

Happy Spring, Grangers! While I sit down to write this, we are nearing the end of March, the skies are clear blue, and it's 60° out. My daffodils and tulips are finally popping through the ground and spring has arrived.

Back in January, a friend of mine in Christ, introduced me to a new minister that I hadn't ever heard of before via a podcast. His name is Pastor JD Greear and he is with Summit Life Ministries. If you have never heard of him before, I highly recommend looking him up and checking out many of his ministries. Lots of his topics involve present-day issues and are very relatable. One evening driving home from work, I came across one of his ministries that hit remarkably close to home, from his series "God and the rest of the week." The meeting agenda consisted of business discussion on Committee updates & Calendar of events for the upcoming 2023 year. The next meeting was held in January 2023 via Zoom.

Pennsylvania Farm Link is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization working to "Link Farmers to the Future". PFL works closely with the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture and other agricultural organizations and businesses across the Commonwealth to support PA farmers. FAMILY FESTIVAL – July 13-16, 2023 – Centre County Grange Fairgrounds – Centre Hall, PA

The Pennsylvania State Grange's Family Festival will again be held at the Centre County Fairgrounds in July. Plan to attend the following activities led by the Lecturer's Department.

- State Grange Talent Contest - The annual talent contest will be held during the Family Festival on Saturday evening, July 15th at 7:00 pm. NEW THIS YEAR - Preregistration will be REQUIRED by June 15th (the same deadline as Family Festival registrations). Participants can enter in 3 classes - Vocal, Instrumental, and Variety. All acts are limited to a 5-minute maximum. There are cash prizes for the top three entries in each class. Plus, the best overall act – named the Best of Show – is given the opportunity to represent Pennsylvania in the National Grange Evening of Excellence, which is held in conjunction with the National Grange Convention in November 2023. This year's National Convention is in Niagara Falls, New York, November 14-18! The National Session will not be this close to us for the next several years – so this is the year to

showcase your talent and represent PA at the national level!

- **Sip & Paint** – Back by popular demand! Plan to join us for our 3rd annual Paint & Sip – a fun painting class led by an instructor – on Friday, July 14th from 9:00–11:00 am. The instructor will lead the group through painting a picture on canvas while we enjoy some "mocktail" refreshments and fellowship. This is perfect for artists of all abilities and experience! This year, the Sip & Paint will be a fundraiser for the 150th Anniversary Session! The cost will be \$20 and will cover the instructor fee and all materials. All proceeds will be donated to the 150th Anniversary Session! Join us for a fun time for a great cause!

Make sure you have an information table set up to provide information about the Grange!

How have you been serving your veterans? If there isn't a VA in your general area, consider reaching out to local nursing homes to see if they serve any veterans and see how you could best support those veterans. Does a member know a veteran who could use some assistance? Don't hesitate to think outside the box!

Family Festival

Please consider donating a basket for our Silent Auction. All funds will be donated to a local VA home where monies are used to purchase items needed by the residents. Baskets should be delivered to Family Festival on Thursday, July 13. If you would like to contribute a basket but aren't attending, please reach out and we can connect you with someone coming from your area.

We will continue to hold our bike/walk-a-thon. Monies collected will be used to purchase Canteen cards to be given to veterans at the Coatesville VA Home. This allows them to purchase clothing and/or food; items that they might not have the funds to purchase without this donation.



If you are attending Family Festival, please bring items to donate to our veterans – the current needs include sweatshirts, sweatpants, colored short sleeve and long sleeve shirts (all clothing sizes M-3X are most needed), mens 3-in-1 body wash/shampoo, and flexible head razors. If you already purchased items off the previous list, please bring them! The list of what they currently need changes monthly, and all items are appreciated!

We will also be making and coloring cards that will be given to veterans at local VA homes. These will be available throughout the weekend. Please take a few minutes to make a card or two. I know at our local VA, these cards are proudly displayed on their doors for months after the holiday and may be the only card or one of very few cards they receive.

I hope you're making plans to join us for Junior Grange Camp (July 2nd-8th) and Family Festival (July 13th-16th)! Camp registrations are due on June 2nd, by visiting http://bit.ly/PAJGcamp2023 (it's case-sensitive), or filling out the form in this issue of the PA Grange News.

