# On a Mission to the Nation's Capitol

Members Volunteer and Visit National Grange Monument for Restoration Project

Washington, DC- A small group of PA Pomona members (York-Adams Pomona #40) in April visited the only "private" monument on the National Mall in our nation's Capital. They were on a mission with one major objective in mind, restore beauty and luster to the National Grange Marker that had become severely tarnished and rather dingy.

York-Adams Pomona President Carl Meiss (former PA State Grange President) was part of the team dedicated to restoring beauty to this national historical marker. According to Mr. Meiss, "After seeing a photo of the condition of the historical marker I just knew we had to do something." I asked our Pomona Vice-President Bob Bair to check into what can be done."

Bair said he contacted Congressman Scott Perry, PA 10th District to initiate how to volunteer to restore the patina and condition of the Grange marker on National Park grounds.

Congressman Perry, a member of Valley Grange No. #1360 in Lewisberry, immediately realized how meaningful this memorial in Washington is to Grange members and the entire Grange organization. Bair said Congressman Perry initiated contact with the National Park Service (NPS) on our behalf. "Everyone associated with the National Park Service (NPS) was exceptional," claims Bair. He added, "When the April date to visit Washington was established our small delegation arrived in DC and we were greeted and treated magnificently by all of the National Park officials.'

Lindy Gulick from the National Park Service is the Architectural Conservator for the National Mall and Memorial Parks. She was on site waiting and welcomed us at the marker as we arrived on the Mall and was fully prepared with all the special materials and equipment needed for our team to clean, wax and polish the bronze plaque.

A very special and impressive official greeting was also given by the National Parks Service Park Ranger and Volunteer Coordinator, U.S. Army Staff Sergeant James Pierce (Ret.) upon our arrival. He thanked the group in advance for volunteering their time to the park service and this project. He told us he had volunteer t-shirts and NPS souvenir water bottles for us, too! Then, unexpectedly, he asked us if we ever heard of the suicide bomber in the Khost Province in Afghanistan on October 1, 2012.

Pierce went on to describe that he was with the 514th Military Police Company out of Winterville, North Carolina when he was injured in Afghanistan. He lifted and then tapped on his leg, we heard metallic sound of his metal appendage. He shared with us how the attack killed three of his teammates and he was one of three that were wounded. James spent 3 years recovering at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center as a member of Able Company in the Warrior Transition Unit.

"Thank you for your service," were the first words quickly uttered by Carl Meis and our volunteer team as we listened to this military hero and Park Ranger welcome us. Bair recalls struggling a bit to hold back tears as Staff Sergeant Pierce described how much he gave and lost. He offered encouragement by welcoming and thanking Grange members for volunteering to attend to our historic marker that was suffering and needed our attention.

#### GAME COMMISSION UPDATES PUBLIC ON CWD SURVEILLANCE

HARRISBURG, PA - With deer seasons over for the 2021-22 season, the busiest time for chronic wasting disease (CWD) surveillance has ended. CWD, a fatal neurological disease, is a threat to both white-tailed deer and elk and has been detected within the wild deer population in several areas of Pennsylvania. Monitoring for CWD is a yearround endeavor, but the most intense efforts revolve around Pennsylvania's deer hunting seasons. The public can view the results of these efforts on the CWD Surveillance Dashboard available online.

The CWD Surveillance Dashboard continues to be updated weekly and allows the public view past and current information related to CWD, and for hunters who submitted their deer for testing to access the results online.

Since July 1, 2021, the Game Commission has collected more than 11,000 CWD samples from deer. Hunters across five Disease Management Areas (DMAs) submitted more than 5,000 of those samples. More than 2,900 samples were collected from processors as part of the Game Commission's statewide surveillance efforts.

Of the number sampled, CWD was detected in a total of 253 deer.

"CWD surveillance is crucial to managing the disease," said agency CWD Section Supervisor Andrea Korman. "The Game Commission manages wildlife for, and in partnership with, the public. This partnership is exemplified by the willingness of hunters to harvest and submit deer for testing," Determining the extent of CWD infection in high-priority areas, such as around a new detection or on the leading edge of disease expansion, is critical to managing the spread of the disease. One way this is accomplished is through CWD Deer Management Assistance Program (DMAP) units. For 2021-22, there were 10 specific CWD DMAP units across the state.

Hunters could purchase up to two additional antlerless permits to be used within these CWD DMAP areas. Increased surveillance in these CWD DMAP Units is essential to understanding if these cases were the first signs of disease in the area or a symptom of established disease. Results from these samples help guide future management efforts.

