Entomophagy Program Provided Unusual But Tasty Snacks

The program at the August 1st Grange meeting was anything but routine or boring.

Mr. Nathan "Nate" Moyer of Selinsgrove, an industrial arts and agriculture teacher in the Greenwood School District (pictured below in maroon shirt), gave a fast paced and light hearted look into the topic of "insects for food". When Nate initially asked how many of those present would never consider eating an insect, about half of the audience raised their hands amid snickers and comments of "yuck". But by the end of his presentation that evening, many of those who earlier had raised their hands were enticed to try edible insects, albeit doing so with some trepidation and nervous laughter. Most who sampled were surprised at the tastiness of the bug snacks..... just ask Janet Reynolds!



Among the bug snacks offered were: fruit bread made with whole crickets giving it a nutty crunch; trail mix of almonds, chocolate pieces & grasshoppers and another mixture of fly larvae, mealworms & barbeque flavored grasshoppers.

Coming Down the Home Stretch!

A great deal of progress has been made this past month with multiple property improvements and repairs around the Grange Hall and grounds.

Thanks to a generous anonymous member's \$1,000 donation, the installation of the outdoor lighted sign has been completed with the exception of making the electrical connection. When the underground conduit wiring and timer is installed by King's Electrical & Plumbing, the sign can be lighted each evening from dusk until 10 p.m. or thereabouts. The dual sided Eagle Grange #1 name placard was made by Abby Sign Co. of Montoursville, and is an attractive identification for all who pass by the Grange Hall. Doug Bonsall finished the landscaping under and around the sign on a rainy August day while other volunteers were working with corn in the hall.

Approved at the August 1st meeting was a \$10,990 bid from Frey Plumbing & Heating to install a heat pump system to bring heat and air conditioning into the kitchen and rest rooms of the Grange Hall. The 50% down payment for this work was made on 8/21/2023 so materials could be ordered and the actual work scheduled. Funding will come from a \$5,820 anonymous gift from another generous member received through the State Grange Foundation and the Grange's decision to withdraw up to \$5,000 from Eagle's custodial fund; these are monies received from the sale of real estate from the several Granges which merged into Eagle. Held in trust by the State Grange, the principal may be accessed for property improvements and community service projects.

Volunteers preparing for the Grange's take-out dinners provide another important part of the fund

raising needed to do property upgrades. A Grange friend from Perry County donated this sweet corn.



Part of the volunteer crew – (above) Larry Robbins, Irvin Reynolds, Ruth Lundy and Bernie Downey – did the husking and brushing outside while another group – (below) Hilda Sampsell, Joann Murray, Doug Bonsall and Janet Reynolds – worked inside to cut and bag the corn for freezing. Others also helped.



Also now completed is the repair/re-painting of the fire escape, the replacement of three ill-fitting wooden exterior doors and the addition of panic hardware/closers on two existing metal doors. This work was completed in mid-August by King's Electrical & Plumbing of Montgomery for a total cost of \$8,766. We no longer have a wobbly, inadequately anchored fire escape stairs. Now the escape is firmly attached to the side of the building and supported on a concrete pad at ground level.
