Philadelphia to create blocks for
our quilt trail at the PA Farm Show
and select locations in the city
areas. This is a huge opportunity to
embrace new designs and provide
a voice to our children who reside
in Pennsylvania's urban areas.

The Pennsylvania State Grange Heritage Quilt Trail which started out as the vision of Glenn and Barbara Gross of Emlenton, PA to showcase Grange Halls and fairgrounds across Pennsylvania with beautiful wooden quilt blocks.

The program has been offered since 2009. Grangers embraced creating the quilt blocks and the Quilt block program is one of the favorite workshops held every year at the Family Festival event where you can create your own block.

The committee is pleased in the interest of the Pennsylvania State Grange Heritage Quilt Trail and is

excited on expanding the program to include additional locations in urban areas.

PA Farm Show

A few years ago an extension of the trail was added to the PA Farm Show Complex with 100 wooden quilt blocks being hung for permanent display in the corridor as you enter the Main Exhibition Hall.

The Farm Show has completed renovations on another hallway that will showcase additional quilt blocks. These quilt blocks will be created by kids across the state focusing on urban areas such as Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, York, and Philadelphia. We anticipate having 100 more blocks to adorn the Farm Show Complex that will showcase quilt blocks with urban life designs.

Volunteers and Financial Help

Volunteers are needed to assist as a Trainer, teaching how to design and paint the blocks. A helper to assist overseeing the project in each region would be very helpful.. We are pursuing some grants to assist in the cost of the Pennsylvania State Grange Heritage Quilt Trail. If you would like to help by donating to defray the expenses it is appreciated.



Please keep an eye on legislative activity at all levels. Your local municipality will be receiving Federal monies from Covid Relief Funding. These monies come with very strict guidelines attached to them but please be sure your local officials are getting their applications in.

Continue to talk to your government officials about Broadband. We must be sure and keep this issue in the forefront.

Hopefully you receive the email from National Grange titled "View From The Hill." The following is an excerpt from the one received on July 30, 2021:

Relief from Surprise Medical Bills

The Departments of Health and Human Services, Labor, Treasury and the Office of Management and Budget have issued an interim final rule intended to restrict excessive

out-of- pocket costs to consumers from surprise billing and balance billing. Surprise billing occurs when patients unknowingly get care from providers who are outside of their health plan's network. Balance billing occurs when a provider charges a patient the remainder of what their insurance does not pay. Balance billing is prohibited by both Medicare and Medicaid. This rule will extend the prohibition to employer-sponsored and commercial health plans.

The rule will also ban:

- Surprise billing for emergency services
- High out-of-network cost-sharing; any coinsurance or deductible must be based on in-network provider rates.
- Out-of-network charges for ancillary care (such as an anesthesiologist or assistant surgeon) at an in-network facility
- Health care providers must give patients clear advance notice and get patient consent before higher out-ofnetwork rates can be charged.

Relief from surprise billings has been a National Grange priority for several years, so this is welcome news. These new regulations will take effect on January 1, 2022. This is great news for every American in need of health care. State Session is now just around the corner. I'm hoping to see many of you in Valley Forge in October.

Let's continue to "Cultivate Connections" anywhere we can and familiarize others with the Grange.



Helpful Hints

The fall marks the beginning of a new Grange year. This is the perfect time to reflect on the past year and, most importantly, plan for next year. Think about what went well this past year, as well as identify areas for growth. Below are some helpful hints for Lecturers/Program Directors as you plan for the coming year.



• Hold a planning meeting. This can be held as a separate meeting or as your Literary Program. Have your members brainstorm ideas for programs and ask for volunteers to help plan programs throughout the year. Planning is critical for meaningful literary programs. Pick topics that are of interest to your members, tap into resources within your Grange membership, and follow through with these ideas.

• Appoint a committee.

"Teamwork makes the dream work!" As Lecturer/Program Director, you do not have to do all the work alone. Utilize a committee to help you with brainstorming, planning, making contacts, and leading programs. Working with a committee also helps you gain insight into others' perspectives and interests.

• Make a calendar for the year.

Make a calendar for the next year with your meeting dates listed. For each meeting of the year, determine the program topic, potential speakers, and activities.

- Make contact with presenters early and follow up. If you are planning to invite an outside speaker (or a member of your Grange) to lead a meeting, make the "ask" early, in the time between the initial invitation and the program, follow up with the presenter to iron out any details.

This is an excellent way to get information about you Grange out in your community and to invite members of the community into your meetings. After a program or activity, follow up with a recap.








National Grange Hall of Fame Inductees

Pennsylvania can be very pleased that three of its Past Presidents (Masters) - Leonard Rhone, John W. Scott, and J. Luther Snyder - have been honored with induction into the National Grange "Hall of Fame". All were nominated by the PA State Grange History Committee and were favorably accepted at the national level. This recognition program honors (deceased) members who played a significant role in the history and development of the National Grange. A special tribute will be given to these three men at the September 18th anniversary kick-off luncheon when current National Grange president Betsy Huber is expected to introduce and explain the Hall of Fame program.

