As spring and warmer weather get closer and closer, it is a reminder that the year is moving along!

All of the details about the Lecturer's contests and programs can be found in the 2022-2023 Guide to Contests and Programs, available at www.pagrange.org – both on the "Documents" page and on the "Lecturer's" page.

Members' talents in many areas can be nurtured and encouraged through programming. Encourage members to participate in the Photography Contest by asking a local photographer to present a program on "pro tips" for taking great pictures. The Photography Contest is now virtual and is open to any and all members – no preliminary judging at the local/Subordinate Grange level is required. Classes include: bridges, wildlife, landscape, people, and celebrations.

Similarly, local artists, craftsmen, and writers could lead programs about their skills and foster these gifts in your members. Encourage them to participate in the Art, My Favorite Anything, or Pen In Hand contests.

Work with your Lecturer to plan meaningful programs that would be of interest to your members. As you plan programs, remember the "Design a Program" contest - an opportunity to share the programs you are creating for both recognition and to share ideas with other local program directors. Document the programs that you are holding - both by summarizing what happened and - MOST IMPORTANTLY - taking pictures! We should be sharing these summaries and photos with local media and on social media, like Facebook, to get the word out about the programs and other activities and events happening in our Granges. Keep these pictures so that you can prepare a Lecturer's

Scrapbook for the year, both as a way to look back at what your Grange has done and also to enter in the Scrapbook Contest.

As you plan programs, if you find yourselves wanting to host a program that is beyond your financial abilities, keep in mind that we began a "Lecturer's Grant" a few years ago for exactly this purpose – to financially support local Lecturers/Program Directors who need it.

Family Festival – July 13-16, 2023 – Centre County Grange Fairgrounds – Centre Hall, PA

The Pennsylvania State Grange's Family Festival will again be held at the Centre County Fairgrounds in July. As I write this, the schedule of events is still being finalized, but plan to participate in the following activities:

- State Grange Talent Contest - The annual talent 🤾 contest will be held during the Family Festival on Saturday evening. I know our Grangers have talent and this is the opportunity to show case that talent! NEW THIS YEAR -Preregistration will be REQUIRED by June 15th (the same deadline as Family Festival registrations). Participants can enter in 3 classes - Vocal, Instrumental, and Variety. All acts are limited to a 5-minute maximum. There are cash prizes for the top three entries in each class. Plus, the best overall act - named the Best of Show - is given the opportunity to represent Pennsylvania in the National Grange Evening of Excellence, which is held in conjunction with the National Grange Convention in November 2023. This year's National Convention is in Niagara Falls, New York, November 14-18!

- Sip & Paint - Back by popular demand! Plan to join us for our 3rd annual Paint & Sip - a fun painting class led by an instructor - on Friday, July 14th from 9:00-11:00 am. The instructor will lead the group through painting a picture on canvas while we enjoy some "mocktail" refreshments. This is perfect for artists of all abilities and experience! This year, the Sip & Paint will be a fundraiser for the 150th Anniversary Session! The cost will be \$20 and will cover the instructor fee and all materials. All proceeds will be donated to the 150th Anniversary Session! Join us for a fun time for a great cause!

March:

- March 1 - Peanut Butter Lovers' Day - many of us love peanut butter, but there are also many people who are allergic to peanuts and other nuts, often times dangerously so. Invit e an allergist or other medical professional to talk about food allergies, how to be aware of these food allergies to avoid possibly dangerous situations, and how to safely respond if you are around someone having a severe allergy reaction.



- March 21 - National / World
Agriculture Day - celebrate agriculture, its contributions to our communities, and those who do this important work. Plan an event and invite neighbors and other community members to learn more about local agriculture, enjoy food prepared with local ingredients, and talk about ways to support local agriculture.

April:

- **April 5 - National Walking Day** – invite an instructor to lead an exercise class appropriate for your members – maybe a Zumba class to get your members up and dancing, maybe a class for those with limited mobility to find ways to keep active if intense exercise is not an option.



- April 20 - Volunteer Recognition Day – celebrate your members and the volunteer work they have done this year! Consider awarding a Community Citizen Award (available through National Grange) to honor a community member who goes above and beyond in serving others.

May:

- Appreciation Weeks – May is the month of appreciation weeks for many community helpers – teachers, nurses, police, and EMS. Celebrate the helpers in your communities by doing something to show your appreciation for them (care packages, collect items of need, etc.). Work with your community service committee and invite representatives from these fields to a meeting to accept the donations.