Our committee is planning a ton of fun for our beach-themed camp, which may include a luau, lots of water games, and typical summer & camp fun. You won't want to miss it!

We will also be picking our new **Junior Grange Ambassadors** at Camp! As a reminder, the PAJG Ambassadors will be one male and one female, who have celebrated at least their 12th birthday by December 31st of the year they are competing at State Camp. (This means Junior Ambassador candidates may range in age from 11 to 14 during camp. Candidates are not limited to the number of times they may compete in these years.) The full rules can be found on the Junior page on pagrange.org.

Ambassadors are the face of the Junior Grange in Pennsylvania and get to participate in several fantastic opportunities, including National Grange, the PA Farm Show, Royalty Day in Harrisburg, and helping to plan parts of camp. Each set of Ambassadors brings a new "flavor" to the role and can help plan fun ideas or activities they have in mind.

We are also seeking **Counselors and Helpers** to help us run Junior Grange Camp! Helpers must be between 16 and 18 as of the start of camp, and anyone over 18 will be a Counselor. Email me (pajuniorgrange@gmail.com) to get a copy

of the Counselor/Helper application. Note that no staff members will be able to come without current clearances. Submitting an application does not guarantee you will be able to attend camp.

Information on clearances can be found at www.pagrange.org/juniors.html. They are **FREE** for volunteers, so there's really no reason to not take care of getting your clearances, no matter what role you play in working with Junior Grangers.

At Family Festival, there will be plenty for our Juniors to do, from water games to workshops and activities, the bike-a-thon, and more. Family Festival is a great way to visit with friends in an environment that's a little less structured than camp!

I encourage each Junior Grange to be participating in the National Junior Grange's Quarter Focus. We are currently in the second quarter, where the focus is Agricultural Awareness and the theme is **Reduce-Reuse-Recycle**. Contest Feature

Recycling is one way in which to help our environment. How many of us truly recycle all that we can? We feel this is one way in which the Junior Grange can be of help. Can you turn something that many people would throw away into an object that can be used again (and again)?

NOTE: This contest is open to Juniors At Heart (i.e. anyone age 14+)

Categories: 2023 - Cans (Aluminum or Tin)

Sub-Categories a. Practical/Useful

b. Decorative

Rules

- 1. Size limitations: No larger than 18 inches x 18 inches x 18 inches.
- 2. At least 75% of the recycled craft must be made from recycled items.

Judging guidelines:

- 1. Originality
- 2. Neatness
- 3. Creativity
- 4. Usefulness or Decorative Appeal

Ideas:

- Make wind chimes from cans of various sizes
- Turn tin cans into candle holders
- Make a caddy for silverware and condiments for an outdoor picnic (could also be used for craft supplies!)




FROM THE BIRTH OF THE UNIVERSITY, the mandate was clear. The charter drawn up by the Pennsylvania state legislature on Feb. 22, 1855, establishing the creation of the Farmers' High School of Pennsylvania, stated that "the institution shall be under the management and government of a board of trustees ... competent to perform the duties hereinafter authorized and required." The Penn State Board of Trustees has grown and evolved from that initial 13-member board, but that mandate—the overall responsibility for the governance and welfare of the university—remains.

While day-to-day management of the university is delegated to the president, the board's purview includes approval of the university's operating budget, student tuition and fees, and major construction and real estate expenditures, and selection and evaluation of the university president. Board membership includes leaders of government and industry and representatives of alumni, faculty, and students; as stated in the bylaws, the members "bring to their roles varied

backgrounds and expertise ... but they must keep the welfare of the entire university, not just a particular constituency, at all times paramount."

Members, who receive no financial compensation for their service, meet throughout the year as a full board, and also serve on various committees. In addition to the executive committee, the board maintains seven standing committees: Academic Affairs, Research and Student Life; Audit and Risk; Equity and Human Resources; Finance, Business, and Capital Planning; Governance and Long-Range Planning; Legal and Compliance, and Outreach, Development and Community Relations.