Leonard Rhone from Centre County, inducted in 2019, served Pennsylvania as State Overseer from 1878-80 and Master from 1880-98, concurrently serving both on the National Grange Executive Committee from 1888-1898 (seven years as Chair) and High Priest of Demeter from 1889-1895.

Brothers Scott and Snyder were scheduled for their Hall of Fame induction in 2020 but COVID-related changes in the National Grange session have delayed that recognition until 2021. John W. Scott of Butler County was Pennsylvania State Master from 1962-68 during which time he also served as National Grange Gatekeeper 1963-65 and Secretary 1965-69. He became the first Pennsylvanian to be elevated to the position of National Master, serving in that office from 1969-1979.

J. Luther Snyder from York County was State Secretary from 1967-74 and State Master from 1974-1979. He served as National Grange Priest Annalist in the Assembly of Demeter from 1976-87.



Anthony (Tony) John Fishovitz served in the Air Force from 1973-1976. Tony held the rank of Sergeant stationed at Ellsworth Air Force Base in Rapid City, SD. During his time of service he worked in the MinuteMan Missile Silos as an Electro Mechanical Technician. Tony is a member of Big Knob Grange #2008, Beaver County

Military Info

Tony served in the Air Force from 1973 -1976 after enlisting at the local recruiting office. Basic training was at Lackland AFB in San Antonio, Texas. Next, stop was to Chanute AFB in Rantoul, Illinois for training as a Missile Systems Analyst for about 6 months. From there, off to Ellsworth AFB in Rapid City, South Dakota where he spent the rest of his enlistment. Tony was assigned to the 44th Strategic Missile Wing and worked to repair and/or replace Minuteman Missile II missile site components. During this time, he traveled to many of the 150 missile sites and the 15 launch control centers in Western South Dakota. At the time of his discharge, he had obtained the rank of Sergeant and had held the position of Chief on the electrical mechanical maintenance team. Because of his love for South Dakota and the experience and interest in electronics he gained in the military, he decided to pursue a degree at South Dakota School of Mines and Technology in Rapid City, South Dakota, where he graduated in 1980 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Electrical

Engineering. Immediately following graduation Tony went to work for Westinghouse Electric Corporation in the Pittsburgh area. Amid several parent company changes, Tony remained with the company retiring in 2016 with 36 years of employment with the current Eaton Corporation.

Many of his military friendships have remained over the years and continue to expand especially

through Facebook.



Thank you for your service!

When Tony was asked for a memory from military service he shared a story of his first helicopter ride.

As a missile man stationed with the 44th Missile Wing at Ellsworth AFB my most important job was to help keep the Minute Man II missiles up on strategic alert so they could be launched at a moment's notice given the command by the president.

During the winter of 1975-76 western South Dakota had a 3-day blizzard that shut down half the state and knocked down power lines to several of the missile sites forcing them to go on emergency power. The high winds of the blizzard also forced snow into the diesel generators at the missile sites forcing them to shut down and consequently shutting down the missile site.

In order to get the missile sites back up on strategic alert crews had to get to the sites and dig out the diesel generators.

After the blizzard the roads were impassible. So, helicopters were used to fly work teams out to the missile sites. All of the helicopters that were in service had picked up their crews and headed out in all directions to sites as far away as 120 miles from the base. There were several helicopters in the maintenance hangar with one of them being air worthy. Command ordered that helicoopter released from maintenance and my team was picted to fly on it to one of the nearby missile sites.


When I arrived at the helicopter I notice that the side windows were removed and not replaced. When I asked the pilot why we were flying in basically an open air helicopter his response was "I don't like the idea either but Command says it will get us there and back." So with my parka zipped up and my hood over my head on a bright and beautiful 10 degree day I took my first helicopter ride.

FAMILY FESTIVAL 2021

State Grange held its legislative update session at Family Festival. Carrie Nace, legislative consultant, gave an update on what has been happening in Harrisburg as well ask members present what their biggest priorities were for the upcoming year. Many great topics were covered such as vertical farming, and the Grange's stance on solar, healthcare and broadband. Many of these topics will be discussed in greater detail at state session in October

2021-22 State Budget Completed

Governor Wolf signed Senate Bill 255 into law as Act 1-A. The \$40.8 billion represents an under 3percent increase in state spending for the fiscal year which began July 1, 2021. Agriculture fared pretty well with funding levels for most programs staying largely the same. The total PA Department of Agriculture budget (State, not Federal money) increased by \$4.8 million to a new total of \$174,515 million. Of key interest to the Pennsylvania State Grange was support for Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences agriculture research, Penn State Extension, and the University of Pennsylvania's School of Veterinary Sciences programs. Another success for rural PA in the State

Budget is a \$5.0 million program to expand access to high-speed Broadband.