In addition to CWD DMAP units, the Game Commission selected three areas last fall as Containment Zones (CZs). CZs are small areas – about a 1-mile radius, or the average size of a deer's home range – around the location of an outlying CWD-positive deer.

Landowners and hunters within these smaller CZs are offered additional opportunities to harvest deer to remove those that may have come into contact with the infected deer. These opportunities include both special regulations and extended hunting seasons. The Game Commission continued to work with these landowners after the hunting seasons and conducted additional removals in two of the three CZs to reduce the risk of CWD establishing in and spreading from the immediate area surrounding the initial CWD detection.

"The results of this year's efforts in these areas around recent detections were encouraging" said Korman. "We received good cooperation from landowners and hunters, increased sampling close to the detection, and found no new CWD positive animals. Moving forward, we will continue working with hunters to get more samples in these areas to properly assess the presence or absence of CWD."

As with previous years, most of the deer that tested positive for CWD in the 2021-22 hunting season came from DMA 2 located in south central Pennsylvania. Specifically, they have been concentrated within DMA 2 in the Established Area (EA) that covers portions of Bedford, Blair, Franklin, Fulton, and Huntingdon counties. This area, where CWD is considered to be established within the deer population, has produced nearly 90% of Pennsylvania's CWDpositives since the disease first was detected here in 2012.

"Based on the number of CWD-positive animals we continue to detect in this area, it's clear that CWD is a persistent problem and will require long-term management," Korman said. "People in Pennsylvania believe that responding to wildlife disease is one of the Game Commission's most important roles. Therefore, the Game Commission must act to address CWD for the benefit of both the resource and the public."

While disappointing for the hunter, harvesting a CWD positive deer protects the resource by removing a diseased animal from the landscape and helps manage CWD," she said.



## Government Matters Carrie Nace Novak Strategic Advisors

I hope this article finds every
Grange family having had a
wonderful summer filled with
family, friends and good
health. Summer has been filled
with many great Pennsylvania
State Grange events from Royalty
Day to Family Fest to Ag Progress
Days. I enjoy each and every event
as a chance to connect with
members from all over
Pennsylvania.

June started and ended extremely busy in the Capitol with the crafting of the 2022-23 state budget. As I mentioned in the last edition of the PGN, at times this process became contentious as political divisiveness continues among the caucuses.

Thankfully, this did not extend to funding for Agriculture. When it comes to Pennsylvania's Number One industry, legislators are civil and when there are differences, opponents are treated respectfully. Mostly, everyone tries to get along. Case in point, look at some legislative votes before the legislature's summer recess:

- \$45.2 billion State Budget **Senate Bill 1100. Status:** Enacted into law in early July; House vote: 180-20; Senate vote 48-1.
- House Bill 1694 limits liability for volunteers and organizations who help improve private property for

recreational use providing that the property owner has given permission. **Status:** Passed House 200-0; on Senate voting calendar.

- **Senate Bill 251** is a major re-write of the state's Fertlizer Law. Status: It was signed into law as Act 83 of 2022. Votes: Senate 48-1; House 184-16.
- House Bill 223 authorizes creation of Keystone Opportunity Dairy Zones to stimulate investment in milk processing facilities in PA. Status: Passed House 198-0; Senate Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee voted 11-0.



- Senate Bill 1236 updates a funding program to help very small meat processors in PA. Status: It was signed into law as Act 52 of 2022 after a Senate vote of 50-0 and a House vote of 199-0.
- House Bill 1598 streamlines the state's flood control efforts by placing them under the jurisdiction of the PA Emergency Management Agency (PEMA). Status: It was signed into law as Act 65 of 2022. House vote was 202-0. Senate vote was 50-0.

These results did not always come easy. It takes years of persistent lobbying, advocacy and education of lawmakers and their staff about the importance of supporting Pennsylvania Agriculture. This translates into literally thousands of meetings and communications over time.

The other key ingredient to this successful record is the membership of the Pennsylvania State Grange. Our members talk to their legislators at home and tell them about the real world impact of policy decisions. Grange members are at the heart of rural Pennsylvania and decision makers listen when they share their views.