Three of the board's nine alumni-elected seats come up for election each year, nominations for this year's alumni trustee election were open from Jan. 15 through Feb. 25, and all Penn State alumni will have from April 10 through May 4 to cast their ballots. The nine alumni trustees account for a quarter of the board's voting membership. Here's a breakdown of the 38-member board.

Keystone Grange Marks 150 Years of Service

The Cornerstone of a Montgomery County Community

Keystone Grange #2 has served the residents of Upper Providence Township, Montgomery County since 1873. A lot has changed through its 150 years of existence, but at its heart, Keystone Grange remains committed to the community it is designed to serve.

The second oldest Grange in Pennsylvania, Keystone Grangers are ready to celebrate its history and look forward to a bright future. A special 150th anniversary celebration is scheduled for June 10.

"Keystone Grange is highlighting 150 years of community service. Our most popular events, the Designer Bag Bingo and Ladies' Afternoon Tea Party, are selling tickets at a faster rate than ever. We are having an Open House on Saturday June 10 to highlight our history," said Gene Zvarick, Lecturer of Keystone Grange.



As part of the celebration, the Grange has a few projects in development, including the beautification of the Grange hall's front lawn, a celebratory flier highlighting Keystone Grange, and archiving and organizing the subordinate's records for preservation. The dedication shown by Keystone's members is evident, and noted by current President Erin Wismer.

"I have noticed over the years that a small

group of committed members can be more productive than a large group of inactive and ineffective participants. The great thing about our group of members at Keystone Grange #2 in Trappe is that we share many goals and enjoy our teamwork and fellowship. As Henry Ford said, 'Coming together is a beginning, keeping together is progress, working together is success," said President Wismer.

The Wismer name is a familiar one in Grange circles across Pennsylvania. Erin's father, Matthew, served as Master of Keystone Grange #2. Matthew's father, Charlie served as Master of the Pennsylvania State Grange from 1979 to 1988.

"I believe my grandfather's influence is still with us today. Our whole family continues to be involved with the Grange," said Erin. Matthew's sister, Julie Wismer Bechtel, serves as Treasurer.

In the aftermath of the Civil War, residents were striving to overcome the challenges of a post-war society. According to Historical Excerpts of Pennsylvania Grange's 125th Anniversary edition, a deputy from the National Grange met with representatives of the "Farmers Club and Debating Society" at the home of Nelson Naile. From that meeting. Keystone Grange #2 was chartered with 17 men and 7 women. Josiah Miller was elected its first Master. Records indicate that John Wanner was the prime mover and sustainer of this new organization and earned the title, "Father of Keystone Grange."

For the first 30 years, Grangers met in private homes, Hobsons Store in Collegeville, the Lamb Hotel in Trappe and Dan Shulers' carpenter shop. In 1913, the Grangers voted to purchase the old Warren Lodge Masonic Hall in Trappe. The building was dedicated on Jan. 14, 1914.

The early part of the 20th century saw the Grange open a cooperative Grange Store, which was in operation until 1950.

The 100th Anniversary of Keystone Grange was celebrated in 1973, culminating in the Centennial Fair which initiated the Annual Grange Country Fair.

Today, the Grange continues to evolve its mission and focus, supporting the local community efforts of 4-H, Girl Scouts, Eagle Scouts, and others. Grangers participate in the Words for Thirds program. New this year, Grangers established a scholarship program for students seeking to pursue an agricultural or environmental degree.

"Keystone Grange has stayed connected to the community mostly through supporting the youth. We held art and poetry contests with the local elementary school, provided dictionaries, held music events, installed a Little Free Library, hosted volunteer students with the Martin Luther King Day of Service, and worked with scouts for Eagle Scout projects," Zvarick said. "We hosted flea markets, opened the hall for Master Gardener talks, are active on social media, and will use our highly visible sign along Main Street to show support for other organizations in our community. Our new scholarship program puts our name directly into the local high schools. This catches the attention of an entirely new segment of the community."

As Keystone Grange #2 charts a path for the future, it will be built on its past successes.