- **May 31 - Save Your Hearing Day** - Invite an audiologist or other specialist to discuss hearing and ear health.

Keeping my hands busy is one quality I inherited from my mother – throughout her life she was always making items to give away. Many Grangers were blessed to receive a baby blanket from her. Think outside the box! Reach out to the VFW to see how you can support their members. Can you serve a meal to the Veterans and their families? Provide favors for Memorial Day, Fourth of July, or Veterans Day? Perhaps make "Thank you" notes to be distributed?

Do you have a local VA? See how you can help support the Veterans there. Our local VA houses many veterans who would otherwise be homeless. Their income is insufficient to meet all of their needs so many go without basic necessities - things like toothpaste, deodorant, underwear, and socks. Is your Grange able to collect items to help support these needs? Contact Voluntary Services at your local VA and see how you can assist.

Does a local Veteran need assistance installing a ramp? Can your Grange assist in the physical labor required to fulfill this service? Perhaps you can help fill their refrigerator, freezer and pantry while you are assisting with the home.

At Family Festival, Christmas cards will be available to color and decorate that will be distributed to Veterans at a local VA Hospital. We will also be collecting toiletries - mens deodorant, lotion, shaving cream or gel, toothbrushes (individually packaged), toothpaste, non-alcoholic mouthwash, hairbrushes and combs. There will be a bike/walk-a-thon with monies collected being donated to support our Veterans. Stay tuned to Facebook for more information!

Our culminating collection for this focus will occur at State Session in October, where we will be collecting underwear, t-shirts, socks, and toiletries to donate to Veterans. Please watch for more information in the upcoming months! The report form will include a section for how your Grange provided community service for our Veterans. An updated form will be available on the State Grange website as several changes have been made.



Make sure you are keeping records for all community service activities your Grange supports - how many people are involved, count or weight of items collected, who benefited from your activity, and any other pertinent information. Take pictures of

your activity or collection to be included in your report and to post to your Facebook page to spread word of your good deeds! Remember that all community service activities should be included on your report form. Homemade Muffin Mix Recipe

Ingredients

- □ 3 cup unbleached, all-purpose flour
- п 1 cup granulated sugar or brown sugar
 - \Box 1/2 cup whole wheat flour
 - □ 4 tsp baking powder
 - □ 1/2 tsp baking soda
 - \Box 1/2 tsp salt
 - □ 2 eggs
 - □ 1 cup milk
 - □ 1/2 cup vegetable oil
 - □ 1/2 cup plain yogurt
 - □ 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 11/2 cups mix-ins for muffins any combination of nuts, chocolate chips, or fresh or dried fruit, such as mashed bananas, blueberries, finely chopped apples, raspberries, or coarsely chopped cranberries

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 375°. Line a 12-cup muffin tin with muffin papers or spray with nonstick cooking spray.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, combine the flours, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and sugar.
- 3. In a separate bowl, combine the oil, milk, yogurt, eggs, and extract, if using. Whisk to blend.
- 4. Add the wet ingredients to the dry. Fold gently until mostly moistened, but still lumpy. Fold in mix-ins of your choosing.
- 5. For 12 large muffins, fill muffin cups completely, even mounding past their tops. For 18 kid-size muffins, fill almost full.
- 6. Bake 25-35 minutes, depending on how much you fill them. Bake until a tester comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack before serving.

To freeze: baked and cooled muffins can be stored in a ziptop freezer bag in the freezer for up to 6 weeks.

To make as a mix: Take a large ziptop bag or container and label it with the wet ingredients and the baking instructions. Measure out the dry ingredients into the bag. Seal and store until ready to use.

White House Christmas Tree has Grange Roots

The arrival of the White House Christmas tree by horse and carriage kicks off the Christmas season at the White House. This past November, the tree had a connection to a Berks County Grange family as Paul and Pam Shealer presented First Lady Jill Biden with the 2022 tree featured in the Blue Room.

"That was a really neat experience," Pam said. "It was a pretty seamless event. The tree got delivered the Thursday before Thanksgiving. Paul and his dad got to drive into the South Gate. Most people don't get to drive into the White House."