THIS FALL THE LEGISLATURE RECONVENES

After the summer recess, the PA General Assembly resumes its work in the fall. Suffice it to say that their agenda will be full. Here are some of the major issues which will occupy legislators' time:

- -PA response to the COVID-19 pandemic
- -Reapportionment
- -Election Reforms 2.0 (The first Voter ID bill was vetoed by the Governor)
- -Nursing home and patient care issues
- -Prescription drug pricing
- -Opioid epidemic and how to spend PA opioid settlement dollars
- -Unemployment Compensation system
- -How to spend the Federal Government's COVID-19 multibillion dollar funding to the Commonwealth

HOW CAN PENNSYLVANIA STATE GRANGE MEMBERS BECOME INVOLVED IN THESE PRIORITIES

The National Grange began as an advocacy organization to give farmers a voice in the economic issues of the 1800s. This advocacy continued in the 20th Century with the Grange seeking and winning on issues like rural-free delivery of U.S. Mail and rural electrification.

This advocacy was mirrored by the Pennsylvania State Grange as one of or even the first PA rural membership organization. Founded in 1873, the Pennsylvania State Grange advanced the interests of your predecessors and advocates for you today. As one current example, the Pennsylvania State Grange is a prominent leader in pushing for expansion of high-speed Broadband. Several of our priorities are already enacted making it easier for electric cooperatives to expand Broadband services to areas they cover, getting actual state money being spent on Broadband expansion, and 5G legislation that was just signed into law this past June.

Advocacy

As a collective body, the Pennsylvania State Grange wants to continue to have influence in Harrisburg. Members can stay involved in the following ways:

First, stay informed. Be aware of what is happening legislatively that will affect you, your family and

Second, meet your legislator if you have not already done so, autumn is the best time to get to know your legislator. Get to know him or her on a first-name basis. It can be as simple as calling the district office and say that you are a constituent and want to get together for a cup of coffee and

conversation. Whether it is property tax reform (waiving property taxes for historic Grange halls), access to health care such as Telemedicine (along with the reminder that Internet medicine is great if you have high-speed Broadband, not useful if you don't), or a wide range of other issues. The Pennsylvania State Grange can help coach you for that meeting and give you back-up on the issues to make the meeting with a lawmaker a success for you both.

Third, subscribe to your legislator's constituent newsletter list. That way, you get early notice of legislator-sponsored events like a senior expo or a Second Amendment seminar, or a town hall – many of these are virtual because of COVID-19.

Fourth, have the legislator choose you as his or her go-to person when it comes to your issues. Legislators must vote on a huge range of issues and often, they do not know much about many of them. They are forced to learn from their staff, what their party leadership tells them or what lobbyists tell them in Harrisburg.

Would it not be better if your Representative or Senator gets information from you? You know your world! Chances are that the legislator does not unless their background is a lot like yours. No one knows dairy issues better than a dairy farmer. If you farm or are retired from farming, you can help a legislator cast more informed votes on farm policy. If you are in business, you have first-hand knowledge of the need for

economic development and business investment in your community. Why shouldn't you educate a policymaker about tax issues or about the need for universal access to high-speed Broadband?

How does one get chosen by a legislator as "their expert"? Understand that your goal is to get the legislator to ask you about issues and what he or she should do. One way to do so is to invite the legislator to your farm or place of business to show him or her what you do.

If there is a Grange public service event, invite them. Although the Fair season will be mostly over when you read this, some Grangers in 2021 will have invited their legislators to visit them at the Grange booth. Legislators are going to the Fair anyway since that's where the people are, so it's not hard to convince a legislator to visit your booth. Perhaps a photo could be taken for use in the legislator's constituent newsletter. That type of citizen interaction helps him or her show voters community involvement. It also helps the Grange because people reading the newsletter may be prompted to find out more of what the Grange is all about.





October Is National Chili Month





First prepared somewhere in Southern Texas or Northern Mexico, chili started out as a simple preparation of meat and spices. Working-class women stewed beef pieces, chilis, and other vegetables and spices to make a hearty dish that would feed a whole family. In San Antonio, women known as "Chili Queens" made and sold chili by the bowlful in the city's markets. Soon "Chili Parlors" began popping up, and the practice spread throughout Texas and other states, with each Chili Parlor claiming its own special, secret recipe. At its core, chili is just a seasoned stew of beef and chili peppers, topped with cheese and onions. But don't be fooled — this deceptively simple dish sparks heated debates over what ingredients truly belong there. The only ingredients people can agree on are chilis and beef — the rest is up for debate. Even though beans seem like a natural addition, some chili connoisseurs swear beans have no place there at all.

Today, chili remains a popular part of American cuisine and ubiquitous camping food. You can find dozens of varieties including beef, bean-less, vegetarian, and turkey to suit your tastes.

Chili

1 1/2 pounds ground beef1 (32 oz) can tomato juice2 (16 oz) cans Mexican-style stewed tomatoes

2 (15 oz) cans chili beans

2 cups water
1 onion, chopped
1 teaspoon salt
chili powder to taste

Brown the ground beef in a skillet, stirring until crumbly; drain. Combine the tomato juice, undrained tomatoes, undrained beans, water, onion, salt and chili powder in a saucepan and mix well. Stir in the ground beef. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally; reduce heat. Cook until of the desired consistency, stirring occasionally. Adjust the seasonings. Ladle into chili bowls. Yield: 6 servings.