Charles E Wismer, Jr. 18th Master of PA State Grange 1979-1988

Charlie Wismer was elected as Pennsylvania State Grange Master in 1979. During his time of service, he focused on Grange growth, establishing many new subordinate Granges. A dairy farmer himself, he was instrumental in helping farmers navigate the challenges of the avian influenza outbreak that devastated the poultry industry in southeastern Pennsylvania. His efforts also centered on farm profitability and the viability of rural communities.

Long active in Keystone Grange #2 and many civic endeavors in Trappe Borough (including three as mayor), Master Wismer was the State "Granger of the Year" in 1972 and had chaired the State Dairy, Agriculture and Legislative committees. During his time as State Master, Wismer focused on improving the image of the Grange, and encouraged members to take pride in their Grange membership. He adopted as the motto of his term, "Grangers Helping Grangers".

In 1955 he married his wife, Jane, and they had four children – Matthew, Betsy, Mindy and Julie.

After a Historic Start to the Legislative Session, Budget Negotiations Continue

Spring has sprung and so has activity in the Capitol. After a shaky start to the 2023-24 legislative session the General Assembly is in full swing. In February, three special elections gave the House Democratic Caucus a slim, one seat majority and Speaker Mark Rozzi quickly stepped down and Joanna McClinton, was elected as the first woman Speaker of the House.

As the House and Senate began their budget hearings, another wrinkle was thrown into the House of Representatives as a member, Rep. Mike Zabel, tendered his resignation leaving, once again, two vacancies in the House which will be filled during a special election on May 16th. While many feel the two seats will be split (one Republican, one Democrat) and Democrats will remain in charge, there is a chance the House majority could change once again.

All of that said, the show must go on and Governor Shapiro gave his first budget address of his administration on March 7th. It was one of the longest budget addresses in the General Assembly's history and many feel the proposal was meant to appease members of both parties as the governor has vowed to rule from the middle.

In his address, Shapiro said that the surplus in the General Fund and the Rainy Day Fund, combined, are the largest in the Commonwealth's history. He noted this year's budget has been developed around cautious and conservative revenue expectations, which would allow the state to 'weather the storm should it come'.

I was especially pleased that unlike in some previous years, the PA Racehorse Development Fund has not been zeroed out for use in a non-ag purpose. In addition, Governor Shapiro did not zero out ag budget items that enjoy universal support such as Hardwood Development, as well as dairy and youth shows. In the past, the General Assembly would have to negotiate these programs back into the state budget and the Grange is pleased that these line items appear safe this year. Most line items affecting agriculture and rural Pennsylvania will receive level funding or a slight increase when compared to the current fiscal year. Some examples if this proposal passes:


- Department of Agriculture budget would increase from current \$38.75 million to \$46 million.
- Penn State Agricultural Research & Extension budget would grow by a million dollars. While the Grange is pleased by this increase, it will advocate for even more.
- Centers for Ag Excellence, Workforce Development and several others would receive increases. However, the increase in the Ag Excellence line is for a new Organic Excellence program with details yet to be released.
- County fairs, the PA Farm Show, livestock, and open dairy shows and other similar budget items would remain level funded.

The state budget proposal now goes before the House and Senate Appropriations Committees. A complete hearing schedule is available from www.legis.state.pa.us.

Pennsylvania Broadband Update

For close to twenty years the Pennsylvania State Grange has been in the forefront of raising awareness and advocating for universal broadband. Last year, those efforts began to pay off in the form of the Pennsylvania **Broadband Authority** of which the Grange is a member. The Authority is finally in a place to begin funding projects in the form of grants to improve broadband in our rural communities. Grangers should feel proud that their efforts are finally coming to

fruition.

To that end, I was thrilled to be able to represent the Grange in Gettysburg with Senator Bob Casey, members from the White House and members of the Broadband Authority to talk about the investment in broadband in Pennsylvania. I will continue to update members as more progress is being made.

Pennsylvania State Grange to Speak at Senate Agriculture Hearing

It is very fitting that the Pennsylvania State Grange was asked to testify on the future of the Over-Order-Premium in the midst of Grange Month. As many know the Senate Agriculture Chairman, Elder Vogel, is a longtime Grange member and has been in very close contact with the Pennsylvania State Grange on a variety of Ag issues.