The Shealer family has been growing Christmas trees since 1936. Paul and Pam are the fourth generation of the family to operate Evergreen Acres Tree Farm, in Auburn, Schuylkill County. They took over the family business in January 2022. The manage about 50 acres of Christmas trees on owned and rented land. They sell fresh cut trees including Fraser Fir, Douglas Fir, Concolor Fir, Nordmann Fir and Turkish Fir. Most of the farm's trees are sold wholesale in southeast Pennsylvania, but they do retail Christmas tree sales from their home farm.

The Monday before Thanksgiving, the family arrived at the White House for



the official delivery presentation. The family met Jill Biden and her grandson Beau as the tree was delivered by a team of horses on a festively decorated wagon. Pam said they spoke briefly with Jill Biden during the ceremony.

The family was able to tour several of the rooms, including the Blue Room, where the tree was on display. "We met the First Lady and then did the presentation. Afterwards, as a bonus, we were asked if we would like to stick around and watch Marine One land. The precision with how that pilot flew, was amazing."

This is the second time the family won the contest after one of their Douglas fir trees was chosen in 2000 at the end of Bill Clinton's second term. Pam and their children are members of Ontelaunee Grange #1617 in Berks County.

The journey from farm to White House began for this tree about 20 years ago when the tree was planted as a sapling on their family tree farm.

The Shealer family's adventure began

with a win at the 2021 Pennsylvania Farm Show, qualifying them for entry into the National Christmas Tree Convention in August 2021 in North Carolina.

An award-winning tree just does not magically appear. It takes care, attention to detail and patience. Paul and his father do all of the trimming and shaping on the farm. Preparing for the national contest, Paul said they selected the tree, prepped it, added damp clothes to the tree butt to keep it from drying out and drove overnight to get it to North Carolina in short order to keep it fresh.



At that convention, they were selected as the grand champion with a Douglas Fir, providing them the opportunity to have a tree from their farm featured in the White House Blue Room. The national convention only happens on odd-numbered years, so two winners are selected at each convention. They were selected to provide the tree in 2022.

Pennsylvania has had multiple tree farms win this prestigious award and have their trees serve as the official



Christmas Tree. Pam said they compete in the Pennsylvania Farm Show and National Christmas Tree Growers contests to see how their trees line up to others. "Like any commodity, if you are producing a good product you want to see how it compares," she said. It also brings awareness to the family farm.

One unique element of the contest is each farm competes with a tree between six to eight feet in height. The tree for the White House is much larger. Pam said growers competing in the contest have a few trees in mind at the farm that could possibly work. "We had three trees" in mind, she said.

In October, members of the Biden's staff arrived on farm to select the perfect tree. White House Chief Usher Robert Downing and Supervisor of Grounds Dale Haney selected a 19-food Concolor Fir as this year's tree. In November the tree was cut, hand-wrapped and prepared for transport to Washington. The National Tree Growers helped to make it a pretty seamless process doing the initial organization with the White House and promotion of their tree presentation.



The recognition created plenty excitement among their customers and fellow Grangers as they prepared the tree for the White House. "They were excited. A lot of people congratulated us" Pam said. "They were excited to see it was people that they actually knew."

This past Christmas season, they also received a boost with new customers visiting the farm thanks to the publicity, and from their customers spreading the word to friends. In January, the family exhibited Christmas trees at the 2023 Pennsylvania Farm Show. Of the six trees entered, all six placed in the top five in their tree classes, continuing the tradition of excellence.

If you visited the 2023 Farm Show Evergreen Acres Tree Farm placed in the top 5 in each species class. We entered 6 trees and all placed in the top 5! Here were our results:

Canaan Fir - 1st Norway Spruce - 1st Fraser Fir - 2nd Concolor Fir - 2nd Douglas Fir - 3rd Nordmann Fir - 5th



Pennsylvania has more than 1,400 Christmas tree farms across the state, covering nearly 31,000 acres, ranking third in the nation. Unlike other states where Christmas tree production is found in one region, Pennsylvania's trees are grown in diverse areas, with York County harvesting the most Christmas trees in the state. Carbon, Columbia and Schuylkill counties rank 18, 20 and 24 in the nation for Christmas tree production in a region around Scranton. In the western part of the state, closer to Pittsburgh, is Indiana, the city known as the "Christmas Tree Capital of the World," due to the large volume of Christmas tree farms dotting the region, which is rather strange considering their proximity to a city.

