial entities, community-based networks, municipalities, and existing infrastructure entities, such as rural electric cooperatives should be encouraged to attempt to fill in the gaps.
- Priority of efforts to expand broadband deployment should focus on unserved and underserved areas first, and be technology-neutral, both in terms of existing technology and new and evolving technologies.
- Broadband deployment efforts should include considerations of affordability to consumers. As part of broadband deployment funding, a recipient of state funding should be required to provide some level of minimum service at a uniform price as a low-cost alternative for

- lower income subscribers. Further, all providers should be expected to meet the same standards of speed and access to services for lower income subscribers regardless of geographic location.
- Anchor institutions such as schools, postsecondary institutions, libraries, municipal offices, community facilities, etc., in unserved and underserved areas should have a minimum high-speed level of wired services.
- The definition of broadband should provide for Internet speeds more consistent with current technological capabilities and needs, as well as contain a mechanism by which minimum speeds can be adjusted as technology evolves. The consensus of most of the advisory committee members is that the definition of broadband should be consistent with the FCC standard. Additionally, all entities that receive state funds to deploy broadband should be subject to the same speed standards.

NOTE: Of particular interest to Pennsylvania State Grange were recommendations one and two. There should be established an Authority to coordinate Broadband efforts in Pennsylvania. It should be independent with the responsibility to develop a Broadband Strategy in order to capture Federal resources. would also have the ability of awarding grants. Most important, it should have its own line item in the State Budget. Right now, the Governor's Office of Broadband Initiatives is handicapped because it has no real authority. It has no budget and it has no staff.

SOME OTHER GRANGE ISSUES

- Agritourism liability limits: Threat of frivolous lawsuits is a barrier. Agritourism and agri-entertainment can bring in new income IF a farmer does not fear that a frivolous lawsuit will take away their farm. A farmer should take reasonable steps to protect visitors from hurting themselves with fences, warning signs, etc. Legislation protects the farmer from a lawsuit by someone who acts in an unsafe manner, gets hurt, and then sues the farmer'.
- **Distracted Driving:** Legislation would make it illegal for drivers to use a handheld electronic device while operating a vehicle.
- Dairy: The Pennsylvania State Grange was represented on the PA Dairy Future Commission by member Dina Zug. Among other things, she advocated greater promotion of milk and dairy exports and more utilization of the Port of Philadelphia.
- Dairy: Legislation would set up the Keystone Dairy Opportunity Zones to attract investment in regional dairy processers through tax credits for this investment. A partner to that is legislation to help the PA Milk Marketing Board and the PA Department of Revenue keep better track of outside milk coming into PA by the bigfood chains.
- Farm Opportunities: The Pennsylvania State Grange advocates legislation that would allow farmers to utilize barns as an agri-entertainment resource by allowing an exemption from state building code construction standards. It is called 'the wedding barn bill'.
- **Abuse of Power:** The Delaware River Basin Commission is an unelected region-



al body made up of the five Governors from DE, NJ, PA, NY, and MD. It is trying to prevent any fracking or natural gas development in northeastern PA. This is considered by the Pennsylvania State Grange as an abuse of power since the Commission's action is a direct conflict with established PA state law that regulates fracking and natural gas development in the entire state and not all of PA except for northeast PA. NOTE: The issue here to the Grange is not whether fracking is good or bad. Rather, it is all about whether or not PA gets to regulate its own affairs.

Abuse of Power: Governor Wolf joined the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), a multi-state body having the authority to impose fines on facilities using coal for energy. Grange opposes RGGI since there is a policy position opposing cap and trade and the fact that the Governor should not be able to force Pennsylvania into a regional unelected body that has power over the Commonwealth without getting the General Assembly to disagree.