We are also honored to be the first to participate in policy discussions in the Capitol and we feel our testimony will go a long way in the future of diary policy in Pennsylvania.

150th Celebration in the Capitol and Youth/Junior Ambassador Day

Secretary Russell Redding and Senator Elder Vogel will be among the many dignataries who are set to participate in a media event to celebtate the Pennsylvania State Grange 150th Anniversary in the Capitol Rotunda on June 13, 2023 at 10:00am.

Small Space Gardening

You don't need a huge backyard to grow food for your family. In fact, you don't even need a backyard at all.

More and more people are container planting vegetables and getting plenty of food. In addition to saving space, using buckets for gardens also helps with a lot of other common gardening problems like young plants getting trampled, rabbits eating plants, poor soil, hard

rains, weeds, and ease of care.

Granted, a small vegetable garden might not be sufficient for subsistence farming, but it can provide a few of your favorite options to enjoy at home. Choose vegetables that grow well together in small gardens like great-tasting tomatoes, some beautiful heirloom eggplants and peppers, or a steady supply of leafy greens.

Gardens with compact varieties allow you to grow a variety of plants in the same space. If you plant a giant beefsteak tomato or a row of sweet corn, the space for growing other vegetables in your small vegetable garden will be limited. Even then, you can choose varieties that are bred to grow in small spaces. Anything with the words patio, pixie, tiny, compact, baby, or dwarf in the name is a good bet. Just because a plant is bred to be small doesn't mean the fruits will be small or the yield will be less. The labeling for most seeds and seedlings will indicate the mature size of the plant varieties you are selecting, helping you space things out and see just how many plants you can fit.

Companion planting is often touted for the benefit of reducing pest infestations, but it also serves to conserve space. Shade-tolerant



plants benefit from being planted next to taller crops. Basil likes a respite from the hot afternoon sun and does well next to tomatoes. Lettuce will keep producing all summer if shaded by almost any taller plant. Early harvested vegetables, such as spinach, radishes, and peas, can be planted with slower-growing crops such as broccoli or peppers that will not take over the space until the springharvested vegetables have been harvested.

Growing edible plants indoors on a windowsill is an easy, low-space option for plants that are frequently harvested, such as herbs and lettuce. But windowsill gardening isn't just for gardeners with limited space: Any gardener can extend the growing season by potting up some herbs and growing them indoors provided there is sufficient sunlight and water. If an area inside your home receives enough sunlight, you can even grow vegetables indoors.

Since small vegetable gardens don't leave room for rotating crops, you'll need to utilize other methods to prevent fungal diseases and garden pests that overwinter in the soil. Be vigilant to avoid pests and diseases from becoming rampant. If a large-scale problem should occur (such as an infestation of squash beetles or septoria leaf spot on tomatoes), it's best to stop growing that crop and others in its family for at least a year.




Apple Butter

Representation of Delegates at Annual Sessions

The question of representation at annual meetings of the State Grange caused a great deal of discussion in the early years. Most leaders of the State Grange were not friendly to the idea that each subordinate Grange should be entitled to two delegates to the annual sessions. First Master (president) David B. Mauger recommended that each county with from one to eight Granges should be entitled to representation in the State Grange and that an additional

representative should be given for each additional eight Granges or major fraction thereof. The cost of paying the mileage for delegates was uppermost in the minds of those early leaders in their wish to limit representation. But the delegates clung to the idea that each local Grange should be entitled to send delegates to and have a voice at the State Grange session. Delegates for Pomona Grange were added in later years and this plan has prevailed to the present day.

Grange Cookbook Classics

Chicken Tetrazzini

½ pound spaghetti 1 chopped onion 6 tablespoons butter 1 10 ounce can cream of celery soup 1 pimiento (cut fine) 1 10 ounce can cream of mushroom soup1 cup water2 cups boned and cooked chicken½ cup shredded cheese

Cook spaghetti in boiling, salted water until tender. Drain and mix thoroughly with melted butter. Arrange in casserole. Cook onion in butter until tender. Combine with soups, water and pimiento. Add chicken chunks. Pour over cooked spaghetti and top with cheese. Bake until surface is bubbly and brown.