The Pennsylvania Department of Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture says the food court reported record sales this year. From goat snuggling to rodeos to dairy shows, the Farm Show had something for everyone of all ages. The Pennsylvania State Grange was pleased with the success of its 2023 Pennsylvania Farm Show legislative panels. The topics addressed in the programs addressed challenges facing many Pennsylvanians and the agricultural community.

SCAMdoulous: How to avoid being a victim of Cyber Crime

Have you ever gotten a text, call or email seemingly from someone you know and trust that asks for assistance? Maybe it's a request to help set up a venmo or zelle account or a request to help buy gift cards for a friend or fellow grange member. While it may seem innocent, upon closer inspection you will find it is a scam. While you may feel fear or embarrassment you are not alone!

On Wednesday, the Pennsylvania State Grange gathered an expert panel on cybercrime on the Lancaster Farming Stage to give tips and advice on avoiding being a victim of scams and what to do if you become a victim.

Because the Pennsylvania State Senate was in session and working on serious issues, Sen. Kristin Phillips-Hill could not attend, however, Rep. Torren Ecker discussed how the general assembly can give law enforcement extra tools to go after the bad people who target individuals for their money.

WGAL 8 investigative reporter Brian Roche emphasized to not take it personally when scammers target you. 95% of the time they have no idea who you are and warned that 56% of the time fraud attempts come through your phone.



York County District Attorney, David Sunday spoke to how his office investigates and prosecutes criminals taking advantage of Pennsylvanians stating that scammers can try a 1,000 times to scam the public and if they only succeed two times it is a win for them, and they will continue. He recommends everyone do a credit check on themselves twice a year.

Chief Information Officer Garth Pricer of Members 1st Credit Union finished the panel by talking about what to do if you are a victim of cybercrime stressing that time is of the absolute essence. Contact your bank directly by calling the number of the bank on your statements if you feel you may have been scammed. He finished by saying to treat cybercrime like

a mosquito, if you get bit, get treated. Always remember, help is out there and all you need to do is reach out! Workforce Development: A Collaborative Effort

Secretary of Agriculture Russell Redding kicked of the Pennsylvania State Grange's second panel on workforce development by stating that workforce is always in the top two discussion points in meeting with agricultural businesses.

"To support agriculture into tomorrow, we need to inspire, attract, and retain the talents we have today. Through agriculture education, we can inspire the students of today to become leaders of agriculture in the future. By highlighting the opportunities of our industries, we can attract talent to join us. And in growing opportunities and building career paths to advancement, we can retain those who are already vested in our industry." Secretary Redding said.

Rep. Torren Ecker of Adams County discussed what he has seen in his district which is steeped in agricultural history. non-partisan and will continue to work with his



colleagues, colleges and universities to work to address these shortages.

Sara Gligora who serves as the Special Assistant for Workforce Development in the Department of Agriculture, discussed her role and the role of the Department of Agriculture in helping to form collaborative partnerships to address the needs of the agriculture communities.



Michele Shearer of the Center for Dairy excellence spoke about the programs the center offers to highlight programs for middle and high school students. Shearer works with the Grow PA Ag Workforce Development Committee. This collaborative group works on ways to support educators and parents to help middle and high school students explore careers in the Food and Agricultural Sciences in Pennsylvania and beyond.

The panel's student representative was Bryce Danko, a senior at Greenwood High School. Danko is a member of Oliver Grange #1069 and is very involved in the Pennsylvania State Grange's Ambassador program. Danko spoke on and his involvement with the Greenwood FFA and their state accolades in competition. He feels that his Ag teachers and the FFA program has better prepared him for his goal of becoming a firefighter in Montana.

The last panelist was Cheyenne Wivell an Ag teacher and FFA advisor at Bermudian Springs High School in Adams County. She discussed the importance of exposing students to agriculture and the opportunities that these industries can provide. She feels Ag education is essential and feels her students benefit greatly from the school's curriculum.

All the panelists agreed that if organizations can work in a collaborative fashion, their shared goals in providing a well-educated Ag workforce can be achieved.



Valley Grange #1360 Led by a Strong Group of Volunteers helps the Famous Farm Show Milkshakes Celebrate its 70th Birthday

Anyone who knows and encounters Fae Snyder from Valley Grange #1360 understands they will be met with a beautiful smile and a kind greeting. Some



may not know that she is the driving force behind those famous "Farm Show' milkshakes.

If you visited the Farm Show this year you know how large the crowds were. The line for milkshakes was extremely long and never seemed to go down. In fact, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture says the food court reported record sales this year.