This strong and persistent advocacy and education had a great part in waking the General Assembly to the need for universal access to high-speed broadband in PA. This led to the law which creates the Broadband Authority which will be a source of funding to get the job done. The Pennsylvania State Grange is proud to have been asked to participate on the authority. With a general election in November that will decide a new United States Senator, our new

November that will decide a new United States Senator, our new Governor and members of the General Assembly in Pennsylvania, our lobbying will continue advocating for the needs of agriculture and rural communities. I am asking all grange members to help out by:

# - Being **registered to vote...AND VOTING**.

- Keeping up with issues so that you know what legislation affects your livelihood, your family, and your community. The Pennsylvania State Grange will do its part by keeping you up to date on the issues coming out of Harrisburg.
- Getting to **know your legislator**. Schedule a meeting on key issues in the district office or ask him or her to visit your farm if you are involved in production agriculture.
- **Sign up for your legislator's email newsletter** to keep informed on what is going on and up to date on issues.

Because agriculture is so important, there are always other legislative mountains to climb. For example, protecting the nation's food supply, reduce burdens facing rural PA due to federally-mandated stormwater management, making universal broadband a reality and striking a balance between alternative solar energy and preserving prime farmland just to name a few. How do we move forward to make our voice heard? The answer lies in effective lobbying by the Grange and active involvement by Grange members to achieve our goals. It is a team approach and both are vital to our continued legislative success.



### Family Fest Legislative Session and Zoom meetings

I was thrilled to have many Grangers attend the annual legislative meeting at the 2022 Family Fest at the Centre County Grange Fairgrounds. We had a robust conversation around many pressing issues facing rural Pennsylvania. It is always great getting perspectives from a diverse group of Grange members. While we discussed many familiar issues such as policy surrounding dairy, broadband and solar, one issue that is increasingly becoming a concern is preemption issues in regard to local governments.

In early July, Senator Yaw's legislation to prevent local governments to preempt state law on natural gas drilling was vetoed by the governor. This legislation was in response to a local government enacting an ordinance to restrict drilling within its boundaries on state parks. This is an issue that the Grange needs to monitor as it could have implications on broadband infrastructure, right to farm law restrictions among others in the future.

The marker was placed on the DC

Mall in 1951 by The National Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry, commonly called the Grange and bears the following inscription:

Near this site The National Grange of the Patrons of Husbandry was organized on December 4, 1867 in the office of the Superintendent of the propagating gardens
Department of Agriculture The Founders of the Grange were:
Oliver H. Kelley William Saunders
Aaron B. Grosh John Trimble John
H. Thomson Francis McDowell
William M. Ireland Assisted by
Caroline A. Hall This tablet erected by the National Grange, 1951.

# Pomona Granges were not part of the original Grange plan



Pomona Granges were not part of the original plan by the Seven Founders for the Order of Patrons of Husbandry. Originally the Fifth Degree was assigned to the State Grange and the Sixth Degree remained jurisdiction of the National Grange. The longer Granges functioned the more apparent it became that a need existed for some form of district organization that would bind together the local Granges within a given area. The initial response to this need was the formation of councils, usually on a county basis, but without uniformity and not intended to be a formal part in the established Grange setup. No ritualistic work was attempted at these council meetings

and in most instances they were informal gatherings of Grange members open to any interested parties. At the 1874 national session in St. Louis, Missouri, an amendment was made to the National Grange Constitution to establish district or county Grange units, but the organizational responsibility was delegated to each State Grange, whereas the organization of Subordinate Granges had been the responsibility of the National Grange from the very beginning. Pomona Grange meetings were often huge gatherings lasting one, two or even three days in an age when "taking in Pomona" was a welcome time away from the daily grind of the farm. In 1923 the National Grange took over the responsibility for the chartering of Pomona Granges and in 1924 action was adopted to give complete jurisdiction over the Fifth Degree to Pomona Granges.

The first Pomona organized in Pennsylvania was Dauphin-Perry #1 on May 11, 1875, but it was disbanded sometime prior to 1894 when the earliest officers' registers exist. The oldest active Pomona in the state is now Cumberland County #2, organized on May 24, 1875, later adding Dauphin, Lancaster, and York before those counties organized their own Pomona Granges; Pomona #2 disbanded about 1907 and re-organized June 15, 1912. Seventy-three Pomona Granges were organized in Pennsylvania between 1875 and 1931 when the last Pomona formed in the state was Franklin County #73.



### Schnitzenknepp (A typical Pennsylvania Dutch dish)

Take some sweet schnitz (sweet apples dried with the skins). Put in kettle with good sized piece of bacon. Brown sugar enough to make them taste pleasant. About twenty minutes before you want to serve dinner add the knepp, which is simply dumplings made out of dough raised with yeast, cover tightly and serve altogether.

This dish was usually made on days when bread baking was in progress. Now when we want schnitzenknepp we send to the bakery and get a nickels worth of dough and work that up into dumplings.