For seventy years Pennsylvania Dairymen's Association has been serving famous PA Farm Show milkshakes. For every one of those years Fae Snyder has been helping to bring the happiness of the sweet treat to attendees.

It started in the fall of 1953 when then Executive Director of the Dairymen's Association, John Blyholder, a Valley Grange member talked to Fae about the possibility of a partnership between the Grange and the Dairymen's milkshake stand. Fae agreed and in January of 1954 famous milkshakes premiered at the Farm Show.

Fae says that the original stand was in the main exhibition hall at the McClay Street entrance and in the beginning, they would start with a brick of vanilla ice cream and mix it by spindles that you see in small ice cream shops. She admits that she was skeptical when the Dairymen introduced the milkshake mixes with the new machines but acknowledges it caught on and 70 years later the milkshakes are still a huge hit. Fae and Valley Grange's commitment to the PA Dairymen's Association to provide the volunteers to keep the stand moving quickly is a testament to the mission statement of the Pennsylvania State Grange.



"Service and volunteering are about people helping people, and this is what makes the Pennsylvania Farm Show the incredible event that it has been for 107 years." Dave Smith, Executive Director of the PA Dairymen's Association says, "The Pennsylvania Dairymen's Association has been thrilled to have all the Grange members and families help partner and staff the milkshake business at the Farm Show for 70 years. The efforts of these Grange members

and families have been invaluable to the efforts to support Pennsylvania farm families."

"Volunteering in the milkshake stand is a place to be able to see people you only see once a year at the Farm Show." Fae Says, "The partnership of Valley Grange with the Dairymen's association provides for the health of our grange as it is the big fundraiser of the year."

Government Matters



Historic Start to a New Legislative Session

I hope everyone had a great Holiday season filled with time with loved ones and wonderful memories. As we begin to look to spring, I find myself looking forward to a new year of grange events! April brings Grange Month followed by, Grange Ambassador Day on the Hill, Family Fest and Ag Progress days! All will be here before we know it! As always I am so excited to connect with each of you.

2023 certainly started with a bang in Harrisburg. While Governor Shapiro began to settle into a new role and began picking his cabinet, the Pennslvania House of Representatives fell into utter chaos.



It began on election night when poll numbers began to be reported. Going into election day in the State House, Republicans enjoyed a healthy 113-90 majority. On election night it began to become apparent that after a decade of Republican control, Democrats would take control of the House. The control of the House would, however; be by the slimmest of margins and be decided by three special elections in Allegheny County that were caused by the death of one member (Rep. Tony DeLuca) and two members being elected to higher office (Rep. Austin Davis & Rep. Summer Lee) that triggered Special Elections.

On Swearing-In Day 2023, (January 3, 2023) Republicans held a precarious seat lead in the House due to the three vacant seats. It soon became apparent that it would be a long day as the chamber had to elect a Speaker of the House with no clear majority of one party or the other.

In a surprise move on swearing-in day, they House moved to vote Democrat Rep. Mark Rozzi as Speaker of the House. Rozzi, a moderate Democrat from Berks County, was seen as a compromise candidate for both caucuses. However, chaos soon arose as neither caucus could agree to House rules that set framework to be able to meet in session. Hence, the House has not met for voting session and is not scheduled to come back into session until Febrauary 21st. Stay tuned for the next chapter of this saga!

Pennsylvania State Grange Busy in the Capitol Despite Lack of Session

Regardless of the lack of session days in Harrisburg, the Pennsylvania State Grange has been busy positioning its policy for action. The Farm Show brought a wonderful opportunity to connect with

many House and Senate members on issues of importance to Grangers.

Additionally, we have either met with or have schedule meetings



with many officals on these issues. Senator Doug Mastriano is in the process of introducing legislation that would ban large scale solar farms from Class I and Class II farmland. We will be meeting with his office to work in a collaborative way to move this legislation.



What Flowers Attract Bees To Your Garden

Most of the pollination is carried out by native pollinators—including flies, beetles, moths, and butterflies—but native bees are the unsung heroes. (Note: Honeybees are non-natives and not as important for widespread pollination.)



There are over **4,000 species of bees** native to North America, ranging from the world's smallest bee—the 2mm (.08") long fairy bee (Perdita minima)—found only in the desert southwest, to the large carpenter bees that reach 40mm (1.6") long. No matter their size, all native bees rely on blooming plants for sugary nectar and protein-packed pollen to feed themselves and their offspring.

A bee's flower preference depends on the length of its tongue! Some bees have long tongues that can easily access nectar in tubular-shaped blossoms like penstemon, columbine, and honeysuckle, while those with short tongues go for daisies, asters,

and sunflowers. Small bees like small florets and composite flowers, while big bumblebees and carpenters like larger flowers. Try to plant a mix of different flower shapes and sizes to attract a variety of bee species to your space. Flower color matters. Bees can't see red, which is a color more attractive to hummingbirds and butterflies. Bees are drawn to purple, blue, white, and yellow.

Perennials offer the highest quality nectar and pollen but there are exceptions. Some bees are specialists, like the squash bee that prefers only squash, pumpkin, and gourd blossoms. The most effective pollinators are the generalists that get their food from a wide range of plants. This includes not only native trees and perennials but some non-natives like crimson and white clovers and annuals as well.

Annuals have the advantage of blossoming all season long. Bees flock to alyssum, cleome, zinnias, sunflowers, salvia, calendula, and verbena.





Your culinary herbs such as sage, thyme, borage, lavender, chives, dill, basil, oregano, rosemary, and mint can do double duty. Plant them throughout the vegetable garden, let some of them flower, and they will draw in the pollinators to your other plants.

The eternal struggle for bees in temperate zones is finding enough food in late winter and early spring, when most of nature is still sleeping! Here's what we can plant to help them out: Some early blooming trees and shrubs to consider are vernal witch hazel, maples, willows, serviceberry, and redbud. They flower when not much else is in bloom yet. Early blooming fruits including cherry, plum, raspberry, blackberry, and blueberries. Mid-season flowers such as anise hyssop, black-eyed Susans, coneflowers, catmint, cleome, penstemon, globe thistle, milkweed, monarda (bee balm), coreopsis, daisies, phlox, gaillardia, and yarrow are bee magnets.

Bees are active until the weather cools down in late fall and still need to feed. Grow some late bloomers like dahlias, asters, ironweed, goldenrod, Joe Pye weed, rudbeckias, and helianthus to keep the party going. Bumblebees love bottle gentian, too!

Native bees need more than pretty flowers to survive. We need to provide water, shelter, and nesting sites. Banish pesticides and other poisons from your yard.



When shopping for plants, look for chemical-free ones. Systemic insecticides can make the whole plant toxic—nectar and pollen included!



The History of the PA State Grange Office



The idea to open a State Grange Headquarters Office was first proposed at the 1916 state session held in Philadelphia to meet a need for the Grange to be in Harrisburg during sessions of the state legislature, not for the purpose of lobbying but to keep members informed what was being done at the State Capitol on agricultural concerns. The office was opened in January 1917, in

rented space in the Spooner Building with Fred Brenckman as legislative representative. In 1918 Mr. Brenckman was elected Secretary of the State Grange and the office functioned both as the Grange's legislative and administrative center. In 1919 the offices moved to the Telegraph Building where they remained until the purchase of a building at 1604 North Second Street for \$37,000 in 1952. At the 80th annual session on Allentown that year, Executive Committee member Dr. Ira C. Gross presented a proposal that each delegate pledge their Grange to contribute \$1 per member to a Headquarters Fund; the plan was adopted unanimously and by 1954 almost \$57,000 had been contributed. Major renovations were necessary to convert the building into offices and the cost of \$45,045.12 to do this work for exceeded the original estimates. The building was dedicated on September 13, 1956 and continued as the state headquarters until the sale of the property in 2005 for \$276,000. After that sale, the State Grange headquarters then moved to a rented space in Lemoyne just across the river from Harrisburg. In May 2021, the State Grange purchased a building in Mifflintown, about 35 miles north of the State Capitol Building, to serve as the headquarters.

Grange Cookbook Classics

Beef Nacho Casserole

1 lb ground beef 1 c frozen corn, thawed 1 (12 oz) jar salsa 3/4 c mayonnaise 1 Tbsp chili powder

2 c tortilla chips, crushed 2 c shredded cheese optional toppings: shredded lettuce, tomato sour cream

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brown ground beef and drain. Stir in corn, salsa, mayonnaise and chili powder. Layer 1/2 of each mixture, chips and cheese in a 9x13 or larger pan. Repeat. Heat until cheese melts, between 10-20 minutes. Top with shredded lettuce, tomato and sour cream if desired.
